

### BUILDER OF FIREBOAT DECLARES FAULT LIES ENTIRELY WITH CREW

Says David Campbell Showed  
Excess Proficiency in All  
Its Tryouts.

Following delayed service at the Fisher, Thorsen fire, and delayed action and an accident at the steel bridge blaze, the new fire boat David Campbell, again failed to make good when called last night to a fire which threatened the Western Mantle works, 23 Front street.

Criticism of the new boat has become so general that A. F. Smith, president and general manager of the Smith Watson Iron Works company, which built the craft, visited her this morning, and made a cursory examination to determine the source of the trouble.

Following the examination, Mr. Smith said he is satisfied that the failure of the boat to perform up to expectations, and the form set at its trial trip, is due to the inexperience and inefficiency of the crew, rather than to any defect in the boat itself.

**Made Good Showing.**  
"On her trial trip," said Mr. Smith, "the Campbell performed easily at a point of efficiency 10 or 15 per cent beyond specifications. It follows that the boat can be made to do the same on all occasions, but it likewise follows that to get results from the machinery, there must be men on hand capable of handling it."

"A system of discipline and practice should be inaugurated on the Campbell. Each man should be made thoroughly familiar with every part of the boat, so that when time for action comes there will be no delay or doubt in doing the right thing."

"It is essential, if the Campbell is to give the results of which it is capable, that drills be held regularly on board, so that there will be no delays in time of actual service. There have been several minor accidents to the boat, which have been caused solely by the inability of its crew to handle the drills held regularly on board, and it is made to do in emergencies what she did on her trial."

**Builder Only Installed Pumps.**  
"As a matter of fact, the engines and turbines, which have been largely responsible for the delays in getting water started, were purchased by the city direct from the manufacturer, and were only installed by us, but the pumps are first class at that and will do the work if properly manned. It is not to be expected that a crew should go from the old fireboat to the new one and get the best results. The boat is not at fault, and I am satisfied that an investigation will result in findings of inefficiency and lack of experience on the part of the crew."

Mr. Smith contends that were regular drills held aboard the boat any shortcomings among the members of the crew or any inefficiency would be determined during such drills, so that necessary changes might be made in preparation for actual duty.

**Will Accompany Body of Her Fiance East**

Deceased had made a recent visit with her at Boise in making final plans for the wedding.

**Counterfeiter Arrested.**  
Deputy United States Marshal John Taiter went to Albany today to bring to Portland L. F. Norris, arrested by Secret Service Operative William Glover on a charge of counterfeiting. Glover has been on Morris' trail for some time, finally locating him near Corvallis.

Lyman complained that his trial is being delayed and that he is compelled to live on breakfast food.

Jailers deny the latter allegation, declaring that heaping platters of solid food sent to Lyman's cell always remain empty. Furthermore, they say, his molars are normal.

challenged by Special Prosecutor Matt I. Sullivan for the government.

The defense, to some extent at least, indicated that it would rely on this prejudice against the Mann act, as it was revealed today, particularly when Attorney Coghlan, interrogating for the defense, protested the allowance of the challenge in the case of Brilliant.

The ground that the white slave act was passed to prevent the transportation of women for purposes of commercial vice, it seemed apparent, would be the main reliance of the defense attorneys.

For the first time a number of young girls, jauntily and boldly drifting into the court room, grating forward eagerly in anticipation of sensational details and casting surreptitious glances at Diggs and Coghlan.

When the afternoon session was resumed at 2 o'clock 11 men were in the jury box subject to two remaining peremptory challenges by the government and five by the defense. The examination of Lester Herrick, an accountant and the twelfth temporary juror in the box, was taken up.

Neither of the girls involved in the case, nor any member of either defendant's family was in the court room, save only the father of Diggs, who sat in the front row of the gallery.

Prosecutor Sullivan apparently attached importance to the fact that prospective jurors were members of social clubs, since most of those excused by him were under peremptory had such affiliations.

### GRAND JURY INQUIRES INTO REAL ESTATE DEAL

The county grand jury is investigating what District Attorney Walter H. Evans suspects is another real estate swindle in the alleged making of Mrs. Mary J. Flynn in a mortgage deal.

According to the complaint registered by Mrs. Flynn, and which is the basis for the investigation, she loaned \$2000 cash on the property known as lot 8, block 11, in the Hollywood addition. The deal was handled by the J. H. Tipton company, real estate dealers, and it is charged that in making out the mortgage papers, Mrs. Flynn was given a blank check for the same block and addition, which is unoccupied and worth, perhaps \$900.

An insurance policy, covering the house on lot 8 and transferred as part security on the mortgage, is said to have been obtained so that it would cover a house on lot 7, which does not exist. District Attorney Evans also has other documentary evidence bearing on the case in his possession which is being reviewed.

Mrs. Flynn is represented by the law firm of Beach, Simon & Nelson and the defendants in the contemplated action say that it was through a mistake made by members of this firm in drawing up the mortgage that lot 7 was named instead of lot 8. Attorney J. V. Beach, who is now out of the city, has been subpoenaed to testify before the grand jury.

