Two Ask Heavy Damages.—Injured July 3, when a sling of flour fell on him while he was engaged in loading the steamer "Sasana," H. A. Adams, a longshoreman, is suing the McCabe company and the Hamburg-American line for \$10,000 in an action just started in federal court. Adams, according to the complaint, was in the hold directly under the hatch, when the winch let go and the big sling of flour came tumbling down. A broken back, causing partial paralysis, and other serious injuries, are said to have been sustained. Laura Mills was a passenger on a Great Northern train early last month on her way from Seattle to Vancouver, Wash., when an engine had a rear end collision with it. She was bumped out of her seat and back again, and injured to the extent of \$26,580, according to the complaint of the suit started in federal court.

One Deputy for City and County.—Both the city and county will save money under an arrangement just made between District Attorney Evans and City Attorney La Roche. In the future only one deputy from one of the offices at a time will represent the state and city in the municipal court. The deputy city attorney who has charge of the court during the city attorney's time to handle affairs there will be deputized by District Attorney Evans and City Attorney La Roche will deputize the deputy district attorney assigned to the court when the district attorney's office is in control. Under the present arrangement it is necessary for each office to keep a deputy at the municipal court.

Girls' Swimming Contests.—The city swimming tournament for girls and women will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 in Peninsula park. The following program will be given: Fifty foot dash, standing start; 50 foot dash, water start (juniors); 100 foot dash, standing start; diving, front from springboard, front from pedestal, front from pedestal to springboard, back from springboard, front flip, pedestal to springboard, back flip from springboard, cut-a-way, two at choice and doll race. Every event promises to be of interest, and all who are interested in the playground work should be present.

Alleged Insurance Swindlers Plead.—Pleas of not guilty were entered yesterday afternoon, by J. C. LaFrance and his wife, Emilie LaFrance, before Circuit Judge Cleaton to charges of swindling insurance and fraternal organizations out of approximately \$15,000 insurance. LaFrance disappeared and a body was found which was declared to be his. Later he was discovered alive and the operations of the pair were unmasked. A demurrer to the indictment based on the contention that the facts set out did not constitute a crime was overruled. The two will be tried during the fall term of court.

Heavy Traffic to Seaside.—Beach traffic over the Astoria line of the S. P. & N. is heavier this year than ever

before, according to figures just compiled in the office of Traffic Manager W. O. Skinner of the Hill lines in Oregon. The records show that 500 more passengers have made the trip from Portland to the sea over the line this year than last, and last year's figures hit the high mark to that time. An idea of the tremendous traffic may be gained from the statement that last Sunday night the two sections from Seaside brought 350 through passengers to Portland, exclusive of some 300 passengers that traveled only part of the distance.

Park Band Concerts Successful.—The attendance at all of the concerts given in the public parks by the Portland Park band during the season which closed Tuesday night is estimated at 268,000 persons. Approximately 8000 persons, according to this figure, attended each concert. According to Superintendent of Parks Minche the season was the most successful in history. The total concert cost the city \$6000. Lack of funds is the cause of discontinuing the concerts so early in the summer. Next season it is hoped, however, to arrange for music during all the summer months.

Miss Bigelow to Lecture.—An illustrated lecture will be given Friday evening in the auditorium of The Journal building by Miss Luna E. Bigelow, of the educational department of the United States department of agriculture. Her subject will deal with good roads in the rural school districts; not from the usual point of view of mechanical construction, but in relation to the development of the child; showing the necessity of better roads for the betterment of the education and recreation of the country school children.

Woman Promises Better Life.—Lillian Nelson, a woman of the underworld arrested Monday night in the general raid, promised Municipal Judge Stevenson this morning to quit immoral life. Upon this promise, the judge suspended sentence, saying he would give her all the assistance possible. "I'm always glad to give another chance where it is deserved," said the court. "In this case, the girl shall have all assistance possible from the court."

Dentist Sued for Damages.—Alleging that Edward Edwards, of the Chicago Painless Dentists, practiced without a state license and did such poor work in fitting a crown that an abscess formed and an operation was necessary, Lina Petersen has filed suit for \$2500 damage against the company and Edward and Evalina Edwards, the partners owning the offices. The woman alleges that the abscess left a permanent scar in her chin and cavity in her jaw bone.

Narrow Escape From Death.—L. Heller, a carpenter, living at 1403 East Hoyt street, had a narrow escape from death last Monday, when, in working in a sewer ditch at East Fifty-second and East Hoyt streets, he was struck by the end of a mail which fell from the hands of a workman at the top of the excavation. A deep gash was cut in his head and he was otherwise bruised. He will recover.

