"I am glad to see that Secretary McAdoo has determined to use the United States treasury to some extent to help move the crop of Oregon into the south. I have nothing against New York city as the financial headquarters of the nation, still it is well for it to learn that treasury favors hereafter will be more evenly distributed.

"I hope congress will enact a currency reform bill this session, even if it is not the most perfect one. It is not likely to be, but its defects can be cured later when clearly seen. Most any kind of a measure will be an improvement upon our present panic breeding currency laws.

With the opening of the Panama canal water transportation comes as a new subject and we must devote ourselves anew to this matter and at once lest we are left behind in the new development that is coming to our coast," writes Mr. Alexander.

"We of the inland empire are especially interested on account of the early opening of the Cello canal that will give us water rates for scores of young cities that lie along and near the Columbia and its navigable tributaries."
