Think Patient Has Lupus.—A Mexican giving trouble at Y. Antonio, was taken into custody this morning by the police for having a skin disease known as lupus. The nose, cheeks and roof of the mouth are badly swollen from the disease. It was first reported the man had leprosy, but physicians from the city health office diagnosed the malady as lupus. The man was turned over to the county physician for attention. Antonio arrived last night from Seattle, where he claims, he received treatment for the disease, but without results.

Fouts Case Continued.—The case against Attorney Seneca Fouts, who was arrested in the street speaking affair Monday night, will be heard in municipal court August 27 by a jury. Fouts made this request when the case was called this morning. William Williams, arrested for assault, and Arvid Koonitz, charged with disorderly conduct, are still in the county jail. Their cases have not been set. Both were arrested by the sheriff for street speaking.

Weapon Looked Dangerous.—A rubber pipe with a heavy iron bolt on one end is the weapon Samuel Wold had when arrested last night at Elwood and Burnside streets. He was found in a hallway by Patrolman Huntington. Wold refused to tell what he proposed doing with the weapon. He was visited this morning in the jail by members from the newly organized independent seafarers' union. The case of carrying concealed weapons against him will be heard Thursday.

WATER SERVICE WILL BE GREATLY IMPROVED

Woodstock District to Have One 24 Inch and Two 12 Inch Mains at Once.

At the regular meeting of the Woodstock Improvement club Monday night the water committee reported that the conference with Commissioner Dieck had resulted in a promise for better water service in the district. A 24 inch main will be laid from the reservoir to the district, and two 12 inch mains will be laid in the west portion of the district.

Mr. Dieck assured the committee that these improvements had actually been ordered, and that it would be but a short time when the Woodstock water service would be one of the best in the city. Several other clubs in the southeast district cooperated with the Woodstock

club in the agitation for improved water service.
The committee appointed to investigate the bonding of small sewer assessments reported that the new city government had ruled that no assessment under \$25 could be bonded. This, they claim, is supported by state law which supersedes any city ordinance.

The club voted an amendment to the by-laws which places the dues at 25 cents a quarter, payable in advance. This was done in order to hold out more of an inducement to the people of the district to join the club.

Other movements, including parks and playgrounds, street improvements, improved street crossings and the enforcement of the new weed cutting ordinance were discussed but no definite action was taken. A large number of the property owners of the district were present at the meeting.
