Attorney Sued by Bondman.—Attorney E. J. McAllister is made defendant in two suits for collections of money filed yesterday by N. Campbell, who acted as McAllister's bondman after the attorney became involved as a member of the "vice clique." Campbell surrendered McAllister to Judge McGinn Wednesday and McAllister was released on his own recognizance. In one suit, Campbell seeks to collect \$538 which he claims is due Alice Campbell. McAllister gave her note for \$1000 and only one-half of it has been paid, he alleges. The second suit is to collect commissions on the sale of United States Cashier company's stock. Campbell says he sold McAllister's stock for \$1400, understanding that he was to receive a commission, something which has not materialized.

Physician's Machine Struck by Car.
—Dr. and Mrs. A. W. Vincent of 207 West Leavitt street, St. Johns, narrowly escaped serious injury when an automobile owned and driven by the doctor was struck by a sixteenth street car at Sixteenth and Johnson streets. Both machine and car were traveling at moderate speed. The auto was struck broadside. The force of the impact threw it clear of the tracks and the occupants escaped without a bruise. The automobile was slightly damaged.

Newsies Will Not Listen to Agitators.
—Newsboys hereafter will not form a part of any audience listening to I. W. W. agitators on street corners. The newsboys' commission at its last meeting passed a resolution prohibiting newsies from mingling with crowds sur-

rounding agitators, and a canvass of newsboys was made afterward and the youngsters all agreed to live up to the resolution. Charles Cohen, boy mayor, came in for congratulations from Mayor Albee yesterday as a result of the boys' action. Calling Cohen into his private office Mayor Albee declared the "boys have more sense than older people in refusing to mingle with disturbers."

Frenchmen Will Be Tried Here.—Four Frenchmen, G. Masset, L. Lane, J. Pelsmakers and Adrien Labau, arrested last Tuesday night at Island, were released yesterday at Oregon City court, because their attorneys alleged the crime of vagrancy had been committed in Multnomah county. At the quarter left the courtroom, Special State Agent Kay, with Deputy Sheriffs Aldrich and Tennant of Multnomah county, whom Kay had deputized as state agents, arrested the four and brought them to Portland. District Judge Jones at once placed bail at \$500 each and bonds at \$1000 each.

Oregon Electric Changes Time.—For the purpose of favoring employees of downtown department stores and other business establishments that do not close their doors on Saturday, the Oregon Electric has set back the leaving time of train 13 on Saturday evenings. The train has been leaving Eleventh and Hoyt at 9:10 and Jefferson street at 9:30. Henceforth it will leave these points at 9:40 and 10 respectively, running on regular schedule to Salem. This will enable a large number of store employees to reach their homes earlier after closing time.

To Discuss Apple Storage.—Apple storage and refrigeration will be the subjects at a series of meetings to be held in the northwest in the next few weeks under the auspices of the bureau of plant industry and the fruit growers of the Inland Empire. The meetings will be held at these places: August 2, Medford, Or.; August 4, North Yakima, Wash.; Aug. 5, Prosser, Wash.; August 7, Wenatchee, Wash.; August 9, Pullman, Wash.; August 11, Astoria, Ore.; August 12 or 13, Hood River, Or.; August 14, Portland.

Municipal National Bank.—J. J. Sayer discussed the features of the municipal national bank at a luncheon given by the Single Tax club at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday, pointing out the general idea of establishing such a bank in Portland. His talk covered the general financial system and its relation to municipal bonds. DETECTIVES INVESTIGATE CHARGES OF WOMAN

Find Evidence Tending to Expose Many Stock Schemes of Dr. Waters.

