Wife's Estate 1 oved Small.—Eleven days before Julia Kekel died, a divorce complaint against her husband, John Kekel, was dismissed. Mrs. Kekel died August 11 from the effects of an operation. She had charged her husband with habitual drunkenness. In an affidavit for alimony she alleged that he held in trust for her 35 acres of Clackamas county land and \$2422 which had been collected from rents and interest. In the petition for administration of the estate only \$100 personal effects were listed. Kekel was appointed administrator, with the consent of the children, of whom there are nine. The property she claimed in the affidavit is in his name, and will not go through the probate court.

May Have to Register Again.—Since the proposed recall of Sheriff Tom Word was launched by the I. W. W. sympathizers, registration has begun to pick

up and at present a score or more men and women sign the registration cards and affidavits daily. A few have stated outright that they desired to register in order to sign the recall petition, but most give no indication of their purpose. County Clerk Coffey is discouraging registration at this time as the boundaries of precincts are to be changed this fall and those who register now may later have to reregister, thus causing a great deal of unnecessary clerical work.

Judge Gatens on Bench.—Circuit Judge Gatens telephoned from the bench this morning that he would return next Tuesday and take up the hearing of motions, default divorces and ex-parte matters. Tuesday afternoon will be devoted to juvenile court cases and the remainder will be heard Saturday morning, August 30. Wednesday afternoon Judge Gatens will hear widows pension matters and Friday he will set cases and call the docket in his department of the circuit court.

them were closed. The closing, however, was but of momentary benefit. With a report like that of a muffled explosion, every glass in every port hole in the dining room broke in.

"It seems remarkable that any of us should have escaped. Just as we instinctively closed the port holes, so did our sea sense prompt us to herd the passengers up out of the saloon onto the deck.

"To our credit, it should be said that no waiter or steward left the dining room until every passenger had been driven out.

Starboard Boats Can't Be Used.—As I left the saloon, I hurried to the bow of the vessel. Already three boats had been lowered from the port side. The starboard boats were useless, because of the list of the boat, which would not permit them to swing free.

"I remember remarking to myself the ease with which the port boats were lowered. So great was the list that when they were swung over the side they were but a few inches above the water.

"It seems almost impossible that all I tell you now could have happened within three minutes. I had hardly reached the deck of the vessel when the boat seemed to right itself a little, and someone called out above all the turmoil and confusion that we were on the beach and safe.

"Upon the bridge Captain Cann was calling out his orders. As soon as the ship struck he had blown three sharp blasts of the whistle and over at the cannery, not far away, men were running about, preparing to put out with the gas boats there.

Down Goes Whole Deckload.—Then came one of the most harrowing incidents ever told in stories of disasters of the sea. There came another list to port and forward. Gathered together on the bow of the boat were the passengers from the dining cabin and those who had come from their berths.

"With them were the members of the crew—engineers and firemen, driven from their stations below, waiters, stewards, deck hands and others.

"Alongside the vessel were three lifeboats, filled or partly filled with pas-

OREGON COUPLE HAS HAD 18 CHILDREN

Nine brothers and nine sisters, and all alive but one boy who was killed accidentally, at the age of 12 years.

This is the remarkable record of an Oregon family. Each member is a fine specimen of physical health. The grandmother died at the age of 93, and the grandfather lived to the ripe old age of 96.

The father is 65, both are alive and well. The mother was in her fifteenth year when she married, and the father was 25.

A family of three is considered a good average nowadays," said Mr. Samuel. "This unusual showing is a high testimonial to the fact that Oregon is a good state in which to live," he said.

It proves that our climate and surroundings are conducive to longevity."

Human Beings All Around.—Then the sea seemed to rise up about us. A great wave came crashing over the vessel, and men and women passengers, officers and crew were swept away in a sea of wreckage. I came to the surface with wreckage and human beings all about me.

"The vessel was down by the bow and half way under. She seemed to break in two at the social cabin.

"Then, with a plunge, she disappeared beneath the surface, drawing down with her many of those who had come to the surface after going down with the boat.

"I managed to keep myself up on the surface. All about me there was wreckage. Near me the pilot house came up after the last plunge of the vessel. The one lifeboat that had escaped the falling smokestack and mast did duty in gathering in as quickly as possible those who were swimming about or who had managed to reach pieces of wreckage.

"I do not know how long it was before the gas boats came from the cannery. It may have been but a few moments. It may have been an hour.

Many Never Came Up Again.—I do not know, however, that many of those who came to the surface after the giant wave had washed them from the bow were gone before the rescuing hands arrived. I saw them drown not many feet from me before I, or other members of the vessel's crew could reach them. I saw the agony written plainly upon their faces and heard the agonizing cries as the sea reached up and gathered them to its depths.

In the three minutes given him between the time the State of California struck and her final plunge, Daniel C. Perkins, of Oakland, Cal., wireless operator, added another name to the list of the wireless heroes who have gone down into the ocean's depths.

Perkins was in his cabin when the vessel struck. The resultant shock was his call to duty. Not waiting to dress, he hurried to the operating room, where his assistant, Walter Chamberlain, was on duty.

Sends Subordinate to Boats.—"Get out and look after yourself," Perkins called to Chamberlain as he entered the room. "I'll send the signal."

Chamberlain left him there repeating the S. O. S. call, the word that goes out over the sea when a ship is in distress.

It was 8:29 a. m. when the striking of the ship warned Perkins. Three minutes later the vessel's mast, wrested from its fastenings by the listing of the

ship, crashed down upon the little wireless operating room, a huge wave came up and washed across the place where Perkins had been and then the ship went down and carried with it in the operating room the body of Perkins.

Miracle Befalls Captain Cann.—The story of Captain Thomas H. Cann Jr., master of the vessel, now lies deep in Gambier bay, will long be told. Up on the bridge, when the vessel struck, responsible for his ship and all its cargo, Captain Cann looked down into the confusion of the forward deck and kept his head.

Commands were given hurriedly and lifeboats were lowered, filled with passengers. Even had the starboard boats been free to swing out on their davits, it is unlikely in the three minutes given to the rescue of the passengers on deck that more than the three port boats could have been lowered.

In all the confusion the voice of Captain Cann came loud and clear. Unable to calm the frenzy of the passengers, his voice without a tinge of nervousness kept clear the heads of the members of the crew and now time was lost in the few moments given.

Then came the final list. A little to port and then the sinking of the bow. A great wave rose up, sweeping into the sea those on the forward deck, rose up about the bridge, stended for a moment and then drew the vessel down.

Captain Comes Up Again.—Captain Cann went down with his vessel, clinging to the railing of the bridge. Then a strange thing happened. The bridge was torn away and came back to the surface of the sea, the captain still clinging to its iron railings.

Then, as he had done before the vessel sank, he stood upon the bridge and in command, until the tenders from the cannery came in answer to the three sharp blasts he had blown when the vessel struck.

When all of those who lived were gathered in, Captain Cann left the scene of the wreck and went to Juneau with the rescued. From there he wired the owners here and then went back to Gambier bay. He is there now with divers prepared to secure, if possible, the bodies.

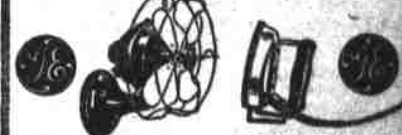
