

HERE'S SNAP FOR BOYS OF 17; BLUNDER SAVES THEM FROM PRISONS

Cannot Be Sent Either to Reform School or State Penitentiary.

(Herald Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Aug. 6.—An apparent blunder committed by the legislature leaves youths between the ages of 16 and 18 years immune from the authority of the courts to commit them either to the state reform school or the state penitentiary for any offense they may commit. There is a gap of two years between the ages persons may be committed to the two institutions.

A law, chapter 123 in the 1913 session laws, was passed by the legislature reducing the age limit at which boys may be committed to the reform school from 18 to 16 years. There is a law which says that no one under 18 years can be committed to the penitentiary. This leaves a gap of two years.

The question of what to do with boys 17 years old has already presented itself to the state board in the case of Crin Lacourse of Forest Grove. He is 17 years old and has been committed to the state training school. It appears the school has no authority to keep him. Superintendent Hale suggests that the school might take boys of this age by consent of their parents or guardians, but could not do so over their protest.

The gap was caused by the legislature passing one bill and failing to pass its companion measure. The other measure provided for a state reformatory for youths between the ages of 16 and 25 years.

**PEACE REIGNS AT SCENE
OF HOP FIELDS RIOT**

Wheatland, Cal., Aug. 6.—Adjutant General A. E. Forbes, with a company of militia remained on duty at Wheatland today, despite the fact that hundreds of hop pickers have left the fields. Peace reigns here after Sunday's rioting, and no further trouble is anticipated by the officers of the national guard.

The guardsmen have suppressed proposed mass meetings of strikers. Out of a possible 1800 workers, it is conservatively estimated that more than two thirds have left this vicinity.

Sheriff Voss and others who were wounded in the riot are recovering.

**SENDING MILITIA HOME
FROM CALUMET STRIKE**

Calumet, Mich., Aug. 6.—General Abner, commanding the state troops, is preparing today to remove a part of his force from the copper mining district, and expects an order to that effect this afternoon from Governor Ferris.

The sheriff of Houghton county is recruiting 600 deputies to aid the present deputies in guarding the mines when the troops leave.

Nurse Held for Doctor's Murder.
Utica, N. Y., Aug. 6.—Charged with the murder of Dr. Stanley E. Tron of Utica, formerly connected with the Lying-in hospital in New York, Miss Emma Krill, a nurse, is held without bail today at Cornwall-on-the-Hudson.

At the time of Dr. Tron's death it was believed he had killed himself with a drug. Miss Krill failed when arrested, and was revived with difficulty.

Vanderbilt Increases His Insurance.
Newport, R. I., Aug. 6.—Life insurance policies amounting to \$200,000 recently have been purchased by Reginald Vanderbilt. It was learned here today. The amount he previously carried, it is said, was less than \$50,000.

**WOMAN'S TESTIMONY
CONVICTS HOTEL MAN**

May Connors Admits Illegal Liquor Sales; Puts Blame on Samuel Coris.

"I wouldn't 'squeal,' judge, if this man had given me a decent deal, but he has allowed me to stay in jail while he went free. He's the one to blame, and now wants to place it on me."

This was the statement of May Connors this morning to Municipal Judge Stevenson in testifying against Samuel Coris, proprietor of the Minnesota rooming house on Third street. Coris was charged with selling liquor on Sunday, being arrested by Patrolmen Burk and Sherwood.

"I worked for him three weeks," testified the Connors woman. "He had me sell booze on Sunday and any other time that I could, always charging 50 cents a bottle. The officer came to the house Sunday and asked for a bottle. I sold him two bottles of beer for \$1. As I was getting the glasses Coris came in. He saw the officers there and in order to get out of the blame began abusing me by saying: 'I burglarized his room to sell beer against his wishes. After being arrested he then refused to furnish bail and let me stay in jail three days. It isn't fair, so I'll squeal.'"

Coris denied selling the liquor or having the girl there for that purpose. He claimed she burglarized his room for the beer, then put the money in her pocket. The judge fined him \$100. Attorney W. W. Banks represented Coris, asking the court time within which to perfect an appeal to the circuit court.

**U. R. WILL CHANGE
SCHEDULE AUG. 10**

For the purpose of making the service more convenient for its patrons, the schedule of the United Railways has been rearranged to become effective next Sunday, August 10. While the time of departure of nearly every train has been changed, the frequency of service will practically remain unchanged.

