United States Examinations.—The United States civil service commission announces that on August 18, the following examinations will be held in this city: For the position of chief, office of information (male), in the department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., at \$3,000 per annum; for the position of radio subinspector (male), in the navy yard, New York, at \$4 to \$6 per diem; radio electrician (male), in the navy yard, New York, at \$4.48 per diem; for the position of assistant in crop and animal husbandry in the department of agriculture, from \$240 to \$1,200 a year; for the position of laboratory aid in horticulture (male) in the department of agriculture at \$7.20 a year; for the position of laboratory aid in physics (male) in the department of agriculture from \$600 to \$720 a year, and for the position of assistant preparator in paleontology (male) in the national museum, Washington, D. C., at \$600 per month. Persons desiring to compete in these examinations should apply to Z. A. Leigh, postoffice department.

Forest Service Issues Road Map.—Helping along the campaign of education marked out by the United States forest service, a new map of the forests of Oregon has just been issued and is being distributed to anyone who wants one. The map shows every road, trail, cabin, railroad, school house, meadow, store, ditch, hotel, stage station, electric road, ranger's station and forest service tool house in the whole territory covered, which is furnished for the guidance of travelers and pleasure seekers. That the lesson of obedience to laws of state and nation and the regulations to prevent fires may not be overlooked, the back of the map is devoted to a summary of the game laws, the rules for campers, the regulations against pollution of streams and other matters for the information of those who enter the forests. Other maps covering other forest areas will be issued from time to time.

New City Jail Not Ready.—Chief of Police Clark and Captain John Moore yesterday made an inspection of the new city jail. They report today that the building will not be completed and ready for occupancy before October 10. The delay is occasioned by reason of the contract for the cells not being let. The bids were solicited, but it was later learned an appropriation had not been made to cover the expense. The city now is paying \$250 a month rental for the temporary quarters on Fifth and Everett streets. Considerable complaint has been made by members of the department and the public in general over using this building. There is also a general criticism of the amount of rent paid, as the building was unoccupied for 14 months before the department entered it, the last tenant paying \$200 a month rent.

HUSBAND CARRIES GUN
TO CONFERENCE WITH
WIFE; BOTH ARE DEAD

When Dora Ingle Declines to Return to Fred Ingle, Out Comes Deadly Pistol.

Salem, Or., July 31.—Fred Ingle and his estranged wife, Dora Ingle, met in a lawyer's office here yesterday afternoon to settle certain property rights incident to a divorce suit. Now, both are dead because Ingle carried a pistol with him to the meeting. He murdered his wife and shot himself.

The double tragedy occurred in the presence of Miss Renka Swart of this city, a lifelong friend of Mrs. Ingle. Mr. and Mrs. Ingle and Miss Swart had been left for a few minutes alone in the library used by John D. Turner in connection with his law offices in the United States National bank building. Ingle asked his wife to step with him into a secluded part of the room where they could talk alone. She declined, telling him there was nothing for them to talk about. He edged around until a bookcase was between him and Miss Swart, and then he began to plead with his wife to drop the divorce suit and return to him. She told him she had stood his cruelty as long as she could, and that all was over between them.

Miss Swart says she then saw him grab his wife as she passed and he would shoot her. He fired three shots, one of which entered his wife's head just above the ear. Then he put the gun to his own head and pulled the trigger. She was killed instantly, and he died within a brief time after he was rushed to the Willamette sanitarium.

Mrs. Ingle was a native of Woodburn, where her mother, Mrs. M. Bradley, now lives. She was 28 years old, and her husband was about 35. They were married 10 years ago, and have no living children. She had two brothers in Portland, Dave and Herbert Bradley, and a sister, Mrs. Claude Dunn, at Dallas.

Ingle was employed as agent for the Wells-Fargo Express company at Woodburn for a number of years. After that the couple lived for a time in Lents, then in Lincoln county, and finally moved to Corvallis several months ago, where he was employed in a grocery store. About a month ago she left him and returned to her mother in Woodburn. Immediately after she filed a suit for divorce.

Arrangements were made by the lawyers, John D. Turner, representing Mr. Ingle, and W. S. McFadden of Corvallis, representing Mrs. Ingle, for the couple to meet at Turner's offices yesterday afternoon to settle certain property rights before the divorce suit went to trial.

Mrs. Ingle was accompanied to the office by Miss Swart.

Mr. Turner states that the group talked over the property matters, and that neither the husband nor the wife displayed any anger. After a time the two women and Ingle were left in the library while the lawyers entered Turner's private office to draw up a stipulation regarding the property. Turner says he thinks the shooting occurred within 15 minutes after the couple were left in the room.

Miss Swart says that for a long time Mrs. Ingle had been afraid of her husband, and that since leaving him he followed her to Dallas and frightened her by trying to force a meeting. She said that when Mrs. Ingle left him she carried black and blue marks on her arms and body where he had struck her.

Corvallis People Blame Ingle.

Corvallis, Or., July 31.—The body of Fred Ingle arrived here this morning and will be buried tomorrow. Ingle bore a good reputation here with the exception of his attention to other women and his treatment of his wife. He was employed in a local store until two weeks ago. His father, John Ingle, is one of the wealthiest men in this city. People here ascribe Ingle's domestic troubles to his own action entirely.

a caravan built in 1776. Mrs. Susan Walker Fitzgerald of the Massachusetts Political Equality union, who recently led a campaign of the New England states and Mrs. Frank M. Roessing, president of the Pennsylvania suffragists.

While the demonstration was ostensibly for the purpose of presenting petitions urging action during the present session of congress, the real object of today's "request" was far more serious. The national leaders of the movement now court their "strength in congress" as nearly double that of a year ago. There are 18 senators from suffrage states, two from Illinois, which has partial suffrage, and a dozen from nonsuffrage states who are favorable to their cause. Among the latter are Senators Hollis and Gallinger of New Hampshire, La Follette of Wisconsin, Clapp of Minnesota, Owen of Oklahoma and even the ultra conservative Penrose of Pennsylvania. In the house the friends of woman suffrage are legion. Several members of the cabinet are known to favor woman suffrage and a majority of the "cabinet ladies" have openly expressed favor of the cause.

Ringo's Motion Meets Resistance.

Salem, Or., July 31.—Attorney General Crawford is going to resist the motion filed by Attorney E. R. Ringo yesterday to have set aside the order of the circuit court making Wilfred S. Farrell a party defendant in the workmen's compensation referendum suit. The attorney general says that no complications need arise from Farrell being

made a defendant in the suit, but that this gives Farrell an opportunity to defend the legality of the referendum petition. The motion will be argued before Judge Galloway tomorrow.
