

GARBAGE QUESTION OF GREATEST IMPORTANCE DALY TELLS MEETING

Compares Work of Incinerator
Here With Other Places;
Must Have New Plant.

No question is more important to Portland people just now than the collection and destruction of garbage, said Commissioner Will Daly in an informal address before a municipal study group which met last night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Newell on Hoyt street.

The result of investigations of methods used in many other cities were submitted by Commissioner Daly and the secretary of the group, R. P. Risenfeld. It showed that Portland, incinerating garbage at a total cost of 34 cents a ton, is not only paying less than any other city in the United States, but is consuming it more cheaply than it would be handled if put aboard barges and sent down river.

Quick action in building the incinerator, for which bonds were authorized at the last election, will be necessary, said Commissioner Daly, who added that his study of the situation had convinced him that an incinerator located somewhere in the southeastern portion of the city would equalize the length of haul of garbage wagons and reduce the hauling costs probably one half.

Excavation Discussed.

That it would be extremely unwise to locate the new incinerator on Guild's Lake near the present incinerator was asserted by the commissioner. He said that it constantly becomes more and more of a problem to find places to dump ashes and cinders. The owners of Guild's Lake, he declared, want \$15,000 an acre to give the city the privilege of filling and reclaiming what is now a worthless and flooded area.

At the same time their price for the entire tract is \$20,000. Mr. Daly said he nearly reached the conclusion that it would be an ultimate profit to the city to purchase the area, reclaim it by dumping ashes and cinders and later sell the property subdivided.

Methods of collection were discussed. Commissioner Daly said that operating a reduction plant in connection with the incinerator entails extra cost. Before the garbage collection system for which the city authorized \$75,000 in bonds two years ago, can be established, the new incinerator must be built, because the present incinerator cannot burn all the garbage that would be collected in one day under a municipal collection system.

It has been found that a city averages a ton of garbage a day per 100 people. The largest collection and incineration in Portland so far has been 178 tons in a plant that was constructed to burn but 150 tons daily. A ton per 1000 population would mean about 250 tons a day. When the municipal garbage collection system is installed, said Mr. Daly, effort will be made to collect regularly from every house, hotel, restaurant and other places. Collection routes will be established.

He believes the charging of a regular fee against each household is the best way of meeting collection cost. Under this system the New York Bureau of Municipal Research estimates that the city would reduce its present garbage collection expense of \$500,000 a year to \$200,000, while collection would be more efficiently performed.

So efficient has the present incinerator become, said Mr. Daly, that odors and gases are consumed with the garbage and it is not offensive in operation. He believes that to duplicate the present plant would be wise.

Albany News.

FEARS EARACHE MAY RESULT FROM INQUIRIES

James McCool, secretary to Will H. Daly, commissioner of public utilities, fears that he is about to be troubled with ear ache because of the numerous complaints that are poured into his ears relative to the oiling of streets.

Oiling to the warm weather of the last few weeks a number of streets in the residence districts have shown signs of considerable dust. People living on these streets have asked that oiling be started immediately. All of these complaints have been made to McCool, as Commissioner Daly has charge of the street oiling and sprinkling department.

Mr. Daly has ruled that no oiling will be done on streets that are not macadamized, as the oil soon sinks into the dust and conditions are worse than before. Instead of bettering conditions it means additional cost to the city, it is figured. The oil, hereafter, will be used only on those streets which are macadamized. Water is being used on some of the streets where conditions are at their worst.

MILK SHOW WILL BE HELD LATE IN AUGUST

Health and Food Departments
of City and State Are
to Cooperate.

Arrangements are being made for the largest milk show ever held in the west to take place in Portland the last week of August. It will be conducted under the auspices of the city health department, the state dairy and food commissioner, the state health officer and the government bureau cooperating.

A committee has made arrangement with Julius Meier of the Meier & Frank company for a large space on the fifth floor, which will be equipped and donated for the show by the company. Facilities will be provided so that 50,000 people, many of them school children, can see the exhibit during the week.

Mrs. H. M. Bransford, city milk inspector, has been made chairman of the milk show executive committee.