### Jail Sentences for Cigar-men.

It was a jail sentence that Judge Stevenson of the municipal court this morning gave two cigar dealers for selling cigarettes to boys. Marcus Mancini, 314 East Seventh street, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Patrolman Aureo Dauberly, 18 years old. Mancini pleaded that he did not know the boy was under age. The judge sentenced Mancini to serve one day in jail. This day will be spent on the rockpile, Mancini being committed immediately. Louis Baldo was charged with selling cigarettes to Alf Peterson, another 18 year old lad. He, too, was sentenced one day for making the sale.

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### OIL COMPANY CLOSES ITS PORTLAND OFFICE

Reason Not Known by Local  
Manager; Rothschilds May  
Be Behind Action.

Whether or not the report is true that the Rothschilds have bought the Monarch Oil & Refining company, one of the largest independent oil concerns in America, it is a fact that the local office of the Monarch company is closed, and all the employees dismissed.

Telegraphic instructions were received here yesterday by T. O. Daley, local manager of the Monarch company, to cease all operations and dismiss the entire office force at once. The wire came from San Francisco, the head office, and was signed by George A. Douglas, one of the executive officers of the concern.

No reason was assigned, and the local people are completely in the dark as to the reason of the sudden upheaval. However, it is generally believed by the local Monarch people that the big concern has been sold, lock, stock and barrel, to the Rothschilds.

### CITY AUTHORITIES WILL BE ASKED TO ENFORCE

Tremont Station, Aug. 6.—At the meeting of the East Seventy-second Street, Southeast, Social and Improvement club last night a resolution was adopted favoring immediate action by the city authorities in enforcing the new weed cutting ordinance throughout this district. Thus far no attempt has been made to compel property owners to cut weeds from vacant lots.

A special committee, headed by L. Rosvall, chairman, was appointed to draft a set of resolutions favoring the weed cutting and present them to the city engineer today.

An active committee was appointed to agitate better water service in the district. The members of the club want the water department to install a 24-inch main in this district. At present the water pressure is so low that during the evening enough water cannot be obtained for watering the lawns. The members of the club feel that better water service should be given as a precaution against fire.

The committee will interview the city engineer again this week in an effort to have better service maintained.

The committee on parks and playgrounds reported that their petitions for parks and playgrounds were ready for circulation. The club members have formulated a plan to have a park and playground bond issue voted upon at the election this fall. The petition for a bond issue will state just where the money is to be spent and how much is to be spent in each district. L. Rosvall, chairman of the park committee, will take the matter before the next meeting of the Greater Side Improvement Clubs association at the next meeting to secure the indorsement of the parent organization.

Several other improvements were discussed but definite action was postponed until the next meeting. There was a good attendance by citizens from throughout the district.

### RIFLE TEAM KICKING FINAL PRACTICE WORK

The team of 15 Oregon National guardsmen who last week took their way to positions on the rifle team which will represent Oregon at Camp Perry, Ohio, national rifle meet next week, are putting in this week at final practice on the government rifle range, Clackamas, under the direction of Lieutenant F. C. Endicott of the regular army.

The boys are now using the guns which they will shoot at Camp Perry, these being regular army rifles sent out by the government for use only for the national meet. The team will leave Portland Saturday night over the Northern Pacific, and will be allowed a few days practice on the range at Camp Perry before the championship matches.

Lieutenant Endicott said yesterday that he is well pleased with the final practice scores being made by the militiamen and is confident that Oregon's record in the national meet will be one of which everyone may be proud. Practically all the states of the Union, as well as the several branches of the regular army service, will have teams entered in the Camp Perry matches.

### GOODNOUGH HAS RIGHT TO BID \$210,000 ON DOCK

A telegram from the San Francisco office of the Lewis A. Hickey company this morning said that W. P. Goodnough had authority to make the bid of \$210,000 for the construction of the first 663 feet of the west side public dock and that a certified copy of the resolutions giving him authority was being forwarded by mail. When the bid was submitted to City Attorney La Roche, he answered that while authority was given Goodnough to act in legal matters for the company, none was shown to empower him to make a bid for the construction of the dock. The dock commission then issued an order saying that if Goodnough did not produce his authority by the time of a meeting tomorrow the contract for the dock would be let to the next highest bidder, the Reliance Construction company at \$221,000.

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### MUNICIPAL HOSPITAL IS NOW SUGGESTED

Demand Made by Nurse As-  
sociation That City Pay  
for Care of Patients.

Demands are being made by the Visiting Nurse association to have the city engage a trained nurse to look after all cases of tuberculosis where city patients are concerned. Under the present plan these patients are being cared for by the association and that body has to pay the expenses of the charge.

The members of the association have taken the matter up with City Health Officer Marcelus with a view to having the commissioner help them, if possible. During the month of July, according to the report of the secretary of the organization, 72 cases were handled. Of this number 21 were tubercular. The association paid the expenses of these patients while under the care of the organization.

Plans may be made soon for the establishment of a municipal hospital to care for persons afflicted with the disease. There is no hospital in the city at the present time where such cases are handled.

Plans are being made by Will H. Daly, commissioner of public utilities, for an issuance of \$200,000 worth of bonds or public utility certificates, it has not been decided which, to insure the cost of a new incinerator. He also plans to sell \$75,000 worth of certificates for the establishment of a municipal garbage collection system. Both of these sales were authorized by the voters at the last election.

While only tentative plans have been made for an incinerator, it is probable when built it will be located on the east side. Several days will be necessary before final arrangements are made for the sale of the bonds and certificates.
