known as Gilbert, shall be divided or whether another school building shall be erected in the district to accommodate those on the eastern portion. At the same time the board will consider a petition to annex districts 12 and 22 to Portland. These districts lie south of the city and it is the wish of the petitioners to be allowed the high school privileges. It is the policy of the board to allow the annexations. Some residents of the district are opposing the plan on account of the special district tax that will result.

Arrest Women for Drunkenness.—Two women were seen coming from the saloon of John F. Schneider, 553 First street last evening, by Patrolman Michael. Closer investigation by the patrolmen led to the conclusion the women were intoxicated, whereupon they were placed under arrest. They gave the names of Lana Graham, of 178 Sherman street, and Rose Crittenden, 287 Sherman street. The saloonkeeper was also arrested, charged with selling liquor to women. The case will be heard Saturday morning in the municipal court. The ordinance prohibits women drinking or purchasing liquor from saloon, bar or wine room.

Case Against Mrs. Levens Dismissed.—The case against Mrs. Hulda Levens, proprietor of the grill and hotel by that name, was dismissed yesterday afternoon in the municipal court. It was dismissed upon a demurrer filed by the complainant, in which the woman was charged with allowing persons in the grill after 12 o'clock for the purpose of drinking liquor. Patrolmen Niles and Hutchinson were called to the grill Sunday morning at 1 o'clock. They found four persons at tables, being on the tables. It was claimed by the woman that the liquor was purchased before the closing hour, midnight. The demurrer, to the complaint sets forth that the ordinance prohibiting persons in and about a grill after the closing hour was repealed by the model liquor law.

Arrested for White Slavery.—Sergeant Harms with Patrolmen Schirmer and Wise last evening arrested Solomon Davis, colored, in the north end on a charge of white slavery. A woman giving the name of Julia Allen, colored, was also taken into custody as a witness. Both are to be taken before the federal court. Davis admitted accompanying the woman from Seattle, paying her fare to Portland. The woman admits being a member of the underworld. Later in the evening, Sergeant Pressy and Patrolman Tackberry arrested Lulu Eldridge for conducting a resort at 430 1/2 Washington street. Ruth Page was arrested at the same place, charged with being a waitress. These cases are to be heard in the municipal court.

Greater East Side Club Meets Tonight.—A regular meeting of the Greater East Side United Improvement Clubs association will be held tonight in the club rooms of the East Side Business Men's club, East Sixth and Morrison streets. Crossword puzzles, public markets, parks and playgrounds and other topics of interest to east-siders will be discussed at the meeting. All east side clubs are urged to send delegates to the meeting. It was reported yesterday by mistake that the meeting was to have been held last night.

Morris Bond \$1500.—Waiving examination before United States Commissioner Cannon this morning, L. F. Morris, charged with making counterfeit money, was held in \$1500 bonds to the federal grand jury. Morris was arrested by Secret Service Agent William A. Glover on Kiger island, near Corvallis, where he had a cabin. He had been working as a sign painter and wood chopper around Corvallis for some time. If he fails to give the bond, Morris will spend the time from now until late September in the county jail.

Boy Bitten by Storekeeper.—A warrant for the arrest of Jim Chickos, a fruit dealer at 137 First street, was secured this morning on complaint of Hynle Schneiderman, a newsboy, who complained that the man had bit him on the neck. The lad displayed a large wound that resulted from the encounter between the two. Young Schneiderman states that he accidentally broke a showcase in Chickos' store and was attacked by him as a result.

"Mother" Olcese Acquitted.—"Mother" Olcese, one of the old-time keepers of a resort in the north end, was found

not guilty yesterday afternoon by a jury in the municipal court, where she was charged with selling liquor without a license. Three members of the police department testified buying beer at her place last Sunday. The city also had the best evidence, Mrs. Olcese did not take the witness stand or offer any evidence. The jury consisted of K. K. Kuhl, M. Billings, William Albert, H. A. Heppner and Arthur I. Rothwell. The five men testified in quality that they would find a verdict for the city if it was shown a sale of liquor was made by the woman. The city submitted this evidence, plus evidence that the woman has a federal license to sell liquor. The jurors considered the case 15 minutes, when the verdict of not guilty was returned.

Cooking Suspect on Trial.—Wong Kong, a Chinaman convicted in the municipal court of selling cocaine to George Williams, a 20-year-old respectable vendor, is on trial in Judge McGinn's court today, he having taken an appeal from the ruling of the lower court. Wong Kong was arrested by Detective Boyle at Fourth and Everett streets, July 8. Attorney Jeffery, who is appearing for the man, asked for a change of venue this morning on the ground that Judge McGinn had stated he would sentence the man to 100 years if he could. The application was denied. Attorneys Collier and Stott are appearing as special prosecutors for the state board of pharmacy.

Small Blast at Powers.—A small blast was discovered last evening at 6:30 o'clock in the engine room of Powers' furniture store. Prompt use of the chemical engine extinguished the fire. The cause is not known definitely, but the fire was discovered in the basement of a lunch room at 62 North Twenty-third street. The damage was small. Cause was from an overheated gas stove used for cooking. Guests in a rooming house next door left their rooms when the alarm was sounded, but the fire was confined to the lunch room basement.

Masher Sentenced.—Twenty-four hours in the city jail was the sentence Judge Stevenson of the municipal court trying to flir with 17-year-old girl. The offense was yesterday afternoon on Sixth street. Deputy Sheriff Rogers saw Mitchell following the girl down the street, and attempt to speak to her. Mitchell said he was a member of the Los Angeles, being on his way to Seattle, but meant no insult to the girl.

Two Girls Accuse Prisoner.—C. P. Hadley, a man well along in years, was arrested this morning on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of two little girls, Pansy Logan, aged 13 years, and Florence Sherwood, aged 15 years, of 345 Salmon street. The case before Judge Jones this afternoon. Elmer Wenzel was arrested this morning on complaint of J. R. Downs, who accuses him of an assault on Cecilia Papitucci, a young girl.

Hotel Proprietor Accused.—A complaint was sworn to yesterday in the district court against the owner of the Nortonia hotel by Carrie Young, employed there as a housekeeper, who declares that she was compelled to work more than 60 hours per week. The case is on trial before Judge Jones this afternoon. The complaining witness lives at the Ansonia hotel.

Speeder Fined.—A fine of \$20 was given Thomas Mitchell this morning in the municipal court for automobile speeding. C. H. Daulton and Nabert McGee were found guilty of speeding, but the sentence was suspended in each case.