The first train out of Portland daily except Sunday will leave Twelfth and Flanders at 5:40 a. m. instead of 5:45 a. m. The next train, from Third and Stark, will leave at 6:15 a. m. as now. The schedule after that will be 7:30 instead of 7:15, 8:10 instead of 8:15, 9:10 instead of 9:15, 10:10 instead of 10:15, 11:20 instead of 11:15, 1:05 p. m. instead of 1:15, 2:15 same as now, but as far as Linnton only except Sundays, when it goes through to Burlington: 2:05 instead of 2:15, 4:10 instead of 4:15 to Linnton only, 6:10 instead of 6:15 (daily to Burlington), 6:10 instead of 6:15. The trains leaving daily at 7:45 and 11:35 p. m. daily and the 10 o'clock train on Saturday and Sunday will not be affected by the change.

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ACCUSE GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK OF KEEPING ACCOUNT IN WALL ST.

Legislative Committee Tries to Get Sulzer in Hole but Does Not Succeed First Time.

(United Press Lease Wire.)

New York, Aug. 6.—The Fraley state legislative committee, investigating various charges of malfeasance against Governor William Sulzer, made but little headway at today's session. Adjournment until tomorrow was taken after an attempt to show that Sulzer had an account with Fuller and Gray, Wall street brokers, during his campaign for the governorship, had failed.

Frederick Caldwell, on the witness stand, refused to answer when asked if Sulzer had maintained an account with the Wall street firm. He said the governor had had mail sent to the office and that he had heard of "account No. 500," but refused to say whether it belonged to Sulzer.

Melvin Fuller, a member of the firm, also refused to answer questions, asserting that his attorney had advised him that the committee had been illegally appointed. The committee announced its intention of seeking a court order to force both Caldwell and Fuller to answer questions.

Attorney Richards, for the committee, attacked the report of campaign contributions filed by Sulzer. Sulzer accounted for 68 contributions, with receipts aggregating \$5460. Richards introduced deposit slips with the Mutual Alliance Trust company purporting to show that Sulzer had deposits there aggregating \$12,000 from October 5 to November 12. Richards also introduced 94 checks, alleged to have been signed by the governor, totaling \$12,000.

Richards insisted that checks from Chairman William F. McCombs of the Democratic national committee, Henry Morgenthau and John Lynn, totaling \$2000, were not included in Governor Sulzer's list of contributions.

AUTO DRIVERS GIVEN ROCKPILE SENTENCES

Both Convicted of Traveling at High Speed; One in Crowded Streets.

F. W. Houghton, driver for an automobile agency, was sentenced this morning in the municipal court to serve five days on the rockpile for automobile speeding yesterday afternoon on Williams avenue.

Motorcycle Officer Coulter made the arrest. His testimony this morning was that Houghton was followed from Gering to Monroe streets. During part of this way the auto was going 50 miles an hour. S. G. Marion, 310 Third street, saw the speeding auto and testified the speed was unreasonably high.

Houghton testified he had been near Vancouver to get an automobile that had broken down. He said the machine was running on three cylinders, and at a rate of about 20 to 25 miles an hour, at no time being over the 25 mile limit.

W. E. Anderson, an auto salesman and driver, was sentenced yesterday to serve five days for speeding. Officers from the Automobile club were complaining witnesses against him. Evidence in his case showed Anderson had driven recklessly around the downtown streets, in many instances persons narrowly escaping injury. H. E. Couch, a druggist, signed his bond on appeal the case being taken to the circuit court. Anderson was held in the city jail until the bonds were filed.

Herbert Barde of Barde & Sons was fined \$20 for violating the traffic ordinance by driving his automobile past a streetcar while it was discharging passengers. Sergeant Lyons made the arrest.

**POLITICIAN IS ACCUSED
OF BEING LAZY HUSBAND**

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 6.—Louis R. Bedford, 31 years old, secretary treasurer of the Young Men's State Democratic league and candidate for the position of warden at McNeil's penitentiary, is under arrest under the "lazy husband" act. The complaint was sworn to by

his wife, Mrs. Iva Bedford, and her mother, Mrs. Dorothy Lee Bedford, formerly a resident of Tacoma, is charged with deserting his wife on August 2 and contributing no more than \$10 in the past two months for the support of his family, which includes four children, the oldest of whom is 10.

**MASSACHUSETTS FOREST
FIRE LOSS IS \$200,000**

Hyannis, Mass., Aug. 6.—Fifty square miles of wooded land are stripped today as a result of forest fires raging near here. More than 1000 experienced fire fighters and hundreds of volunteers are combating the flames. The damage so far is estimated at \$200,000.

It is feared a shift in the wind will destroy the forests about Hyannis and adjacent to South Yarmouth. A number of persons have deserted their cottages and have placed their automobiles at the disposal of the fire fighters.
