WOMAN SAYS PORTLAND COLD AND COMMERCIAL

Portland is a "cold and commercial city" according to an affidavit signed by Mary E. Thiem in support of her request for \$30 a month alimony. She is being sued by John G. Thiem, a grocer of 92 Portland boulevard, for divorce. She said that she had been assisted financially by casual acquaintances actuated by charity and a desire to see justice done and added that the court knows that such are few in a "cold and commercial city like Portland."

The Thiem was married five years ago and have two children. Mrs. Thiem charged in her affidavit that he had been incarcerated wrongfully in a New York insane asylum. She said that she had worked at menial labor during the past six weeks but that she had not been able to earn more than \$4 a week. In his complaint he charged her with desertion and asked for custody of the children.

WIFE NEVER DIVORCED HUSBAND'S CONTENTION

That Alessandra Tigano, his wife, has never been legally separated from Alberto Visco, her first husband, is alleged in a complaint filed yesterday by Giuseppe Tigano asking for annulment of his marriage to her. Tigano is the leader of a band that played at the Oaks this season. The Tiganos were married in Fall River, Mass., January 23, 1909.

According to Attorney Montezza, who represents Tigano, Mrs. Tigano separated from Visco over five years ago and at the time a stipulation was entered into by which she agreed not to demand support money. After the stipulation had been effective for a year he said he believed she was divorced from Visco and married Tigano. Visco is now in the east.

WIFE WOULD ACCOMPANY HIM ONLY TO CHURCH

"She restricted her visits with me to church only," is one of the accusations made by O. O. Hull in answer to a suit for divorce by Mabel Hull. He said that his wife would not allow him to visit in his home and would not visit places of amusement or his friends with him. He also alleged that he paid bills to the amount of \$500 which she contracted prior to their marriage.

Mrs. Hull in her complaint charges that her husband accused her of associating with preachers and on one occasion threw a bucket of water over her. She asks for \$75 a month alimony which he declares he cannot pay. Hull is a farmer.

CITY AND COUNTY TO AGREE ON ROCKPILE

Disagreement Will Be Settled by Compromise If Tentative Proposition Accepted.

The county commissioners and Mayor Albee and City Commissioners Daly and Brewster yesterday agreed that the county should submit to the city a proposition embracing the terms on which the county will take over the Linnton rockpile from the city. By the terms of the proposition the county is to furnish everything except the prisoners and their food.

The city will send its prisoners to the rockpile and purchase the food and pay the cook. The county will receive all except 10 per cent of the crushed rock from the quarry. The city will retain about 2000 yards of crushed rock now piled along the road near the quarry.

The proposition is tentative and must go before the city commissioners for ratification. It comes as the result of a misunderstanding as to the conditions under which the city has been holding the property. Some days ago the city refused rock to the county and the county commissioners decided to take back the quarry.

While the city is authorized to take but 10 per cent of the output, Superintendent Hatchel, of the machinery and quarries of the county, said he sees no reason why the city should not at any time secure such rock as was needed within a reasonable amount. The county commissioners agreed with him. Road Supervisor Small said that the county would need the output of the quarry for about 100 days, counting the output as 150 to 175 yards a day, for road work projected.

CITIZEN SAILORS WILL GO ON HOLIDAY CRUISE

About 50 Booked to Leave in Boston's Whaleboat Tomorrow.

Taking advantage of Labor Day and Sunday, two days of rest, 50 men of the Oregon Naval Militia will go down the river Sunday and Monday on a two days' drill in landing, fielding and camping. The party will embark in one of the cruiser Boston's big whaleboats towed by the vessel's steam launch. The men will be equipped and accounted for a regulation scouting expedition, carrying

provisions, blankets and hammocks. The party will leave the Boston tomorrow under the command of Lieutenant Beckwith.

Drills of this description will be a complete innovation for the Oregon Naval Militia, but have been used with success for some time in California. It has been suggested that a smaller vessel should replace the Boston, as that cruiser is too large to navigate around the river at ordinary speed. A small gunboat would permit frequent training trips out of Portland under normal conditions.
