

HIRAM JOHNSON FINDS PRESIDENT WILSON IS WEAK AND VACILLATING

Says One Word From Roosevelt Is Worth an Army Under Wilson.

Los Angeles, Aug. 6.—Declaration that the national administration has not come up to expectations and criticism of its policies, voiced by Governor Hiram Johnson at a banquet celebrating the first anniversary of the birth of the Progressive party, are causing considerable discussion here today.

"We have a foreign policy that is weak and vacillating; one word from Roosevelt is worth an army under Wilson," the governor declared after expressing his general opinion of the administration.

Johnson paid his respects to Attorney General McReynolds and the president, declaring that what he called the recent whitewashing of the former differed in no essential from the "whitewashing of Secretary Baileigh by President Taft."

For Secretary Bryan the governor admitted a pronounced regard but intimated that Bryan possibly has forgotten the proverb that advises five things to be remembered when one speaks of whom you speak, to whom you speak and when and how and where. He added that he hopes never again to see the United States in the person of its secretary of state journeying across the continent "to lobby against legislation in the state of California."

The governor expressed satisfaction with the progress of the Progressive party and predicted its future greatness.

PIONEER RESIDENT OF OREGON DIES SUDDENLY

J. W. Shattuck, a resident of Oregon for 48 years, and formerly a captain in the confederate army under General Price, died from an attack of heart failure Monday morning at Welch's summer resort in Clackamas county, where he was visiting.

Mr. Shattuck came to Oregon from Missouri in 1865. He engaged in farming and resided at various times in Benton, Clackamas and Multnomah counties.

The family home is at Gresham, where a son, Lewis, now lives, although Mr. and Mrs. Shattuck have made their home with their daughter, Mrs. Mary C. Short, 651 E. Seventh street south, for the last two years.

Mr. Shattuck was born in Peoria, Ill., March 18, 1834. He married Elizabeth, March 18, 1854. Mrs. Shattuck was the daughter of W. F. Allen, one of the earliest settlers of East Portland. Mr. Shattuck is survived by a widow and the following children:

Stanford Youth Insane on Subject of Fraternities; Otherwise O. K.

Palo Alto, Cal., Aug. 6.—After terrorizing the Stanford university community for several hours yesterday, Fred Horkey, member of a wealthy San Diego family and a former student of the university of California, is again confined today in the insane ward of Agnew state hospital, from which he escaped Monday night. Horkey was attempting to gain entrance to fraternity and sorority houses here when captured.

Horkey told the officers that he made the trip from Agnew to Stanford in his night clothes, but was fully dressed when arrested. He seems to be rational on every subject except that of fraternities, and says he has obtained a special dispensation from the Supreme Being to organize a secret society at Agnew.

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OIL MILLIONAIRE AND FLOWER GIRL SOUGHT

C. V. Hall and His Ward, Mlle. Seutans, Disappear; Immigration Men Watch.

Los Angeles, Aug. 6.—After weeks devoted to the collection of facts concerning the disappearance in this country of Mlle. Rita Seutans, a beautiful Parisian flower girl, who is the ward of Charles Victor Hall, a millionaire oil man, immigration inspectors are trying today to locate the couple.

Hall and his ward disappeared from Los Angeles shortly after Mrs. Hall was granted a divorce after a suit in which the pretty French girl figured conspicuously. Hall's attorney, E. A. Meserve, declared that he knows the whereabouts of Hall and Mlle. Seutans, and that, upon Mrs. Hall's receipt of her absolute decree, they will return to Los Angeles as man and wife. He refused to reveal their refuge to the authorities.

REPENTANT BURGLAR RETURNS CASH BOX STOLEN 3 YEARS AGO

The burglar who stole G. M. Hyland's treasure box three years ago has become conscience-stricken. The box, one of the ordinary metal ones used in offices for holding small cash, did not contain financial wealth as he supposed and hoped, but in it were stored a number of trinkets and papers that Hyland valued highly for sentimental reasons. Among other things, and perhaps the most valuable to the burglar, was the first dollar Mr. Hyland received from his father.

