

KARLUK'S BOW TURNED TOWARD THE UNKNOWN LANDS OF THE ARCTIC

Power Boat Alaska Breaks Down Bucking Head Seas But Stefansson Keeps On.

Teller, Port Clarence, Alaska, July 28.—Leaving one of his vessels, the power boat Alaska, behind for repairs, Vilhjalmur Stefansson is en route for the Arctic sea in the Canadian exploration steamer Karluk, accompanied by the gasoline schooner Marie Sachs. The engine on the Alaska broke down while she was bucking a head sea on the way here from Nome, and it will probably be Wednesday before she can sail.

Stefansson went aboard the Karluk at 10 o'clock Saturday night and sailed shortly after midnight. Just before leaving several more dogs were taken aboard, making 39 in all for use by the northern party.

The Marie Sachs, carrying the party which will explore Victoria Land, is carrying 11 dogs. Kenneth Chipman, Canadian geologist, who is in charge of this branch of the expedition, will stop at Flaxman Island to check chronometers, this being one of the few points on the Arctic coast which has been checked with sufficient accuracy for the purpose.

Dr. Anderson, who is in charge of the southern exploration party, remained here and will go north on the Alaska, accompanied by Geologist O'Neill, Topographer Cox and Naturalist Johnson.

FARE ORDINANCE TO BE INTRODUCED IN COUNCIL WEDNESDAY

The ordinance requiring the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to sell six rides for 25 cents will be introduced at the council meeting Wednesday by Will H. Daly, commissioner of public utilities. Final action on the ordinance will not be taken, however, until the week following. It is expected that the streetcar company will put up a fight to prevent the measure from passing the council.

Commissioner Daly decided to introduce this ordinance, as in the past numerous complaints have been made relative to the fares now in force. In other cities, according to Commissioner Daly, traction companies sell six and eight tickets for 25 cents. Mr. Daly believes that with such an ordinance in effect general satisfaction will prevail.

Although all of the commissioners refuse to commit themselves as to the attitude they will take when the measure comes up at Wednesday's meeting, it is said that several of them favor its passage.

TWO ARE FINED FOR NOT MUZZLING DOGS

R. H. Vose, 1516 East Eighth street, north, was fined \$10 this morning in the municipal court for allowing his dog to run at large without being muzzled. Boyd Welch, poundmaster, filed the complaint. The dog bit a small son of J. C. Ward, 1544 East Eighth street, north, Thursday. Vose was directed by Dr. C. H. Mack, of the health department, to keep the animal confined until it was known whether or not the boy had rabies.

Instead of following out the health department's instruction, Vose sent the dog to the country. When asked this morning regarding the dog's present location, Vose refused to tell. He explained that the dog had been tied in the yard, boys allowing it to get away. When the Ward child was bitten, John Logan was also fined \$10 for allowing his dog to be at large without a muzzle.

LINTON TO GET BULL RUN WATER AT LAST

The people of Linton will get Bull Run water through the faucets in their homes tomorrow. Today water being forced through the mains and pipes in that city to thoroughly clean them for regular use. Bull Run water was turned into the mains late Saturday, but the water cannot be used till tomorrow. A meter has been attached to the 12-inch main leading from Portland at a point where the pipe leaves the city limits. The commission council took final action on giving the city of Linton the right to use Bull Run water at last week's meeting, and that city immediately made preparations to get the water.

SECRETARY LANE IS NOT SERIOUSLY ILL

Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane, who is touring the west for the purpose of acquainting himself with the various reclamation projects, undertaken and proposed by the government, is recovering from a slight illness, according to a telegram received by the Commercial club, from Billings, Mont., where the secretary is stopping today.

The message is in answer to a wire sent by C. C. Chapman, who had heard that the secretary was ill. In his telegram Secretary Lane says he will be glad to arrive at Portland and meet the citizens. He is due in Portland the latter part of August.

CLACKAMAS RIVER IS WELL POLICED

Vicinity of Estacada Had Warlike Appearance Due to Policemen's Picnic.

Estacada looked like a riot call yesterday when the banks of the Clackamas at that resort were thronged with policemen and hundreds of civilians. If any stranger had found it necessary to inquire about it all, he would have been told the gathering was purely for the annual outing of the Portland policemen's band.

Four electric trainloads of people went from Portland, the sunny, cool day alluring hundreds. At noon, a big picnic dinner was held and afterward there were games, dancing, boating and luxurious idling. Chief of all the diversions, however, was the concert given by the band, which played for several hours.

In the afternoon, the committee on athletic contests, of which H. C. Bales was chairman, gave its program. Mrs. H. H. Stark won the first prize in the married women's race, with Mrs. James Bewley winning second. H. C. Bales won the first prize in the free-for-all men's race. The 15-year-old daughter of Patriman J. B. White won the first prize for entrants in the girls' race. J. Taylor won the fat men's race, Jack Lucky won the potato race, while several boys competed for the minor prizes. Most of the policemen had to hurry back to town because the call of duty summoned them to the beat. And so, at about 9:30 o'clock, the last blue coat was back in Portland and was swinging his club on some lonely street corner a few hours later, just as if there had been no big doings along the Clackamas.

HILLSBORO WILL HAVE PURE MOUNTAIN WATER

Hillsboro and Beaverton will have pure mountain water piped to the homes within the next 60 or 90 days. The water will come from Saine creek through large iron pipes, for which the trenches are now being dug. The pipe line will be about 30 miles long and the installation of the gravity system will involve an expenditure of about \$60,000.

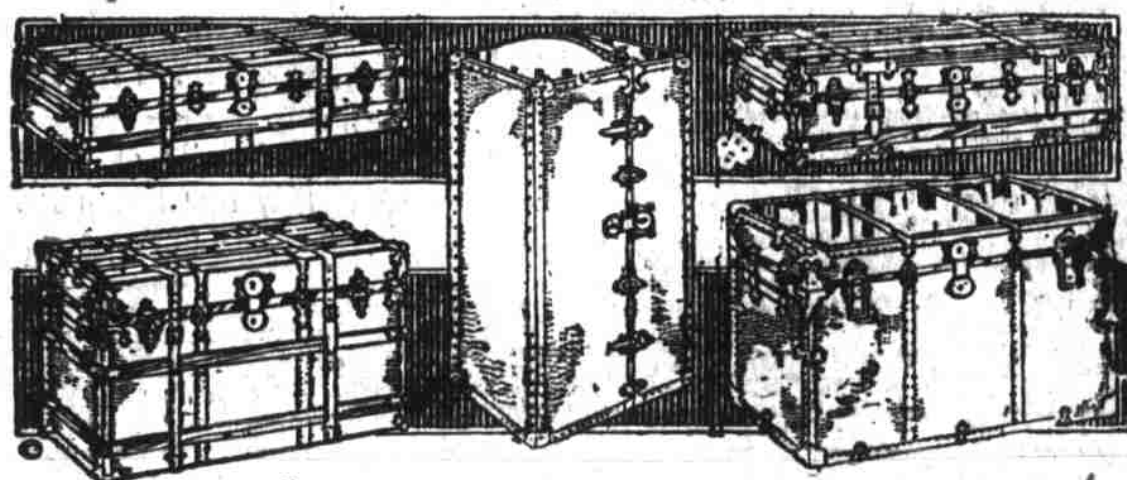
