Packers Must Leave Indian Alone

The United States government has stepped in to see that Sam Williams, an Indian, is not molested in the operation of his fish wheel near the Dalles. Complaint having reached the district attorney that Seufert Brothers, salmon packers, had been interfering. Attorney General McReynolds yesterday wired United States Attorney Reames to protect the Indian and his office is proceeding to investigate. In the meantime, Seufert Brothers have been warned not to hamper Williams in the operation of his wheel if they are doing so, and further facts are being sought from the agent of the North Yakima reservation.

Infringement Is Charged

The Wilson Re-Inforced Concrete company, a Nebraska corporation, has brought suit in the United States district court against Philip Easterday, of Portland, charging infringement of patent rights on three styles of concrete pipe. The company declares the inventions were made by persons who sold their rights to the company but that regardless of this Easterday has been selling material of the same kind. The company seeks an injunction preventing further manufacture or sale and an accounting to discover the value of the pipe already sold, with damages of three times this value.

Contractors Must Relay Sidewalk.

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 6.—Because they failed to use the materials in the proportions specified in the city ordinance, Carter & Trimble, a contracting firm of this city, will be required to relay the sidewalk in front of the high school or receive no remuneration. This was the decision of Recorder Fitzgerald after a trial held yesterday. The testimony showed that the contractors had used hardpan and dirt instead of gravel for a sub-base and had not mixed their concrete surfacing properly.

RULING WILL BE MADE WHETHER ANY WOMEN MAY WORK AFTER SIX

Industrial Commission to Decide Maximum Hours of Labor for Workers.

The next act of the Industrial Welfare commission will be to decree the hours and wages of women workers in mercantile establishments. The question as to whether women should be employed after 6 o'clock in the evening will be settled. This decision will be made by the mercantile conference committee equally representative of employees, public and employers, which was appointed by the commission.

Yesterday the commission issued an order that will become effective October 4. It is the first ruling of the kind in the United States and gives Oregon a national leadership in minimum wage regulation. It requires that no girl under 18 be required to work more than 8 hours and 20 minutes a day, that her wage be not less than \$1 a day and that her employment not extend beyond 6 o'clock in the evening. Large department stores, telephone exchanges and others that employ girls less than 18 years of age have agreed to be governed by the commission's ruling and not to contest it.

The original recommendation of the commission was for an eight-hour day. It was lengthened by 20 minutes upon representations made by W. F. Olds, the merchant, and others. F. H. Shea, speaking for the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, said that the company would have to look for girls over 18 years of age, because it finds it necessary to employ girls in the exchanges after 6 o'clock at night.

E. Boening, district commercial superintendent of the Western Union asserted that the company's present regulations are in line with the order of the commission and that the company is entirely satisfied.
