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cluding the "royal suite," during their stay. Coffee was served in the apartments after their arrival.

Portland Detectives Guard.
At the station also were Captain of Detectives Bate and Detective Pat McInerney, Swann, Abbott and Tichenor. The officers were stationed by Captain Riley as a precautionary measure. General Diaz requested no protection, and later Senor Romero thanked the officers for their courtesy but informed them that their services were not required so far as the Diaz party is concerned.

General Diaz has a bodyguard of one man. The others in the party, besides General and Madame Diaz, are: Senorita Maria Obregon, companion to Madame Diaz; Jose Romero, first secretary; Fidelio Hernandez, second secretary; Victor Valenzuela, third secretary; Captain Mendoza and Lieutenant Del Rio, military aides.

At the hotel, Robert W. Schmeer, cashier of the United States National bank, was introduced to the members of the party. Escorted by Mr. Schmeer, the party left the hotel and walked as far as Broadway, the general explaining through Senor Romero, that he would like to "stretch his legs" after so much riding.

Diaz Carries Camera.
General Diaz also carries a camera, which was out of working order, and he visited two supply shops to have it repaired. The party walked back to the hotel, declining to use the taxicabs at their service, and en route were introduced to John C. Alenworth, president of the United States National bank. They spent but a moment in the bank and went on to the hotel, where, piloted by Mr. Schmeer, they started on an automobile ride around the city and suburbs. Luncheon at 1 o'clock and dinner were ordered at the hotel. Senor Romero is the general manager and

spokesman of the party, and sticks to the general like a burr.

Refuses to Pose.
The first thing he did upon arrival at the hotel was to have a \$50 American "yellow back" broken up into greenbacks of smaller denominations. The general refused to pose for the photographers, but Senor Romero announced that he would not interfere with the camera men if they were "clever enough" to get pictures as the party left the hotel.

The attention attracted by the visitors upon their arrival, at the hotel and on the streets, was evidently distasteful to Madame Diaz, who nevertheless accepted it all with smiling grace. She was at her husband's side most of the time, and seemed to take special delight in selecting souvenir postal cards from a shop rack.

Senor Romero, for General Diaz, has asked the hotel management that the party be given as much privacy as possible during the Portland visit.

INDUSTRIAL WELFARE COMMISSION LAW IS VERY FAR REACHING

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plained of the ruling issued by the commission. No disposition had been evidenced to contest or disobey it.

Lists from the labor commissioner, Manufacturers' association, retail merchants, labor unions and others will be compared in preparing notices to be sent to all employers all over the state informing them of the action of the commission. A form announcement will be used, as prepared by the state printer, giving notice of the ruling and the portion of the law under which the ruling is made.

The members of the Industrial Welfare commission are: Father E. V. O'Hara, Bertha Moore, Amedeo M. Smith. The secretary is Caroline Gleason. The law is chapter 61 of the 1913 session laws. The reason for the enactment is expressed in a preamble which says: "Whereas, women and minors should be protected from conditions of labor which have a pernicious effect on their health and morals, and inadequate wages and unduly long hours and unsanitary conditions of labor have such a pernicious effect."

Governor Appoints.
The governor is given power to appoint the commissioners holding office for one, two and three years respectively. Successors are to be appointed by the governor. Its first duties are to ascertain:

"Standards of hours of employment for women or for minors, and what are unreasonably long hours for women or for minors in any occupation within the state of Oregon."

"Standards of conditions of labor for women or for minors in any occupation within the state of Oregon and what surroundings or conditions—sanitary or otherwise—are detrimental to the health or morals of women or of minors in any such occupation."

"Standards of minimum wages for women in any occupation within the state of Oregon and what wages are inadequate to supply the necessary cost

of living to any such women workers and to making them in good health."

Wage Standards.
"Standards of minimum wages for minors in any occupation within the state of Oregon and what wages are unreasonably low for any such minor workers."

The commission is given full power to investigate books and records and plants of concerns; to call public hearings, subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, and to make rulings based on its findings. It is required to name conference committees equally representative of employers, employees and the public, and to consider their findings in making rulings.

The commission is given power to promulgate rules for carrying into effect the provisions of the act. Violations may be punished by fines ranging from \$25 to \$100, or imprisonment in the county jail ranging from 10 days to three months, or both. If a woman worker is paid less than the minimum wage, she may recover the full amount less the amount paid her, by civil action, under the law. An annual appropriation of \$3500 is made to finance the work of the commission. Regular reports of work are to be made to the governor. Notices of actions taken and hearings to be held must be given full publication.