Mrs. C. E. Nichols, president of the ladies' auxiliary of the North Portland Commercial club, was made general chairman. The show will be directly in charge of the ladies' auxiliary. Mrs. Bransford submitted plans of tentative character that indicated the show

will be of unusually comprehensive character and of great educational value. Dairymen will cooperate in placing on exhibit models of correctly operated dairy farms and milk distributing systems. The inspection of creameries, the home care of milk and many other subjects will be picturesquely treated.

Each day will have its program. A number of meetings will be held. Authorities on the subject of pure milk and human life conservation will be the speakers. Moving pictures and stereopticons will be used for illustration.

Until a little more than two years ago Portland's milk supply was of an unregulated sort that directly caused high infant mortality. A pure milk crusade initiated by The Journal, supported by mothers and physicians and citizens generally, resulted in radical improvements which are still in progress. The extent of progress will be measured at the milk show and means of proceeding even more efficiently under the new commission form of government will be discussed.

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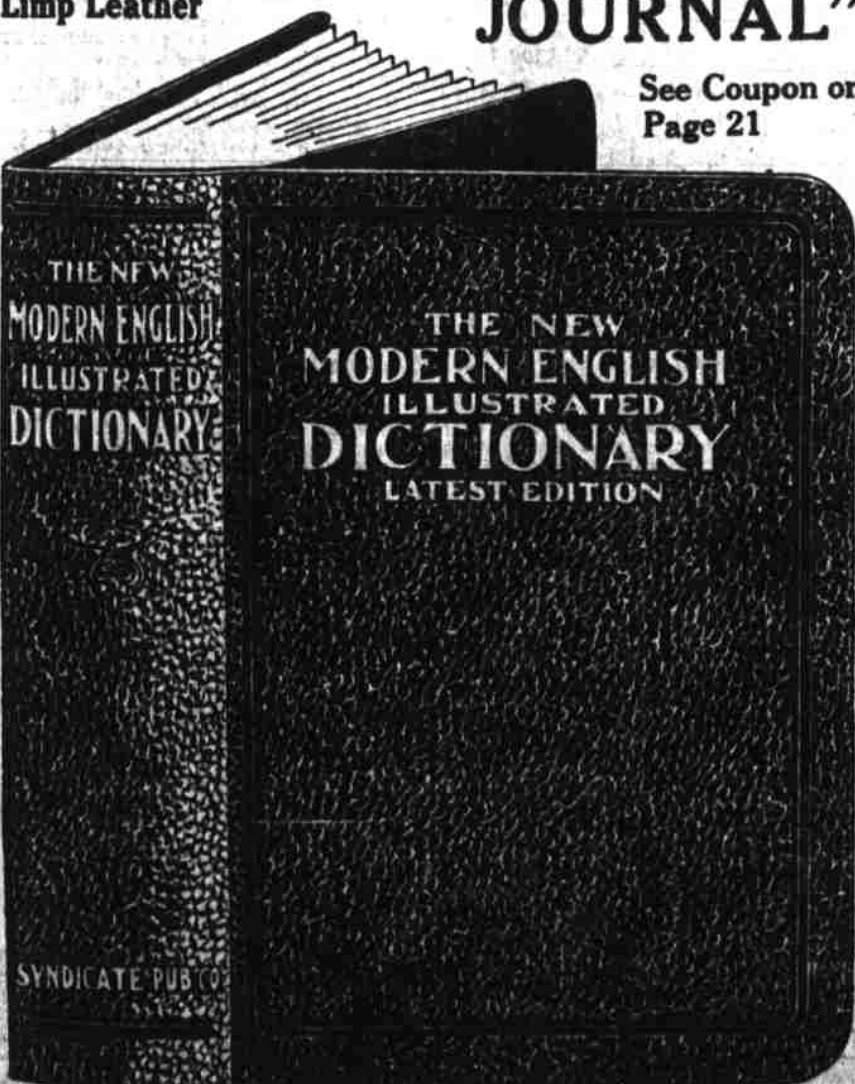
