

TELEGRAM TO HOUSE, REPUBLICANS PEEVED

When Kahn Offers Resolution Asking for It, Attorney General Sends It Over.

Washington, July 29.—Chairman Clayton of the house judiciary committee yesterday presented a report recommending the tabling of the third resolution introduced by Representative Kahn of California, which alleged that Attorney General McReynolds had postponed the Diggs-Cammett white slave case before Secretary of Labor Wilson requested the postponement.

Attorney General McReynolds "beat Kahn to it" by sending the judiciary committee a telegram, dated May 16, asking John L. McNabb, former United States district attorney at San Francisco, to take no further affirmative action in the case until further notice.

The Republicans are severe in their criticism of the attorney general. Caustic comment over the tabling of his resolution was voiced by Representative Kahn.

"It is evidently necessary," said Kahn, "to whitewash the action of the attorney general. Why the president saw fit to censure and scold John McNabb, former United States district attorney at San Francisco, and at the same time adopt a policy of proceeding promptly with the Diggs-Cammett and Western Fuel cases, passes all comprehension."

"If McNabb did right in insisting on early trial of the cases and the president and Attorney General McReynolds now adopt his views by insisting that the cases be tried promptly, why should McNabb be censured? If an insidious political pull is being used to cause the attorney general to order a postponement of the cases, why should the blame fall on the shoulders of McReynolds? Instead of being blamed and condemned, McNabb should have been commended."

NO CONSOLIDATION OF O.-W.-R. & N. CO. AND SHORT LINE DISCUSSED

President Mohler Declares the Proposition Has Never Been Contemplated.

President A. L. Mohler of the Union Pacific railway denies that the matter of consolidating the managements of the O.-W.-R. & N. and the Oregon Short Line with that of the parent system has ever been contemplated.

"The matter has never been discussed, and so far as I know never thought of," said Mr. Mohler this morning, "and besides I don't think it would be practical. Rumors to the effect that such consolidation would be made in the near future have been circulated at various times during the past six months."

JURY FREES WOMAN WHO KILLED SLAVER

Los Angeles Society Woman Gives Mrs. Delmont Refuge in Home.

Los Angeles, July 29.—Free of all responsibility for killing the man who she says compelled her for years to lead an immoral life, Mrs. Leah Delmont walked out of a coroner's inquest room today with the congratulations of the jurors still ringing in her ears, climbed into the automobile of Mrs. Charles Wellington Rand, a wealthy society woman, and rolled away to begin a new life.

After Mrs. Delmont had told the jurors a story that brought tears to their eyes, the verdict that freed the woman was returned immediately. In a body, the jurors rushed to her and seized her hands or patted her shoulders reassuringly while they commended her act.
