

BEAVERS PANNING PAGE AND MAGGART FOR CAUSING MORNING PRACTICE

TWO ANGELENS BEAT MACKMEN OUT OF 1ST GAME OF LAST SERIES

They Bat in Runs and Cut Off Tickered Hits When Men Are on Bases.

Page and Maggart 3, Portland 2. That succinctly describes the defeat yesterday afternoon of the league leaders after one of the hardest battles of the season.

Maggart drove in all three of the Los Angeles runs, while this was Page's first career hit. The pair twice in the first and second innings and pulled down tickled hits, afterward doubling out men on bases; assisted in or directly retired eight of the nine men put out in the first three innings, starting three double plays. Some afternoon for this pair of beauties.

Had it not been for the activities of Page in particular, the Beavers would doubtless have gathered another game. Some twenty odd pastimes who hover under the credit wing can thank Page and Maggart for the general order to report again for morning practice, which had been discontinued in view of the Beavers' winning streak.

They Chased Crabs. About all the satisfaction the Beavers got out of it was the chasing of Crabs to the clubhouse in the sixth inning, but of the 11 men who faced Pol Perritt in 3 1/2 innings, only one man, Chadbourne, reached first. James gave way to Pinchhitter Spears in the eighth and Harry Krause finished up the game without being scored upon.

Fortland started off like a winner. With Chadbourne out, both Derrick and Rodgers shot two baggers down the third base line, about a foot inside the cushion. With one run in things looked rosy, especially when Lindsay routed one that looked good for two more sacks. However, Page sprang backward and upward at the same time, pulling the ball out of the ozone. Rodgers was near third when Page doubled him out at second.

After Doane walked in the second, Kores' routed another high one over Page's head, but he leaped into the air and duplicated the first inning trick. This time doubling Doane off first. After Page sneared Chadbourne's low fly over the same territory by another high leap in the third, Bill James, who was on first from a single, succeeded in getting back to the bag and saved himself. However, Derrick sent a grounder to Page and he and James fell into a double play trap.

The Work of Maggart. Now for Mr. Maggart's part: Page singled to right in the fourth and Wotell sent a torrid grounder Lindsayward, which the Beaver third baseman deflected so that Kores could not get the ball. Moore sacrificed and Maggart routed a two bagger a couple of feet inside first base and just out of Derrick's reach. It cleaned the bases. Kores threw Howard and Johnson out and ended the inning.

Wotell's single through short in the sixth, his stolen bases, Moore's out and Maggart's drive through short, gave the visitors the winning run. James opened the Beaver half of the sixth with a walk. Chadbourne sent a high fly to short right that Page and Wotell got mixed on, but the latter placed up the ball in time to force James at second. Rodgers doubled to center field and Chadbourne scored from first. Perritt replaced Crabs and Lindsay lofted to Howard.

There must be a few financial details arranged before Al Carson will report to Nick Williams' Colts. Judge McCredie tendered Al a Northwestern league contract yesterday, asking him to report at once to Nick Williams at Victoria. Al was waiting for the judge yesterday afternoon to ask him about transportation back to San Diego at the end of the season and the loss of a month's salary from the time the Northwestern league season closes and that of the Coast league ends.

"You can't make me believe that I still haven't got a lot more than some of the pitchers in the Coast league," asserted the soldier. "A fellow needs work, and I haven't been getting it. I asked to be sent over to Nick earlier in the season, so that I could get some work, but Walter wasn't ready to send me.
