

SENATOR SMITH FINDS MADERISTA JUNTA HAS ADMINISTRATION'S EAR

Declares Constitutional Lobbyist Caused Removal of Ambassador Wilson.

(By the International News Service.)
Washington, D. C., Aug. 9.—Senator William Alden Smith charged on the floor of the senate today that a paid lobbyist and lobbyist of the constitutional party in Mexico had the ear of the senate department and was attempting to influence the attitude of the United States toward Mexico.

The charges of Senator Smith caused a sensation on the floor of the nation's highest legislative body.
"I say," said Senator Smith with warmth, "that Sherburne G. Hopkins, an attorney of this city, paid counsel for the Constitutionalists, who drew \$100,000 from the Madero administration for services, has had the ear of the state department in the past and present administrations. Herr Sumnerfeldt, a German captain, personal friend of President Madero and his widow, for two years has been lobbying to influence American action in Mexico and is now in Washington assisting in a propaganda on behalf of the Constitutionalists."

Senator James characterized the statements of Senator Smith as a serious charge against the state department. Senator Swanson, who was not present, said the matter had not been brought up in the committee on foreign relations when Secretary Bryan was present, instead of in the open senate.

"I said the state department was not the secretary," replied Mr. Smith.
"Well, the senator knows the secretary runs the department," retorted Mr. Swanson, warmly.

Smith Not So Sure.
"I have heard it so said, but I am not sure of it," said Mr. Smith.
"It is my opinion," interjected John Sharp Williams, "that there is an organized, syndicated effort with money behind it to bring about intervention in Mexico. The editorials of the newspapers have a suspicious sameness that makes it evident there is a concentrated effort with money back of it. It is time we should pause. I do not feel even brave when talking about war with Mexico, a country disrupted and torn with dissensions."

Senator Smith said his remarks were called for by misleading statements printed in the Record regarding the Constitutionalists and he was not willing the reports should stand unchallenged.

ble. Until it is certain that it is, no attempt will be made to suggest it to either of the warring Mexican factions. That is as far as the administration was willing to go tonight in outlining its plans. It was admitted that in view of the existing feeling against United States citizens in Mexico and of the position of the Huerta followers, no one could even assume to guess what 24 hours might bring forth. This was admittedly the grave danger in the present situation.

Are Americans First.
It was declared by those that participated in tonight's conference that there was a full and free discussion of Mexico as each man saw it. The president is understood to have made it plain that this was a patriotic question and that all were first Americans and party men afterwards. And when the discussion ended it was felt by the president that he had nothing further to fear in opposition even from Senators William Alden Smith or Senator Borah who have openly criticized his policy. The president asked the members present for suggestions and when no definite ones were forthcoming he stated that he would be glad to hear from any member of the committee at any time on the subject.

The following members of the senate foreign relations committee attended the conference:
Bacon of Georgia, chairman; Stone of Missouri, Shively of Indiana, Hitchcock of Nebraska, O'Gorman of New York, Williams of Mississippi; Swanson of Virginia, Pomeroy of Ohio, Smith of Arizona, Democratic, and Smith of Michigan, Sutherland of Utah, Borah of Idaho and Burton of Ohio, Republicans.

The absentees, all of whom were out of the city, were Clarke of Arkansas, Root of New York, Lodge of Massachusetts and McComber of North Dakota.
President Is Frank.
It was a momentous conference in the executive offices. With the president's special envoy, John Lind, at Vera Cruz, twelve hours from Mexico City, characterized in advance of his arrival by Huerta as persona non grata, the necessity of harmony was apparent to all. The president was extremely frank in his handling of the situation. With Secretary of State Bryan he disclaimed any intention of playing with politics with a patriotic question.

The president defended his acceptance of Henry Lane Wilson's resignation because the latter was not in accord with this administration's pacific measures. He said that he sent John Lind to Mexico because it was impracticable to bring Charge d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy here at this time.
Peace, and Peace Only Wanted.
It was necessary to make very plain that this country wanted peace in Mexico. So Lind was selected, the senators were told, to tell the factions in Mexico what plan the president and Secretary Bryan believed would restore peace where turmoil now prevails.
The senators were emphatically informed that the most careful investigation had failed to disclose any sentiment among the American people in favor of armed intervention. Instead, it was stated that the general feeling was for hands off, and to permit the Mexicans to get together, so that a real section, which would reflect the true will of the people, could be held or a fight to a finish be permitted. The real duty of this country, as the president sees it, was to safeguard United States citizens' life and property in the troubled zone, and to bring back home all destitute countrymen.
The president told his hearers that he believed the position of opposition to Lind and his mission assumed by the

TROOPS WOULD RESIST REMOVAL OF SULZER ASSERTION OF FRIEND

Governor Maintains He Only Can Order Impeachment; Committee to Proceed.