Health Bulletin Issued.—The first health bulletin to be issued by the city health department since the new administration took office has just made its appearance and may be secured at the health office. It contains much information relative to sanitation, how to keep healthy and a comprehensive list of the ratings of the various dairies.

Assets Small, Liabilities Large.—A judgment for \$12,250, brought against the petitioner, Leo Barr of Salem, in favor of the United States National bank of Salem, is the principal item of indebtedness listed in the bankruptcy schedule filed in the federal court. The total indebtedness is \$20,580.23 and the assets amount to \$106.

Trunk Company Fails.—A voluntary application for bankruptcy adjudgment has been filed with the federal clerk by representatives of the Western Trunk & Leather Works of 312 Second street. The debt schedule totals \$3542.98 and the assets are \$4825.32. J. S. Kallisher is named as president of the institution.

Child Drinks Poison.—While crawling around the house yesterday afternoon, the two year old child of an Italian family by the name of Salori found a bottle of liquid, which it drank, making it quite ill from the effects. The child is at the St. Vincent's hospital, being much better this morning.

Campaign Against Shacks.—A campaign against barns and shacks used for the housing of livestock has been started by the city health officer, who has instructed his deputies to arrest all owners not complying with the city ordinance regulating such buildings and their sanitation facilities.

Assaulting Boomer Escapes Sentence.—The agreement of E. F. Foster to change his boarding house saved him Tuesday from sentence for assaulting Mrs. B. Kauffman. District Judge Bell found him guilty of the assault, but continued sentence during good behavior.

Electrical Engineer Selected.—Lloyd B. Stone, who heads the list of civil service eligibles, will receive the recently created position of deputy electrical inspector. The position pays a salary of \$100 a month. The appointment will be made today.

W. O. W. CONVENTION IS NEARING ITS END

With Election of Officers Over Effort Will Be Made to Adjourn Tonight.

With election of officers safely out of the way, the quadrennial convention of the Women of Woodcraft today planned for an adjournment tonight, though many items of miscellaneous business remained, and it was thought by some that the end might not be reached unless another night session were held.

Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdal was unanimously re-elected grand guardian, beginning her seventeenth successive year of administration. J. L. Wright, grand clerk, and Mrs. Bertha Leach, grand banker, were likewise retained in office, with no opposition developing at the actual vote.

The other officers chosen are: Grand adviser, Mrs. Evangeline Harris of Colorado; past guardian, Mrs. Kansas Goodenough of Colorado; grand magician, Mrs. Minerva Marshall of Eureka, Cal., who succeeds Mrs. L. F. Menefee of Portland; grand attendant, Mrs. Hilda McConnell of Idaho, succeeding Mrs. Elizabeth Graham of Wyoming; grand inner sentinel, Mrs. Ella Isger of Colorado; grand outer sentinel, Mrs. Elizabeth D. Hinds of San Jose, Cal.

To make the remainder of the board of grand managers, of which the three head officers are ex officio members, these six were chosen: Cora O. Wilson, California; Annie Hawkins, Oregon; Anna Mardell, Montana; Mary E. Baer, Utah; Mary J. Hunt, Colorado, and Kate Edwards, Washington. The convention yesterday voted to place the grand banker upon a more direct relation with the convention itself by voting to require her to account for the interest on funds deposited by her. As compensation, the salary of the officer was raised from \$1500 to \$2000 per year.

FOREIGN STOCK BRINGS SCAB TO LAKE COUNTY

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, Aug. 14.—Stockmen of Lake county have protested to the department of agriculture against a permit being issued for sheep and cattle from other states to graze on Oregon forest lands without license from state authorities. It is alleged that scab has been introduced in this way, costing sheep men thousands of dollars to eradicate. An appeal has been made to Senator Chamberlain to aid in keeping outside stock from ranges insufficient for state flocks.

UNEVEN TRACK TO BLAME FOR WRECK

Washington, Aug. 14.—Chief Safety Appliance Inspector Belknap reported to the Interstate Commerce commission today that the wreck on the Oregon-Washington Railway & Navigation company train on the Northern Pacific track, May 12, at Lakeview, Wash., was due to uneven and insecure tracks. Four persons were killed in the wreck.

Children Find Woman's Skeleton. Los Angeles, Aug. 14.—Investigation is ordered today of the discovery by children playing in the Los Angeles river bed of a sack containing what physicians have pronounced to be the skeleton of a young woman. The skull was fractured, apparently by a blow with a club. The bones evidently had been buried about three years ago.
