

NEW OFFICIALS GET DOWN TO BUSINESS IN MARSHAL'S OFFICE

Montag Says Most of His Ap-
pointees Were in Fire De-
partment With Him.

The new United States marshal's office took up its new duties in good shape this morning. The transfer of the reins of office from Leslie M. Scott to John Montag, made yesterday, caused no hitch in the work of the department. Chief Deputy W. S. MacSwain worked overtime for several days before the transfer took place and as a result everything yesterday morning was in financial readiness. The retiring deputy was paid up to the time they left office, and Mr. Montag was given a set of accounts that were strictly up to the minute.

Frank T. Berry, a retired realty dealer, was the last appointee named by Mr. Montag. He succeeds H. M. Dukas, who has been office deputy for the past two years. Mr. Berry has been a resident of Portland for two years and during that time has been a close friend, politically and otherwise of the new marshal.

Tonight S. C. Armistead, one of the few appointees, will leave for Pendleton with Columbia George, a Umatilla Indian, held by the government on a murder charge, who wants to get back near home so that he can prepare for the defense in the trial, which comes up in about two months.

"All these boys are like long friends of mine," said Mr. Montag in discussing his appointments this morning. "Most of us were on the fire department together. I was chairman of the fire board under the Penoyer administration. At that time, Timmie DeRoest was fire chief, George Jackson was a call man, one who worked during the day at another occupation, but slept at the fire house at night, and Dave Fuller was driver of truck No. 2."

"I am going to take part in everything around this office," declared Mr. Montag. "They can't keep me too busy. My time will be devoted to this office, although I will still supervise in a way, the business in South Portland."

WIDOW WITH BROOD OF TEN MAY BREAK RECORD

Mrs. Maggie Hirschman, 74, East Fifteenth street, north, will break juvenile court records if granted a pension, as she has 10 children under the age of 16 years old, and one just that age. Newport, Or., Aug. 13.—Doctor Johnson, aged 104, and his wife, Susan Jack, aged 100, two of the oldest Indians on the Siletz reservation, were lost three days and nights last week in the timber and were in a serious condition from starvation when found by the tribe. The two were berry picking and lost their way on account of poor sight as neither can see over a few yards. Notwithstanding their advanced age the exposure seems to have no serious effects and the aged pair is about again.

The accompanying illustration was taken for The Journal three days after they had been found. It is thought to be the first ever published of them. Doctor Johnson is the only fullblood husband died in the hospital at Vancouver, Wash. The law entitles her to \$10 for one child and \$1.60 for each additional child. The family lives in four rooms and is practically destitute at present. Since her husband died, Mrs. Hirschman has sold two cows and provided for necessities in that way. The two oldest children, a boy and a girl, are seeking work, but have been unsuccessful so far.

BURNED TREE FALLS ONTO BUGGY, KILLING 2

Arthur Smith, Wahkiacus, Wash., Millowner, and His Wife Crushed to Death.

Centerville, Wash., Aug. 13.—Arthur Smith and wife were crushed to death Monday night on the Deles-Wahkiacus road, when a tree fell across the road and struck the vehicle in which they were driving. Another account of the big, Ed. Cox, was hurt, but his injuries are not considered serious. Mr. Smith owned a sawmill at Wahkiacus, a small station on the Goldendale branch of the S. P. & N., to which point they were returning when the accident occurred. Two small children survive the Smiths. The tree had burned at the bottom. Cox dragged himself to a farmhouse, arriving early yesterday morning.

GEVURTZ CREDITORS WILL TEST TAXATION LAW

To test the law passed by the last legislature providing for the taxation of bankrupt estates, Attorney Chris Bell, representing the creditors of I. Gevurtz & Sons, bankrupts, is preparing to fight the assessment of \$3400.30 which County Assessor Reed is attempting to collect for 1913. The law provides that county assessors collect for the year in which the bankruptcy occurs at the rate of the levy of the preceding year. The matter will be threshed out before Chester G. Murphy, referee in bankruptcy.

State Tax Commissioner Galloway yesterday conferred with Assessor Reed regarding the attack. Mr. Reed informed District Attorney Evans by letter that the fight was to be made and requested that he represent Multnomah county in the matter. Attorney Bell is now preparing a brief on the subject. Commissioner Galloway said that the state would intervene to protect its rights.

COMPENSATION ACT SUIT COMES UP NEXT WEEK

The hearing of evidence in the case of the suit to enjoin Secretary of State Olcott from placing on the ballot at a special election in November the reference to the people of the workmen's compensation act on account of alleged fraud, will probably begin in this city the first of next week. The opposing attorneys, E. R. Ringo and W. E. Farrell, met today and agreed upon a number of stipulations of fact. This will reduce the amount of testimony to be taken. The hearing will be before Circuit Judge Galloway. Nearly all the witnesses live in Portland.

MCCREDIE REFUSES TO SELL ANY PLAYER BEFORE NEXT FRIDAY

Portland Manager Will Take Chance on Losing One of His Stars in the Draft.

Next Friday is the closing date for the sale of Pacific Coast, American association or Eastern league baseball players to the National and American leagues. Delivery must be made before August 25 or the players are subject to draft. For the first time since he has been connected with baseball in a managerial capacity, Walter McCredie will not sell one of his players, taking a chance of losing one in the draft. The Class AA draft price is \$2500. McCredie will lose a lot of money, but he figures that he will more than make up for it in the box office. Had the team been a winner from the start this season, the club would have come out on the long end, but as it is they barely broke even until the last visit south of the Beavers, when the Seals rolled through the turnstile in a manner to make even a magnate shake hands with himself.

Manager McCredie admitted this morning that he had received several offers for players, but none of them is flattering enough to make him forget his resolution not to sell.

McCredie also stated that when he left for the south on the next trip he would take Lou Stanley, the Colt southpaw, and Dave Bancroft, the shortstop, along with him. This probably means that he will give Nick Williams the services of Al Carson and Mike McCormick to offset the loss of the two young stars.