(By the International News Service.)
Albany, N. Y., Aug. 9.—Articles of impeachment against Governor Sulzer are being prepared by Senator Robert N. Wagner and Speaker Smith at Saratoga tonight. They will be presented to the legislature probably soon after the Friday committee reports next Monday evening.

While Wagner and Smith, during a brief visit here today and a long secret conference tonight, declined to outline the case the indictments, it is believed, will follow very closely this forecast:

First, that the governor committed perjury in swearing that he received neither directly nor indirectly not more than \$5240 for campaign contributions. Second, that he wrote the Farmers Loan & Trust company he had authorized Secretary Sweeney to receive contributions and that Sharkey had deposited in that bank \$12,000 during the campaign.

Third, that the governor used a number of concealed campaign contributions to speculate in Wall street.
Governor's Protest Unheeded.
Despite the protest of the governor which Secretary Platt sought to acquiesce today, the legislature cannot legally institute impeachment proceedings or anything else unless the governor himself recommends it, Wagner and Smith seem disposed to go ahead with framing the indictments. They count upon an overwhelming approval of both Democrat and Republican members of the legislature.

The governor appeared at the executive chamber today looking more haggard and worn than he did at the time the Mignon Hopkins suit was brought. He was asked to comment upon the disclosures adopted by the Frawley committee yesterday. He replied:
"I will make no statement until I have the full stenographic report of the Frawley committee before me."

Then the governor, who spent barely a minute and a half in the executive chamber, joined Mrs. Sulzer on a trip to Chenango county, where he proposes to buy a farm.

Constitution Is Plain.
Secretary Platt, after the governor had departed, said:
"The governor still maintains that the legislature possesses no power to institute impeachment proceedings or any other proceedings unless the governor specifically recommends them."

"The constitution is perfectly plain on the point. The governor, however, will reserve any statement he desires to make until he has carefully examined the testimony taken by the Frawley committee."

A friend of the governor declared that the executive would resist with strength and force in the national guard of the state any attempt to remove him from his office. The friend said that the governor would answer his detractors at any time and place he saw fit. It was rumored tonight that possibly tomorrow he would have some New York lawyers at the executive mansion and that they would discuss and possibly outline the governor's action.

Although the Frawley committee is to submit its report Monday, it will doubtless ask for further time, as the committee has opened up several subjects which have not been entirely cleared up.
de facto government of Mexico was due to a misconception of his instructions. And if Lind really is in danger on his mission, the president told the senators the joint utterance of the executive and legislative branches of the government.

Tension Is Growing.
While the conference in the White House dominated the situation, there was a general feeling here that the tension in Mexican affairs generally is growing. The coming 48 hours may spell war or peace, so far as this nation is concerned.

The instructions sent Minnesota's former governor were withheld tonight. It is known they are of a positive character and it is believed they direct him to carry out his mission, utilizing the affairs of O'Shaughnessy, who has the entire to the Mexican executive office, as his spokesman. If the Huerta opposition should result in an unwarranted assault on Lind in Mexico City there would probably follow a concerted demand in this country for exemplary punishment for Huerta, who would naturally be held responsible.

Unofficially the Huerta government has been told that Lind and all other Americans must be protected. And the hint has already been conveyed in the most friendly language that Mexican officials are expected to respect the representative of a friendly nation on a most peaceful mission.

