

WYLD WILL GO TO BANKERS' CONFERENCE

Clearing House Chooses Representative to Make Trip to Washington.

Ernest A. Wyld, vice president of the Security Savings & Trust company, will leave for Washington tomorrow night to represent the Portland Clearing House association in a conference with the Secretary of the Treasury regarding the distribution of \$40,000,000 among the banks of the west and south to relieve the financial stringency incidental on the movement of crops. Mr. Wyld was chosen at a meeting of the Clearing House association yesterday afternoon. The conference with the secretary of the treasury will occur August 14.

It is said that Portland bankers are hopeful of securing a deposit of \$1,000,000 of the amount to be allotted banks. Although this amount will hardly be sufficient to meet this year's demand for crop money it will serve effectively in relieving the situation. Between July and November loans in Portland banks are usually increased from \$5,000,000 to \$8,000,000. This covers the period in which the bulk of the crops are moved. Seattle and Spokane will also, it is expected, receive a government allotment.

While Mr. Wyld's visit has nothing to do with the plan to secure one of the 12 regional reserve banks provided for in the Owens-Glass currency bill, now pending in congress, it is probable that his presentation of Portland's needs as a banking center will bear fruit in that direction.

An active campaign has been started by the Portland Chamber of Commerce to have Portland selected as the regional bank of the Pacific coast, which may possibly be given two of these banks.

In any event the Chamber of Commerce believes that Portland should have one of the 12 provided for. In its communication with Senators Chamberlain and Lane, Secretary Giltner, of the Chamber of Commerce, has received assurance that every effort will be made to have Portland designated in case the currency bill is passed in its present form.

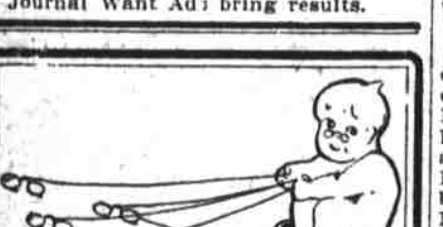
According to Colonel Young, there is a strife among the clerks in the quartermaster's office, and there will likely be a thinning out.

Judge Threatens Fine if Pawnbroker Failed to Comply With Order.

The Asher Loan company at 242 First street was given until an early hour this afternoon to return tools pawned by Frank Herald, 4327 Forty-second street. The man's wife complained this morning in the municipal court that the loan had been made while the husband was intoxicated.

Mrs. Herald caused the arrest of the loan company, as she has repeatedly notified the proprietor not to advance her husband money on tools. The loan broker said Herald was sober when the loan was made, producing a receipt book to show the handwriting of Herald was that of a sober man.

"The handwriting does not indicate the man was sober," said Judge Stevenson. "You have been notified by the woman to not allow her husband a loan. You have done so against her wishes. If you don't return the tools a fine will be imposed." J. Asher promised the court and woman to return the tools.

ARMS FOR REBELS WOULD FOLLOW UP IN SULTS TO LIND

here, today advised President Wilson and Secretary Bryan that if they are permitted to purchase arms in the United States they will overthrow Huerta within three months. Because of this, it is believed Huerta will do nothing more until he hears Lind's proposals.

The most serious danger in the situation now is that personal insults or violence will be offered Lind. If so, the sternest measures will immediately follow.

There is believed to be a possibility that the attacks on Lind in newspapers which favor Huerta have been inspired in order to arouse the Mexican population against the president's envoy. The administration hopes not. An assault on Lind, however, is entirely possible and this would be a firebrand forcing the hands of the administration to compel punishment of the attacker with the entire armed force of the United States.

President Wilson and Secretary Bryan held a long conference today on the Mexican outlook. The embassy in Mexico City has reported at great length and in confidence to Bryan on the situation in the southern capital, and while no official statement was made, it is understood that most of the business men of Mexico City will welcome Lind, and that he will be able to arrange some plan by which the strife in the republic will end.

Battleship Sails With Lind.

Galveston, Texas, Aug. 7.—John Lind, President Wilson's special envoy to Mexico, sailed from here at 10 o'clock today on his mission aboard the battleship New Hampshire.

Lind and his wife arrived from Houston by a special interurban train. He said:

"I am acting entirely for the president and will communicate only with him. I do not know how long I shall stay in Mexico and do not know whether I shall be offered the ambassadorship to Mexico. But I do know that I will decline if I am offered the place."

Kosterlitzky Opposes Intervention.

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 7.—If the United States will keep hands off and let Mexico handle her own affairs a speedy settlement of the factional troubles in that war-infested country is certain, according to Colonel Emil Kosterlitzky, who is in San Diego today as a prisoner of war at Fort Rosecrans.

Colonel Kosterlitzky, who is one of the most feared men in the country which had adopted him, recently fled across the border at Nogales to escape the rebel forces which were pressing him hard, and was brought to San Diego with more than 500 other refugees last night.

"Intervention? Bah!" he snapped. "We don't want intervention. If you let us alone we'll settle this thing among ourselves, and quiet will be restored much quicker than you think. Conditions in Mexico are not as bad as the newspapers are trying to represent them."

Served Under Elder Diaz.

For many years Kosterlitzky was commander of the rurales in Sonora under the elder Diaz. He was born in Russia, served in the Russian army and later, it is said, was in the United States army, whence he entered the service of President Diaz. He is regarded as the best rifle shot on the Pacific coast of Mexico.

The refugees arrived last night on two special trains from El Paso, Texas, and Nogales, Arizona. On the train from Nogales, in charge of Captain McConnell, was Colonel Emilio Kosterlitzky, Polish soldier of fortune, who has seen much fighting in Mexico. Colonel Francisco J. Escoban was the most prominent refugee on the El Paso train.

In San Diego the refugees are in charge of Captain Page and Lieutenant H. A. McCune of Fort Rosecrans. On the reservation the refugees will be taught many of the sanitary regulations observed by Uncle Sam's soldiers. They will live in army tents and will feed on army rations. Things will be made as comfortable as possible for the women. The men, however, will be expected to put up with unembellished military life.

In the bunch of refugees are delegations of soldiers for both elements in Mexico. As yet they have shown no disposition to carry their fight this side of the line.

Junta Attacks Lind's Mission.

Paris, Aug. 7.—Hot protest against the mission to Mexico of John Lind, as peace-maker, and protest against what they term interference, was made here today in a statement issued by the Paris Junta of the Mexican constitutionalists. It read:

"We learn that John Lind has been sent to Mexico as a mediator, practically representing President Wilson. Constitutionalists here, while appreciating the correct attitude of President Wilson, energetically protest against this pretended mediation by America. We wish no foreign intrusion. Americans were never more interested in Mexico than now, and if they think their interests endangered, almost the worst means they could take to protect themselves would be to wound Mexico's self respect by semi-official pressure. Only military intervention could be worse than this attempted mediation, as that would mean war."
