

MRS. LANE SCOLDED BUT FREED OF JURY TAMPERING CHARGE

Accused Said She Was Life-
long Friend of Juror Bliss
and Mrs. Caminetti.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Aug. 25.—Mrs. C. D. Lane of San Francisco, accused of trying to influence W. S. Bliss, a juror in the Diggs trial, was dismissed today by Judge Van Fleet, who held she had not intended to try to influence Bliss.

Taking the stand in her own behalf, Mrs. Lane testified that she had been a lifelong friend of both Juror Bliss and Mrs. Anthony Caminetti, mother of F. Drew Caminetti. She declared that after mentioning the case to Bliss she apologized, but stated that what she had said was so unimportant that it did not seem to make any impression on Bliss.

Special Prosecutor Sullivan brought out admission from Mrs. Lane that she had mentioned the name of Bliss to Mrs. Caminetti.

"Mrs. Caminetti, however," added Mrs. Lane, "did not ask me to see Mr. Bliss, and if she had I would have told her that it would do no good because Mr. Bliss is a man of integrity."

In dismissing Mrs. Lane, Judge Van Fleet said:

"I am forced to feel that there was no settled purpose in your mind looking towards influencing the verdict, yet the circumstances emphasized the very great danger of mentioning such a case to any juror and your mention of Mrs. Caminetti gave it a very unpleasant appearance. It is necessary that the channels of justice be kept free from any contaminating influence."

"Happily no evil effect followed from your visit. I was very glad that such was the case, and that I am not called upon to inflict punishment for jury tampering is one thing that merits most severe punishment."

QUARTER BILLION IS VALUATION OF STATE PRODUCTS

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5,000,000 pounds more than a year ago. The highest price in 16 years was recently paid for prunes, therefore there is not the slightest doubt that Oregon prune growers are mighty glad.

The biggest cherry crop ever grown was produced by orchards in Oregon this season. Not only was the crop heavy, but values were unusually favorable most of the season.

Other fruits show better crops than during recent years; strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, gooseberries, and currants being in much greater supply than normal. With the exception of raspberries, prices ruled unusually good during the season.

Poultry Industry Takes Big Step.
In poultry production the greatest strides in years were made during the present season by Oregon producers. A total of 25,000,000 head of poultry was produced in the state during the season. This was worth at least \$20,000,000. Not only is the poultry industry of Oregon growing at a rapid pace, but the same is true of Idaho and Washington.

Fewer eggs were brought into Oregon and other Pacific northwest points this season than known since this section really began to grow. This is not due to any lack of demand for eggs, but to the fact that Oregon this season produced its greatest amount of eggs, the output being estimated at 100,000,000 dozen of a probable value of \$20,000,000. Taken together, the poultry industry in Oregon alone produced \$40,000,000 worth of products this season. Just as great growth was made by the industry in Idaho and Washington, and Portland being the magnet for the trade for the three states, shares in the prosperity of her sister commonwealths.

Dairy Products Large.
In dairy rapid growth is still being made by all portions of the Pacific northwest. Oregon this season produced its bumper crop of dairy products, the increase in production being the greatest known. Estimate of the total is placed at \$20,000,000. Last year, which was the greatest year heretofore, the output was estimated at close to \$17,000,000.

Wool was worth \$2,300,000 to Oregon producers this season, or only a small amount below the total of a year ago, notwithstanding the unusually low values.

Mohair was worth \$217,000 during the year, or \$600 more than during the previous season.

Honey was likewise in bigger supply, with the total output of the season placed at \$75,000, compared with \$50,000 a year ago.

The salmon industry of Oregon is one of the most important in the state. This season it brought \$2,500,000 into business channels, or about the same as

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 25.—Pendleton citizens will long remember the episode of last Thursday, when O. G. Allen, an official Round-Up photographer, who had gone insane through nervous breakdown, fled from a hospital, jumped into his auto and ran it down Court street at full speed, running finally through the front of the Pendleton-Drug company's store. Although his car ended inside the store, Allen was uninjured. "Old Allen did it," he informed the rapidly gathering crowd,

"and all he lost was his cigar." The auto had scattered cigars over the drug store floor, so Allen stooped and reimbursed himself for his loss.

Allen ran his car 13 blocks. Sometimes he had neither hand on the steering wheel. "O. G. Allen! Let 'er buck!" he yelled to the appalled spectators.

As his car struck the curb it literally flew through the air and launched itself at the entrance. It passed between the iron pillars and tore its way through the door casement and left-hand display window, crashing into the

showcases amid a shower of glass fragments and brought up sideways almost against the rear counter.

There were no customers in the store at the moment. George Hill, one of the proprietors, and Bruce Wallace, prescription clerk, were the only inmates and both changed to be in the office in the rear. Startled by the terrifying crash, they rushed out just in time to see Allen still standing in the demolished car, wholly unhurt.

In jail a few minutes later Allen was told what he had done, was amazed and wept.

STOCK PERMIT DENIED TO CYLINDER COMPANY

Blue Sky Bureau Desires to
See Some "Possible Earn-
ings" Made.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)

Salem, Or., Aug. 25.—The National Threshing Cylinder company, of Washington, applying to do business in this state, was denied a permit today by Corporation Commissioner Watson, upon the recommendation of S. B. Vincent, examiner for the department, who finds the company has a plant located near Spokane, that it has been in operation since June, 1912, and that up to the present but 30 of its patent cylinders have been manufactured, of which 16 are still undisposed of. The company has also arbitrarily raised its stock from \$1 to \$5, without showing earnings which, in the opinion of the examiner, would warrant it. The company desires to issue stock sufficient to equip and operate a larger plant. It claims that it can make with its present equipment from 10 to 12 cylinders a day at a profit of \$120 on each. Commissioner Watson in his letter refusing a permit, says:

"If you can make 10 cylinders a day at a profit of \$1200 a day with your present plant, \$36,000 a month or \$432,000 a year, I cannot see the necessity or wisdom of the sale of additional stock. It would appear on the other hand that all unsold or unused stock should be retired as a useless burden on the books."

Chaloner Offers Advice.

Richmond, Va., Aug. 25.—John Armstrong Chaloner, author of "Who's Who's Now," and who escaped from a New York asylum to Virginia, where he lives as sane today, issued to the United Press a statement on Harry Thaw's case.

"Thaw is sane," said Chaloner. "He will be freed if he follows my advice. He was insane when he shot White. I do not know Thaw. I never wrote him. I never invited him to visit me. That is a canard. And I never advised him to come to Virginia."

"I don't sympathize with the idle rich," Chaloner continued, "but I am more interested in purifying the Augean stables of the lunacy law than in anything except my salvation."

"Thaw should have had a tug meet him on the Connecticut coast to take him to Pennsylvania, where he would have had the first fair lunacy trial he has had in years."

"When I escaped from Bloomingdale asylum I set a standard for jail delivery of alleged lunatics."

"My book, 'Four Years Behind the Bars,' has been before the public so long that there is no reason for Thaw and his lawyers being ignorant. I hope Thaw will be liberated."
