SEASIDE, OR., Aug. 16.—This week there have been more people in Seaside than any other week during the season. Though the season was a little tardy this year, when it did open the throngs of week end visitors proved the popularity of Seaside as a summer resort.

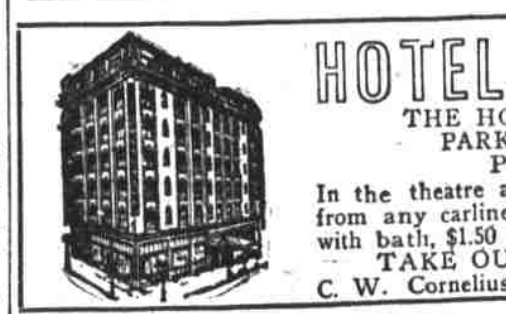

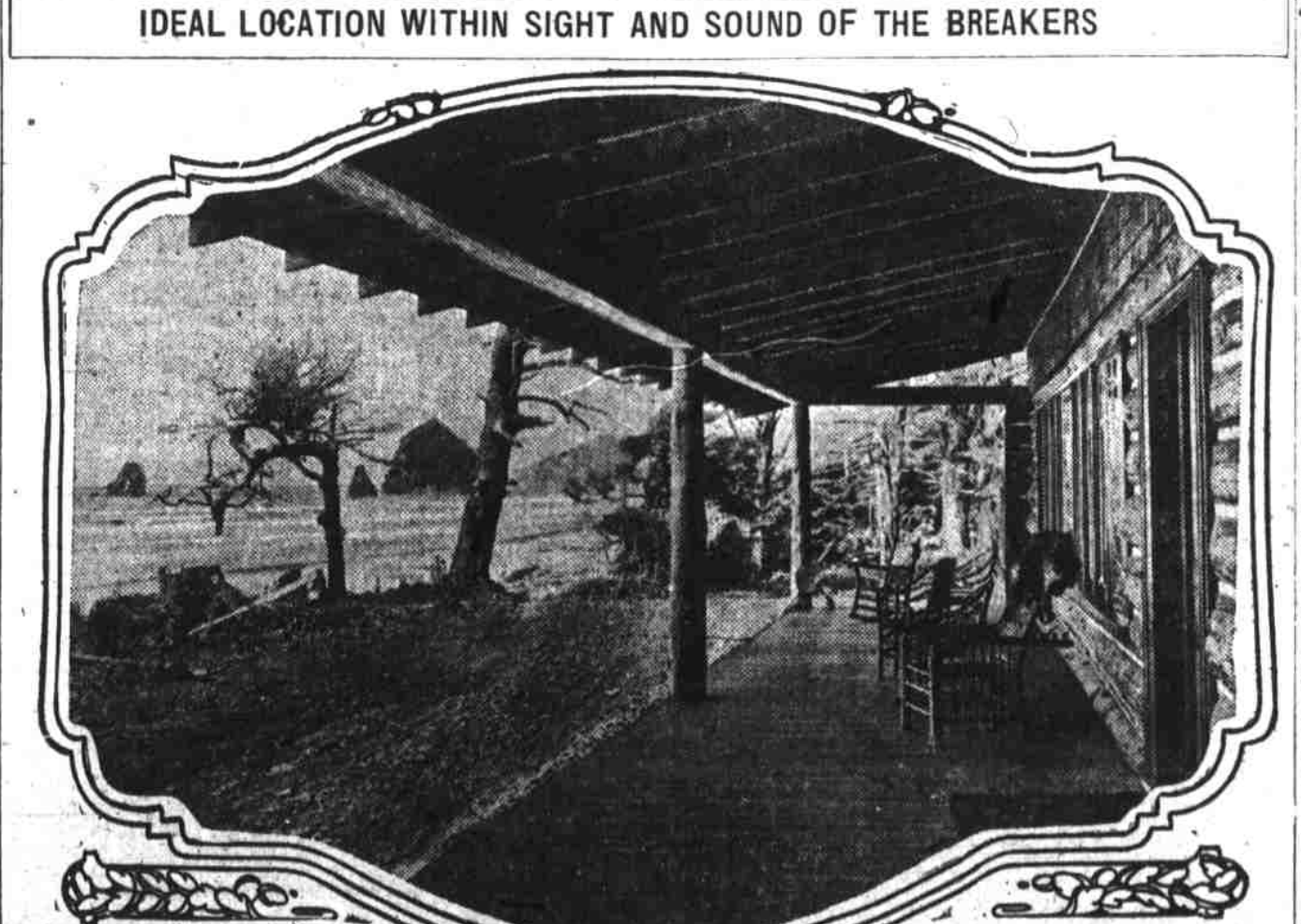