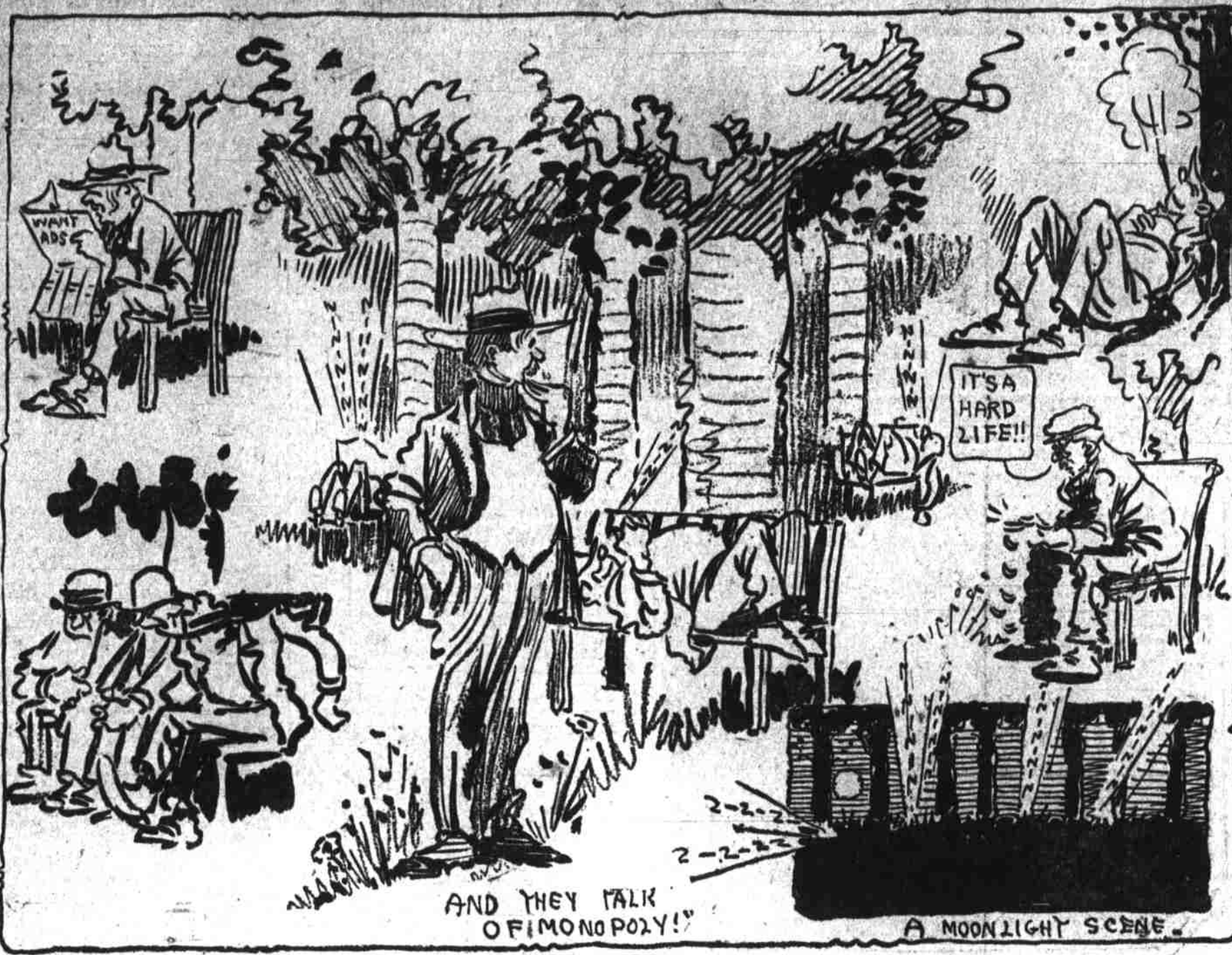
Holiday Uprising Feared.
Grave fears were maintained in high circles that there would be anti-American demonstrations in Mexico City tomorrow. Sunday is the usual day for popular uprising there. It is admitted that a leader and a few incendiary speeches might result seriously.

It is to be a biting game until word is received of the success or failure of the Lind mission. The only admission possible was that the next 48 hours would be momentous. That was as far as anyone in authority would go in a guess.
Aid of Powers Expected.
As the instructions to Mr. Lind are to be communicated to all the powers, including those of South America, it is to be expected they will apply pressure to General Huerta to induce him to adopt the Wilson program. None of the southern republics would look with favor upon military intervention. They fear it would mean permanent occupation and thus absorption by the American colossus of additional Latin-American territory.

It may be expected, therefore, that these governments will join in urgent representations to General Huerta in support of the American policy. It is believed further that Great Britain, Germany and France will take like action.

OREGON WINTER WHEAT YIELD 21.4 BUSHEL

Washington, Aug. 9.—According to the crop reporting board, the yield of winter wheat in Oregon is 21.4 bushels as compared with 14 in California, 27 in Washington and 27.4 in Idaho. Condition is 97 per cent. The state will have 11,599,000 bushels as compared with 16,884,000 bushels in 1912.

Goes to Jail Rather Than Pay Fine.
New York, Aug. 9.—Unwilling to pay a \$25 fine and unable to persuade Magistrate Steers in the Flatbush avenue police court to accept his automobile in lieu of the fine, Allen R. Chappell started serving a 25 days' sentence for speeding tonight.
"That old car of mine couldn't travel 25 miles an hour on a bet," Chappell told the court, but a policeman said he named Chappell and he was making 25.

