'TUFF' MAY BRING IN MUCH GOLD TO CROOK

Millions of Tons of Building Rock Available Near Prineville.

(Special Correspondence.) Prineville, Or., Aug. 21.—Prineville has about 25,000 acres of irrigated land tributary to it, lying mostly on Crooked river and the Ochoco. Fully 20,000 more could be developed and undoubtedly will be within a few years.

One of the industries that may be developed soon is that of quarrying the building rock known as "tuff." The Prineville hotel is built of it, and some great expectations are entertained for it in building enterprises.

BIG WHITE PINE MILL TO RUN AGAIN MONDAY

Reconstruction Has Been Fast; New Plant Will Run Day and Night.

(Special to The Journal.) Baker, Or., Aug. 21.—In less than three months from the time its immense plant at South Baker was destroyed by fire, entailing a loss of \$125,000 to \$150,000, the Baker White Pine Lumber company will have its new mill in operation.

The new plant has been erected under the supervision of Frank Gardiner, manager of the company, and is up-to-date in every respect, a more permanent and better mill than the one destroyed.
