

CHARLES A. BRODDIE DEAD AS RESULT OF MIDNIGHT QUARREL

Peter Moeller, Neighbor, Is at Police Station, Held Upon a Charge of Murder.

Charles A. Broddie, scow dweller at the foot of California street, was shot at 2:15 o'clock this morning at his home by Peter Moeller, a neighbor, and died within an hour at St. Vincent's hospital. Moeller is held at the police station on the charge of murder.

Leading up to the shooting was an argument over their respective marksmanship. Mrs. Broddie attempted to separate the men, when Moeller reached over the woman's shoulder and fired a 22 caliber bullet into the breast of her husband. He then went to his scow, where he was arrested by Captain Keller and Patrolman Morelock.

Broddie was a cabinetmaker. He is survived by a widow and three children. He was about 35 years old. Moeller is a bachelor and about 40 years old. Moeller owns the scows in which he and the Broddie family lives. Yesterday afternoon he went to the circus, and upon his return he began drinking. A man named Lambert was with him the greater part of the evening. About midnight Broddie joined the two men in Moeller's scow.

Moeller began talking about hunting and trapping, both telling of narrow escapes they have had with wild animals, and of their accurate use of the rifle in close quarters. Both claimed to be good shots.

The argument at times grew warm. At one time Moeller demonstrated his marksmanship by shooting at a can under the scow with a revolver. Broddie later went home and Moeller went over to see him. The argument about marksmanship was resumed, whereupon Moeller wanted to shoot at a can on a table. Broddie objected, on the ground that his wife and children were there.

Words followed this refusal to shoot at the can, in which Broddie ordered Moeller out of the house. Moeller refused to go, and was pushed out of the door by Broddie. At this point Mrs. Broddie stepped between the two men, attempting to separate them. Then Moeller, she says, reached over her shoulder and fired one shot into the breast of her husband, who fell in the doorway.

When Captain Keller and Patrolman Morelock arrived the woman was in hysterics, attempting to revive the wounded man. Moeller offered considerable resistance to the police when arrested, but was handcuffed to a telephone pole, while the wounded man was sent to the hospital in the Ambulance Service car. Moeller asserts the shooting was accidental, saying the shot was discharged while he was trying to show Broddie how well he could shoot. Deputy District Attorney Murphy was called to take the statements of the woman and other witnesses.

Drifters Are Picked Up.
Long Beach, Cal., Aug. 22.—Four men who had been adrift in the launch

Calypso since Tuesday afternoon without food, deserted the launch yesterday afternoon 35 miles east of Catalina Island, starting to row to Avalon in a lifeboat. They were picked up at 8:30 last night by Captain J. A. Paschall in the launch Panama after they had covered a distance of 12 miles. All were exhausted. Paschall later took the Calypso in tow and arrived with it at San Pedro early today.

DIVINING ROD IS USED TO FIND \$20,000,000

Paris, Aug. 22.—With the aid of an expert with a divining rod, treasure seekers are today trying to locate \$20,000,000 in gold lost in the Bay of Biscay nearly 100 years ago. M. Leon Falcoz, who distinguished himself as the divining rod expert here a few months ago, is the expert of the expedition.

The Count de Saint Paul, a Frenchman, emigrated to South America during the French revolution and there amassed a huge fortune. In 1820 he decided to return to his native land and so chartered a three masted sailing vessel named Lejeune Henri. The ship foundered off Oleron, in the Bay of Biscay, but as the tide here runs about 45 feet at low water, part of the wreck showed and vandals boarded her and carried off all they could find. The coffee containing the gold, however, had been washed into deep water through a hole in the side of the ship, and it is this that Falcoz hopes to locate at the instigation of one of the descendants of the Count de Saint Paul, a young girl, Mlle. Guillard de Saint Paul.

FOREST LAND NOT YET READY FOR ENTRY

BIG FIRE THREATENS TO DESTROY QUINCY

Quincy, Ill., Aug. 22.—Fire is threatening the destruction of Quincy's business district this afternoon. One block in the heart of the retail district already is in ruins and the conflagration is gaining headway.

Twenty-five houses were burned in a lively stable, where the fire started.

Steps Off Ledge to His Death.

Los Angeles, Aug. 22.—A grass grown ledge, making a drop of 150 feet, down the side of a mountain, is responsible today for the death of John B. Rawley of Monrovia. Rawley's 18-year-old son and a nephew of the same age saw him step into space late yesterday. He fell into a pool of water 12 feet deep and the boys dived for more than an hour before recovering the body.

Austrian Admiral Injured.

Pola, Austria, Aug. 22.—Three persons were killed here yesterday and five were wounded, including Admiral Langus, as the result of an explosion while a naval gun was being tested.

Articles of Incorporation.

Curtis R. Guntzel, J. F. Alexander and M. H. Clark yesterday filed articles of incorporation of the Molalla Electric company, capitalized at \$50,000, with County Clerk Coffey.

