

LYDD-GEORGE VICTIM OF HOAX PLAYED BY HOSTESS, LADY MOND

She Dresses as Suffragette
and Attacks Him on Golf
Links; Chancellor Terrified.

(United Press Local Wire.)
London, Aug. 1.—Society and official circles are laughing heartily today over the hoax played by the hostess, Lady Mond, on the chancellor, Lloyd George, at the golf links. Although the chancellor's tormentors were not the real article, he got a rare fright, and several Scotland Yard men who winked at the hostess have been severely reprimanded.

The suffragettes have been on Lloyd George's trail for the past three years, and he never goes anywhere without a bodyguard of plain clothes men. When the other day he received an invitation to the golf links, he was not at all surprised to find that the hostess, Lady Mond, was the same woman who had been so successful in her previous attempts to make Lloyd George's life a misery.

She dresses as a suffragette, and attacks him on the golf links. The chancellor is terrified.

suffragettes the excuse for a practical joke. So she enlisted the aid of a boomer friend who readily entered into the conspiracy, and the two donned wigs, spectacles and other inartistic attire, lined their faces with paint and armed themselves with suffragette literature and hammers.

They then trailed the chancellor to the golf links, but while they were skulking behind some bushes they were spotted by the detectives who demanded to know their business.

"We are visitors invited by Sir Alfred Mond," declared Lady Mond.

"When were you invited?" demanded Scotland Yard severely.

"Nineteen years ago," promptly responded the mistress of the estate, naming the date of her marriage to Sir Alfred.

She proves her identity.

But as the detectives were skeptical, Lady Mond, fearing that her plan would be spoiled, took off her wig, disclosed her identity and explained the joke.

"Oh, all right," said the grinning officers, raising their caps and subsiding into the scenery to enjoy the fun.

Just as Lloyd George was driving off from a tee, Lady Mond and her companions rushed out brandishing a banner and their hammers and shouting "Votes for women! Women are suffering while you are indifferent!"

White with apprehension and anger, the chancellor swung around and said: "I'm here to play golf and not to talk politics."

Lady Mond could not repress a giggle, and Lloyd George, taking a good look at her, finally penetrated the disguise. For a moment he seemed inclined to give her a good shaking but his sense of humor triumphed and he joined his hostess in a roar of laughter.

But the suffragettes are such a sore point with him that only Lady Mond's greater ease than against Vancouver and

brigade post, which reads:

"Strategic—Vancouver is the natural landing point for assembly or distribution of the northwestern defensive land forces. Railway lines, river transportation, telegraph and telephone connections make this place the supreme center for concentration and direction of any military operations."

"Puget sound might be occupied by an enemy, and yet if the Columbia river remained in American control, the northwestern main population and property would be secure through the ease with which defensive work could be directed from Vancouver, and the pocketing in the Puget sound basin possible even after its occupancy by a large force. On the other hand, it is conceded by the most competent military authorities that with Portland and Vancouver occupied by an enemy, the entire northwestern except Puget sound could be ravaged at will through the ease with which the attacking columns could be sent through the Columbia basin and all of western Oregon."

Sound more vulnerable.

"An attack from the sea may be delivered against Puget sound with far greater ease than against Vancouver and

Portland, owing to the broader waters of the straits and sound. So ramified are the waters of the sound, so broad the inlets, so numerous the shores, that an attacking force could find landing anywhere there.

"No extensive is this island shore line that no feasible land force could ever protect it from the sea. Only by having sufficient naval forces in these waters, supplemented by heavy guns, is any fair protection possible."

"No force that will ever be held in a brigade garrison would be sufficient to defend all the points that would have to be manned there. In distributing a brigade for defense of the several heavy fortifications, its strength would be so scattered as to make it a quick prey for any small, organized body under naval convoy. It has been repeatedly declared impractical for such brigade defense to be maintained in the northwestern to fairly protect the scattered fortifications of the sound. Only a naval defense will meet requirements there."