Boy Killed in View of Hundreds.
Chicago, Aug. 9.—Pinned between the wall and side of an elevator in the freight office of the Santa Fe railroad, William Scully, 16, a messenger, died in full view of a hundred men and girl employees. When the elevator was released he was dead.

Andy Finds Aristocratic Relative.
Edinburgh, Aug. 9.—Andrew Carnegie was much pleased today at discovering a relative among the Lairds of Sutherland. He is W. E. Gilmour, owner of the Rose Hall estate, who is connected with the Morrisons from which family Mr. Carnegie's mother came.

BOY SWIMMER MAY DIE FROM ACCIDENT

Strikes Barrel at Foot of Natatorium Chute and Head Is Crushed In.

Medford, Or., Aug. 9.—Hamilton Lewis, 12 years old, is near death as the result of sliding down the chute in the natatorium tank today. At the base of the chute he struck an air tight barrel which is allowed to float on the surface. The rim of the barrel struck him just below the eyes breaking his nose and horribly mangle his face. His jaw was broken and his face literally caved in. Whether his brain is injured is not known but the doctors believe he has a fighting chance for life.
A remarkable fact is that the lad remained conscious and talked rationally for several minutes after the accident. His frightful injuries apparently did not cause him any pain.

peachment at this time would be virtual "lynching," they declare.
"If such 'lynching' should appear imminent, it would be the governor's duty, under his oath of office, to call out the national guard to resist the lawlessness," one of Sulzer's followers declared. "As soon as the public begins to see what it would mean to turn over the state government to those who are using it for the benefit of criminals, public opinion will warrant Sulzer in declaring martial law, owing to the conspiracy against the state, and therein drumming some bosses and hanging them in front of Tammany hall."

Stock Exchange Will Reveal All

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Aug. 9.—That the New York stock exchange has made an entire change in its policy as to the disclosure of customers of various brokerage houses became known today in connection with the investigation into Governor Sulzer's stock transactions. On being summoned before the committee, Melville B. Fuller, first refused to answer all questions.
It is understood that Sulzer conferred with Fuller in Albany and pleaded with him not to answer questions as to his speculation. Fuller promised the governor he would not, which was in accordance with the old rules of the exchange. When the governors of the exchange heard of Fuller's refusal to testify, however, he was informed officially that the exchange had nothing to conceal from lawfully constituted investigating bodies. It was intimated that it was the desire of the exchange governors that Fuller tell all he knew. The broker then called up Sulzer and told him he would have to be released from his promise.
Formerly brokers have gone to jail rather than disclose the affairs of their customers. A notable instance of this was in the case of Elverton B. Chapman, who was sent to jail during the sugar investigation in Washington.
In contrast to this, Fuller presented books and letters showing that Sulzer was threatened with being sold out in June because of an account of over \$26,000 against him.

MAN AND WIFE PREFER SUICIDE TO ARREST

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 9.—Julius Rosenthal, 71, well to do merchant, is dead and his wife, Mrs. Emma Rosenthal, 66, is dying as the result of attempts of juvenile court officers to arrest the former on the charge of contributing to the delinquency of girls. When the officers appeared, Rosenthal, using first a butcher knife and then a razor, cut his throat.
Seeing his lifeless body, his wife snatched the bloody razor from his hand, slashed her throat and then leaped from a second story window of their home and crashed through a cellar door. While being removed to the hospital she frantically tried to tear open the wound in her throat.

FEUDIST'S WIFE KILLS HIM IN SELF DEFENSE

Henry Clay Grubb, North Carolina "Bad Man," Justifiably Shot by His Wife.

Sallabury, N. C., Aug. 9.—"Feudist" Henry Clay Grubb, who bore a state-wide reputation for his participation in numerous gun fights, was killed today by his wife after he had attacked her with a knife and so severely cut and beat her that her condition tonight is extremely critical.
Mrs. Grubb declared after the tragedy that her husband returned home today, held her by the arm, and after abusing her by stamping and kicking her, dragged her from the bedroom to the hallway. He had been drinking, she said.
Three bullets were fired by Mrs. Grubb. Physicians said that each would have been fatal. A corner's jury after investigation returned a verdict of self defense and Mrs. Grubb will not be arrested. The Grubbs are well known throughout the state. Besides owning several houses and a large farm, Grubb is said to have been worth \$500,000.

BEN REITMAN ARRESTED FOR PEDDLING BILLS

Seattle, Aug. 9.—Benjamin L. Reitman, manager of Emma Goldman, the anarchist, who will speak in Seattle next week, and her press agent, Herman Michaelovitch, were arrested this afternoon on a charge of peddling bills without a license. They were distributing cards and bills advertising the appearance of Emma Goldman at the Socialist hall, Thirty-first avenue and Madison street, on Monday and Tuesday evening. Both were released on bail. All the literature they had was held by the police.