Investigation last evening and today by the detectives of Dr. Archibald Waters, arrested here yesterday for the San Francisco police, brings to light evidences of his alleged schemes to fleece women out of money. In his trunk at the Multnomah hotel were found several dozen letters from women with whom he has been corresponding, each pertaining to his wonderful schemes for selling mining stock. The letters indicate that Dr. Waters usually led his women victims to believe, him a single man, but open for proposals of marriage. While the latter subject would be under consideration, the doctor took advantage of confidential relations and put forth his mining stock, it is declared. Only a limited amount of the stock could be obtained, and this only through the certain officials with which Dr. Waters claimed to be in close communication. Various women gave him money with which to purchase stock. The complaint upon which he was arrested is signed by Mrs. Ida M. Smith of 1235 Pine street, San Francisco. She gave him \$1500 with which to purchase stock, but failed to get the stock. A state agent from California is on his way to Portland to return Dr. Waters to that state for prosecution. The man is also known as Walters and Walker. He originally came from Detroit, Mich.

VAUDEVILLE HOUSES AND MOVIES WARNED

Company Gives Trust Deed.
To guarantee the payment of 150 notes for \$500 each which mature within the next five years, the Pacific Bridge company has given a trust deed for its concrete plant at East Water and Salmon streets to the Hibernia Savings bank. The deed was filed with County Clerk Coffey today for recording.

Owing to the absence of Mayor Albee and the city commissioners from the city today, there was no regular Friday session of the city commission. A meeting will be held at 10 a. m. tomorrow.

SECRETARY DANIELS IS TO BE PRESSED TO LENGTHEN VISIT HERE

Governor and Local Commercial Bodies Will Endeavor to Have Him Remain Longer.

If evidence will avail, Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, will be convinced that if he fails to remain in Portland next Monday longer than the six hours of his schedule he will be missing an important opportunity to learn about a dominant Pacific port. Governor West has telegraphed the secretary asking him to be his personal guest on a trip down the river to the mouth. The Commercial club and Chamber of Commerce have joined in a similar invitation, expressing readiness to charter a boat or a special train, whichever pleases him most. He has approved a program for Spokane on Tuesday which would have to be changed if he extended his stay in Portland.

Secretary Daniels' attention will be called to the fact that between Bremerton on Puget sound and San Francisco there is no navy yard, dry dock or coaling station. In the event of attack the Straits of Juan de Fuca leading into Puget sound could be mined or closed, as the United States government controls both one side of the straits.

The harbor at the mouth of the Columbia on the other hand could never be controlled by hostile force if adequate protection were provided. There is a great deal of room for coaling station, dry dock and navy yard. The plan for deepening the channel over the bar to 40 feet or more would furnish depth for almost any of the war vessels, and approval by the navy department and aid by the department of war would advance the channel deepening plan greatly.

The secretary of the navy will carry with him from Portland a rich souvenir portfolio, bound in expensive leather, and containing views and statistics of the harbor. Bones will be put aboard his train at San Francisco and the committee that greets him at Roseburg will bring to him Portland roses. All this will be the work of the Portland Commercial club.

If Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, passes Portland by with a visit of but six hours, his program will not be a model for Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane. He will probably arrive in Portland August 18, and will be in Portland probably two days. Secretary of Agriculture Houston will also be in Oregon two days probably early in September. He will plan to spend a day in Portland, another in Corvallis, the guest of the state at Oregon Agricultural college.

SCHOOL DISTRICT 45 MAY REMAIN INTACT

Board Decides to Open New Temporary School at Belrose Next Year.

School district No. 45, on the O. W. P. line, about half way to Gresham, will probably remain intact as the result of the meeting of the boundary board at Gilbert's Crossing yesterday afternoon. The board decided to open a temporary school next year at Belrose Station for the pupils at the eastern end of the district as an experiment if the school board of the district desires it done. The school board is to notify the boundary board by August 10. If the additional school is found advantageous, it will be made permanent.

Another important change in school districts was made yesterday when all of district 45 in Multnomah county was annexed to school district No. 1, which is the Portland district. When Sylvan was voted into the city two small strips in Multnomah county remained of the Sylvan district outside the city.

Rather than continue the joint district with the remainder of the Sylvan district, which is in Washington county, it was decided to add the two strips to Portland district. By this change the necessity of much extra labor is obviated as under joint district reports must be made out for superintendents of both counties.