Three years ago, when Mr. Hyland lived at Sixteenth and Halcyon streets, the unknown burglar one night stole quietly into the house and got away with the box. Mr. Hyland had no thought of ever having the good fortune to again become possessor of the relics.

The other night, however, he was awakened by a strange noise in the vicinity of the house. He paid no particular attention, but the following morning was pleasantly surprised to find the old treasure box on a shelf in the garage, adjoining his new home at Sixteenth and Tillamook. A window to the garage had been pried open and the box deposited with all of its contents, including the almost dollar, practically undisturbed.

BALKAN STATES WON'T GIVE RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Bucharest, Aug. 6.—Peace delegates from the warring Balkan states, in session here, showed no disposition to reconsider their rejection of a request by the United States that their peace treaty, when completed, contain a guarantee of civil and religious liberty throughout the territory affected. The plea was contained in a note from the American state department and is construed here to be an effort on behalf of the Jews.

The American action was not known until delegate Majoresco read the American note.

Albany Men Will Tour Alaska. Albany, Aug. 6.—Leaving yesterday, Gale S. Hill, district attorney of the third judicial district; George Rolfe, manager of the Rolfe theatre; and C. D. Rauch, court stenographer, are on their way to Alaska, from which they will make an extended tour of the southwest section of the territory. They will be gone for a month.

DON'T EAT SHARKS, THEY ARE NOT WHOLESOME

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—While other cities raise howls about "sharks" of various kinds, they eat 'em in San Francisco. This interesting fact was

developed here today when Dr. W. Haason, city health officer, was interviewed regarding the possibility of the Seattle rotten meat scandal having a parallel here.

"There is practically no bad meat sold in this city," said Dr. Haason and then he exhibited various inspectors' reports on one of which the item ap-

peared "30 sharks condemned—unwholesome."

Explaining, the health officer said: "The shark item indicates that we contend with efforts to foment shark meat on the public. It is unwholesome, but some restaurants pass it off for sole or sea bass. The sharks used are

small ones, rarely weighing more than 40 pounds."

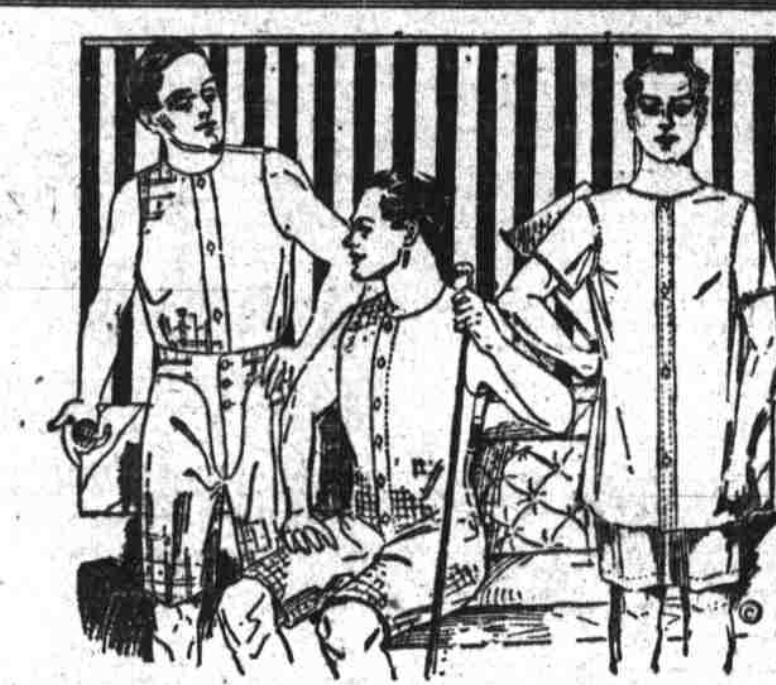
