Aged Man Becomes Citizen.—After 62 years of allegiance to the monarch of Great Britain, Rev. Frederick Harvey, now residing at Redmond, Or., appeared in the United States court this morning to declare his intention of renouncing King George and becoming a citizen of the United States. Mr. Harvey, who was born in Ipswich, England, moved to Canada a number of years ago, but after his children moved into the United States, decided he, too, would emigrate. Even at his time of life, he told court clerks, he felt it his duty to become a legal citizen of the land of his adoption.

Arleta-Parent Teachers Meeting.—A special meeting of the Arleta Parent-Teachers' circle will be held Friday afternoon in the assembly hall of the school, for the purpose of considering a revision of the constitution. At the last meeting it was decided to change the constitution in order that the club members may devote their time to making the school the social and civic center of the community. All standing committees for the ensuing year will be appointed at this meeting. All members are urged to be present.

Penalties Inflicted on Policemen.—The action of Chief of Police Clark in removing C. T. Baksey from the police department was yesterday endorsed by Mayor Albee, as was the \$15 fine assessed against Patrolman Dan Kelleher. Kelleher was charged with drinking while on duty. Patrolman Richards who absented himself from his station at Third and Morrison streets for two hours three weeks ago is to be reprimanded.

Awarded \$750 Damages.—John Perlus, an employee of the Portland Lumber company, was awarded a verdict of \$750 against that concern in Circuit Judge Gaten's court yesterday afternoon. Perlus, who sued for \$30,000, was injured in the back by being drawn by cogs against a heavy machine in action.

Steals Cage of Birds.—A stranger, 40 years old, with a full beard, stole a cage of birds from 589 Washington street, this morning, later trying to sell them to the owner. When he discovered the customer owned the birds, the man dropped the cage and ran away. The cage was hanging in front of the place.

Boy Speeders Caught.—Four youthful motorcycle riders were arrested yesterday by Patrolman Coulter for speeding. They are Arthur Betelski, Martin Peterson, Byron Dooling and Francis Brandon. Each rider was under 18 years of age, therefore, was taken before the juvenile court.

DALLES BOX FACTORY BURNS; LOSS \$10,000

Cigarette of Tramp May Have Started Fire That Is Hard on Fruit Packers.

(Special to The Journal.)
The Dalles, Or., July 30.—The plant of The Dalles Box and Lumber company, located near the old O. W. R. & N. company's depot, was completely destroyed by fire last night, entailing a loss of \$10,000, with insurance amounting to \$3000. A residence adjoining, belonging to Nat Garman, was also burned.
The destruction of the box factory at this season when the plant was running at full capacity will be a loss hard to estimate to the fruit packers and owners alike. The plant was owned jointly by Edward Kurtz, R. G. Sellinger, O. H. Hawley and Lee Moon of this city.
Fire was first seen enveloping the shavings bin at the north of the main plant and was soon beyond control. It began at 2 a. m. and is still burning this morning. It is supposed to have been started by the dropping of a cigarette by some tramp, a number of whom have been seen in the vicinity lately.
The company's office in a nearby building and lumber yards were saved.

WHEN THE NAVY COMES

"Boon, boon, boom."

It is the sunset gun, re-echoing from the rock walls of the Columbia and the timbered hillsides of the Willamette. "Ta-ra-ra."

It is the bugle, rich and sweet, that summons the jack tars to the deck. And from many vessels in the United States navy, stationed at intervals from Portland out into the broader and greater river, rises the stars and stripes, with flags waving signals from ship to ship, all down the line to the rear convoy.

This will be what Portland will have next April when Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels fulfills his promise, uttered Monday night at the Commercial club dinner.

New Yorkers and other easterners saw the fleet last fall when the entire strength of the navy was mobilized in the Hudson river. From the Battery far up beyond the Palisades this mighty fighting flotilla extended.

At nightfall, the ships were illuminated from waterline throughout the superstructure. Excursion boats by the hundred carried thousands of visitors along the line of the ships, and from the lofty boulevard known as Riverside Drive, the whole navy could be taken in with one sweep of the eye.

Such a picture will be seen by Oregonians. With the difference that New York has seen the ships before and to the people of Oregon the sight will be the more vast because it will be so new.

In the New York mobilization, the dreadnaughts, battleships and cruisers found anchor in the middle of the channel, stationed at almost uniform distances. Flanking them on either side were the torpedo boat destroyers and the myriad small craft that act as auxiliary to the greater boats.

Visitors thronged the ships every afternoon at stated hours when the public was admitted. Courteous lieutenants and broad-shouldered gunners explained what every part of the ship was for, what it cost to fire a gun, how the man on the bridge could control the man deep in the engine room, how the waving of a flag on one vessel was read as a signal on another.

And so, next spring, launches from Portland will take their cargoes of visitors to the same fleet in the great harbor of the west. The same questions will be asked and answered on ship. The same guns will sound at sunset, the same nimble jacks will spring to their places beside the guns when the same bugles about the signal.

It will be a great thing, though it were not a new thing, that Oregon will look upon.

Secretary Daniels has promised it. The Panama canal is the agency.

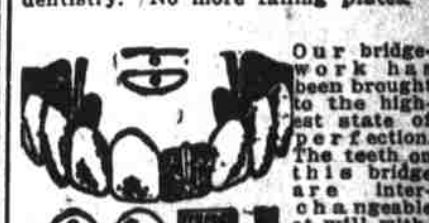