STEAMER HITS ROCKS AT PIGEON POINT, CAL.

Point Arena Is Pounding to Pieces; Crew Saved After Struggle With Surf.

San Francisco, Aug. 9.—Swinging on the rocks off Pigeon Point, when her mooring chain broke, the vessel was attempting a landing, the steamer Point Arena, owned by the W. A. Beadle company, is slowly pounding to pieces and probably will be a total loss. The crew of 18 men, including the captain, were all saved, being taken off in lifeboats.
The Point Arena was bound for Pigeon Point from San Pedro to take on a cargo of tan bark. Captain Halvorsen was attempting a landing when the mooring chain broke, while the vessel was 100 yards off the lighthouse. The vessel, after taking on her load of tan bark, was to have proceeded to San Francisco.
The crew had a terrific struggle making their way through the heavy surf to the shore.

ALLEGED ATTEMPT TO WRECK CAR REPORTED

That an attempt was made to derail an Oaks Park car late Friday night was the burden of a rumor in circulation yesterday.
According to the story a car while making a Portland bound trip late in the morning ran into an obstruction which proved to be a half rotted water-soaked railroad tie. The motorman, it was stated, was running at a moderate speed and brought his car practically to a stop before the tie was struck.
The few people aboard the car, it is stated, were unaware that anything unusual had occurred.
No report of the affair was made to the police, so far as could be learned.

FUSION PLANS UPSET IN NEW YORK BY HENDRICK EMERGING AS CANDIDATE

Boss Parson's Representative Announces Candidacy for Mayor as Republican.

New York, Aug. 9.—Plans for a united fight by the fusion forces against Tammany were upset today when Frank Hendrick announced himself as a candidate for mayor on the Republican ticket. The fusion forces had figured on the aid of the Republicans after District Attorney Whitman accepted the nomination for district attorney.
Hendrick is the personal representative in the Twenty-ninth assembly district of Herbert Parsons, the Republican boss.

PAVLOVA COULDN'T REPRESS HER EMOTION

Partner Explains Why She Slapped Him on the Stage in London.

London, Aug. 9.—Novikoff, who was formerly Pavlova's cavalier, gave his version today of what he thought led up to the incident Thursday night when Pavlova slapped his face in view of the audience at the Palace theatre, causing the male dancer to suddenly quit the stage.
"A few days ago," he said, "I told Pavlova of the possibility of my being unable to go with her to America, owing to my doctor's advice to take a long rest, as the muscles used in dancing need a prolonged rest."
"Apparently this prospect annoyed Pavlova who being of a highly strung nature, allowed the annoyance to show itself on the stage."
According to Novikoff he has decided to go to Russia and never dance with Pavlova again.

WANTS HABEAS CORPUS BECAUSE JAIL TOO HOT

Chicago, Aug. 9.—Counsel for John Grady, chef in the Grand Pacific hotel, who is charged with the murder of his wife, a former actress, will make an attempt on Monday to secure Grady's release on a writ of habeas corpus.
Grady has been in good humor and raised no objections to being detained until tonight, when he complained that his cell was hotter than the kitchen of an hotel this side of Hades.
University of Chicago chemists tonight examined a charred piece of bone that was found in the ashes of the furnace in the Grady home. But says they were unable to determine whether it was a bit of human bone until they made a more complete examination. A thorough search of the cellar in the Grady home has convinced the police that if the missing woman was murdered her body was either burned or chopped into bits and carried away.

SEVEN DROWNED WHEN MOTOR BOAT OVERTURNS

New Bedford, Mass., Aug. 9.—Six women and one man were drowned and one woman and two men rescued from an overturned motorboat at 9 o'clock on Long Pond in Lakeville, ten miles north of this city.
The party were guests of Luther Dayton, engineer at the Wamsutter mill of this city. They were enjoying a night trip in the motorboat when it suddenly began to leak and in panic the occupants began to jump, upsetting the boat.
The dead: Emma Doyle, Anna Sweeney, Sadie McCabe and Mabel Brown, all of New Bedford; George Wright and Miss Hallow, both of Brocton, and Hattie Hamilton.

ROOMMATES QUARREL, ONE IS SHOT DEAD

Chicago, Aug. 9.—Philip Van der wauken, 43, tonight shot and killed his roommate, James McDonald, 35, a boiler maker, following an altercation over room rent. McDonald was shot through the left lung, dying instantly.
