

CHAMBERLAIN TO RUN FOR U. S. SENATOR AGAIN, SAYS FRIEND

Portland Attorney Declares He Is Not Opposed to Pending Tariff Measure as Quoted.

United States Senator George B. Chamberlain will be a candidate for reelection. This statement was made today by Samuel White, attorney who has just returned from an eastern visit of three weeks.

Mr. White went east on personal business, taking a day or two to visit his two sons, one of whom is a law student in the University of Virginia. He also spent two days at the national capital. "I don't see the president," said Mr. White. "I arrived in Washington Thursday night. Friday was cabinet day and Saturday was the president's day off. I found both senators from Oregon very busy with the duties of their position. During sessions of the senate they are always in their seats and the remainder of the day they are occupied with matters of routine."

Powers, a secret agent of the treasury department, that an effort had been made to bribe him to keep his testimony from being used in the Western Fuel company cases. He is asserted to have charged that \$50,000 was offered, and to have stated that an officer, whose name he gave, mentioned the bribe.

I think the president should have some economical or national revenue investigation, the main object of which is the underlying cause of this annual stringency, and then prepare a bill striking at the root of the evil."

"I told the president that, if necessary, we would back additional legislation onto the tariff bill as an amendment to secure immediate action." "Discussion of what he termed an 'impendent panic' and prediction of the extinction of the wool and sheep industry if a tariff bill is passed by congress, was voiced in the senate by Senator Catron of New Mexico. "Only a law allowing the issuance of \$500,000,000 in emergency currency, 'I declared.' 'I declared' the worst features of the panic from which we suffered in 1904 and 1905 if this bill is enacted."

"I will mean the destruction of great industries, throw hundreds of thousands of men out of work, and result in a condition as can be imagined. Nothing can prevent a money stringency if the bill is passed. "It is safe to say that 150,000 employees in the sheep raising industry and three-quarters of the 60,000 employees of woolen manufacturers will be discharged if the measure is enacted into law."

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FEDERAL AUTHORITIES SEIZE AMMUNITION

Customs Men Get 410,000 Rounds Intended for Mexican Federals.

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RUSSIA ALSO REFUSES TO SHOW AT FRISCO

Austria Will Send Commission to Investigate Character of Exposition.

(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Petersburg, Aug. 1.—It was announced today that Russia has declined not to participate in the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco in 1915. No official explanation was given. Germany still doubtful. Berlin, Aug. 1.—It was officially announced today at the ministry of the interior that it has not yet been decided whether Germany will participate in the 1915 exposition at San Francisco. Final decision, it was stated, on the matter, has been postponed for one month.

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PORTLAND SHOE MAN DROWNS IN UMPQUA

H. E. Smith Is Lost During Attempt to Ford Stream Near Kellogg, Or.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oakland, Or., Aug. 1.—H. E. Smith, dealer in shoe findings at 244 Yamhill street, Portland, was drowned in the Umpqua river at Kellogg, Or., yesterday afternoon while fording the river during a hunting trip. He was accompanied in the trip by Lee A. Wells, a dentist with office in the Dakum building, Portland, and Willis Mack, a Portland resident. No inquest will be held although Coroner Jewett of Douglas county came from Roseburg to Oakland to inquire into the circumstances of the drowning.

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KELLER STILL REAL CAPTAIN OF POLICE

Reduced Temporarily, but Order Is Rescinded; Must File Charges.

Joseph K. Keller is still captain of police and may be for some time to come. For less than an hour yesterday afternoon he was technically reduced to the position of sergeant and assigned to a district on the east side on the second night relief.

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Referring to a fear expressed by some that Senator Chamberlain's position would be weakened by the pending tariff bill, Mr. White said there need be no cause for comment.

It was his impression that while the bill in some minor points was not fully satisfactory, Mr. Chamberlain realized that it was the best tariff bill that could be framed, considering the conditions always surrounding tariff matters.

Speaking of affairs at Washington Mr. White said: "The absorbing topics were tariff, currency, the lobby investigation, and the Mexican situation."

The Houghton county bridge was heavily guarded today as a result of a reported plot to dynamite the structure. A quantity of dynamite has been stolen from magazines near Houghton, and reports that large quantities of dynamite had been smuggled into Calumet recently for a campaign of destruction. The reports are generally discredited.

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Two butchers out of the large number of meat market men in Portland attended a conference held by City Health Officer Marcellus this morning relative to the new sanitary ordinance. The meeting was held for the purpose of acquainting those handling meat with the provisions of the act regarding the covering up of all meats and the methods of handling the same.

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