"At present the sole naval strength of the government in northwestern waters is kept on Puget sound. To balance the protective forces, the army should be placed on the Columbia. No landing or naval force could reach the brigade shorehouses and supplies here, except after a hazardous and not likely to be undertaken until the northwest is overrun."

Economic Value Shown.

"All the shore line of Oregon to the south of the Columbia and both Grays Harbor and Willapa Harbor are more easily protected by land forces from the Columbia than from Fort Lawton. All the northwestern national guard forces could be mustered at Portland more economically, quickly and safely than upon Puget sound. Alaska is not being protected in any scheme of land defenses pursued, and will have to rely upon the navy, the north Pacific garrison of which is on Puget sound. Only a

few soldiers are kept in Alaska, so that from an administrative viewpoint that territory need not be seriously considered.

"Economic—Portland must be accepted as the natural permanent trade center of the northwest, where all local produce and commodities may be had more cheaply than elsewhere. This is inevitable."

"Completion of the Celilo canal will give an open river to the very heart of the entire Columbia basin early in 1915. Then boat lines will give commodity rates along the river which no railway hauling across the mountains can ever maintain."

"These rates will compel northwestern produce and inbound traffic to follow the river courses. Then wheat, oats, barley, hay and food products will be more easily transported to the coast of the northwest than from the port. Lumber now sells on an average for a less figure here than on Puget sound."

Greatest Savings Assured.

"Most all of the army supplies, both commissary and quartermaster, for the northwestern military forces, are secured in this territory, and as a rule sold for less here than on Puget sound, even now. With open bids, no collusion and the big firms called upon to bid for consumption here, the greatest economy is assured at Vancouver now."

"There can be no question about the largest transports of the Pacific passing in and out of the Columbia at will within another year or two. The north jetties must give 35 feet of water or more at low tide. Dredging is now being done, and will be pressed on a much larger scale if beneficial, to get deep water pending completion of the north jetties."

"At present tramp steamships drawing 34 to 37 feet of water pass out with cargoes. Some delay is occasioned at times, but not often. Within another year or two all transport service re-

quired for a brigade post, and all connection with the Philippines and the Orient may be had as readily and freely from this port as from any other of the Pacific."

Furthermore, the Columbia will soon be admitting any naval force that may be needed in connection with the land forces, and now accommodates readily the high-chase armored cruisers.

Center of Great Region.

"There is but 3000 or 3500 feet remnant of the Columbia bay between the 30 foot contour lines at present, and whatever dredging work or other improvement is needed to break down this slight barrier will be pressed with the utmost vigilance and persistence until the Columbia admits any craft trying to enter in perfect safety."

Vancouver is in the heart of the greatest productive region of the entire Pacific. Everything is grown in the valleys leading down to it. The chief livestock section of the west is rapidly being developed, with the premier packing plant of the west now operating near. Fruits, vegetables, wool, dairy products, poultry and everything that an army could ask except a few manufactured articles abound and will pass the brigade post site on the greatest rivers of the west. No more perfect site from an economical study could be secured in all the west. Every guarantee within the realm of human certainty is had of the completeness and adequacy of navigation conditions for not only reaching the sea but the entire interior."

To Arraign Dr. Walker.

San Francisco, Aug. 1.—Dr. Archibald M. Walker, recently brought here from Portland, will be arraigned tomorrow before Police Judge Shortall on a charge of embezzlement preferred by Mrs. Ida Smith. The woman alleges she gave Walker \$546 with which to buy mining stocks for her, and that the securities were never purchased.

HOBOS, CAST OFF TRAIN, WRECK SECTION HOUSE

Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 1.—Thrown from an O.V.W. R. & N. train on which they were stealing a ride along the Columbia river Wednesday evening, five men became peeved and walked down the track to a section house where they proceeded to throw everything that was not nailed down into the river. An employee of the railroad appeared upon the scene with a shotgun and herded the men together, holding them while a deputy sheriff was being notified. One man escaped and the other four were brought to this city for hearing.