GOUGH BANKER HITS AT CURRENCY BILL AS FORMING BIG MACHINE

President of Chase National Bank Says It Gives President Too Much Power.

Chicago, Aug. 22.—Criticism of the Democratic currency bill was voiced today by A. Barton Hepburn, president of the Chase National bank, of New York, and chairman of the currency committee of the American Bankers' association. Hepburn's attack came at a conference here of representatives of banking and clearing house associations, called by the currency committee to discuss the Owen-Glass bill.

Hepburn's opposition to the measure was based on the following grounds: Dominating by the government of a federal reserve board which is intended to control banks; the regional reserve plan, dividing the country into 12 zones, each having a separate federal reserve bank instead of creating a single reserve bank, as Hepburn all along has advocated. He also objected to the provision making the government responsible for notes issued by banks.

Has Many Good Features.
"The proposed law," said Hepburn, "has many commendable features. It creates a central bank and establishes branch banking. It also recognizes bank assets in the form of commercial paper as a normal and proper basis for bank currency and provides for keeping the government's current funds in use instead of locking them up in the treasury vaults. But while we have reason to rejoice over the force of sound principles recognized, we must regret that the bill only partly embodies them."

Hepburn severely criticized the provision making the secretary of the treasury, the secretary of agriculture, the comptroller of the currency and four others to be appointed by the president and the senate members of the federal reserve board, on the ground that they would be under the president's domination and might become a dangerous political machine.

Objects to Furnishing Capital.
He also objected to the provision which requires national banks to furnish capital for the proposed federal reserve banks, but without giving the former the slightest control over the latter. Hepburn wanted to know why banks should be asked to furnish this capital any more than any other industry. He also asked why the whole people should not furnish it through the United States treasury.

The bankers hope to reach an agreement tomorrow on a concerted form of protest against the bill. The members of the currency committee would not say whether the protest would take the form of a request for a new bill or amendments to the present measure.

Forty-seven states were represented at the meeting, the delegates representing financial institutions with assets in excess of \$15,000,000,000.

THAW FOUND SANE BY PRISON DOCTOR AFTER LONG TEST

approaching the prison in which Thaw is confined is subjected to the closest scrutiny.

Magistrate Mulvane, postponed for a week the case against Mitchell Thompson, a chauffeur, accused of bringing Thaw, an adjudged lunatic, into Canada. The delay is due to the non-arrival of the record of Thaw's commitment to the Matteawan asylum.

Owing to his fear that a rescue would be attempted, the governor of the jail refused today to permit any visitors to see Thaw. He would not even transmit a note, saying he intended to take no chances.

Guards to Prevent Kidnaping.
It is understood, on the other hand, that Roger O'Mara, Thaw's Pittsburgh friend, has been asked to send two of his huskiest strong arm men here to guard Thaw against any attempt at kidnaping by the emissaries of New York state.

That party here which is eager to send Thaw back to Matteawan asserts Thaw's friends are exerting political pressure at Ottawa to gain their ends. They point out the fact that every lawyer Thaw has hired is a Conservative. That party controls the Dominion government, although Quebec is a Liberal province.

Federal Officers Won't Interfere.
Washington, Aug. 22.—Secretary of Labor William B. Wilson today telegraphed Acting Governor Glynn of New York that he is unable to find any law under which the United States government can ask Canada to deport Harry K. Thaw. He said:

"I am advised that steps have already been taken by the state department to bring the matter to the department's attention through the ordinary diplomatic channels."

Secretary Bryan said that under the present treaties Canada cannot compel Thaw's deportation and that extradition is the only method by which he may be returned to New York.

Vermont Asked to Hold Thaw.
Albany, N. Y., Aug. 22.—Acting Governor Glynn today telegraphed the following message to the governor of Vermont:

"I am informed that the Canadian authorities will deport Harry Thaw to Vermont about Wednesday next. I request that you have him apprehended immediately and held awaiting a requisition."

Evelyn Makes Hay.
New York, Aug. 22.—Bitter denunciation of Harry K. Thaw was voiced here this afternoon by his wife, Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, as she was preparing to go to her theatre for the matinee performance, under guard.

"The man is crazy," she said. "It is absurd to think that Harry loves me. He is controlled by his egotism."

"When he learned of my success on the stage he was furious. He wanted me in the gutter and able to get out only with his aid. When he found that I was independent, he determined to escape and kill me."

Asks Tender to Protect Him.
Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 22.—A plea from Harry K. Thaw, at Sherbrooke, Quebec, asking the lawyers, the Thaw family here to secure Governor Tomlinson's aid in his behalf was received in the form of a telegram here today. Thaw declared he is a citizen of Pennsylvania and maintains that he is the victim of a conspiracy.

"I think it is the duty of the governor of Pennsylvania to protect me," he said. "You can't convince the mother of a first baby that all men are born equal."
