GEARHART

GEARHART, OR., Aug. 30.—More beautiful weather than that of the beach is to be found here. The cool, bracing breeze from the ocean, the warm, sunshiny days and the soft, white light of the moon in the evenings lend color to beach life. It is only with regret that the many cottagers look forward to the time when farewells will be taken with their many summer acquaintances and they turn their backs on the pleasures and environments of a delightfully spent summer vacation.

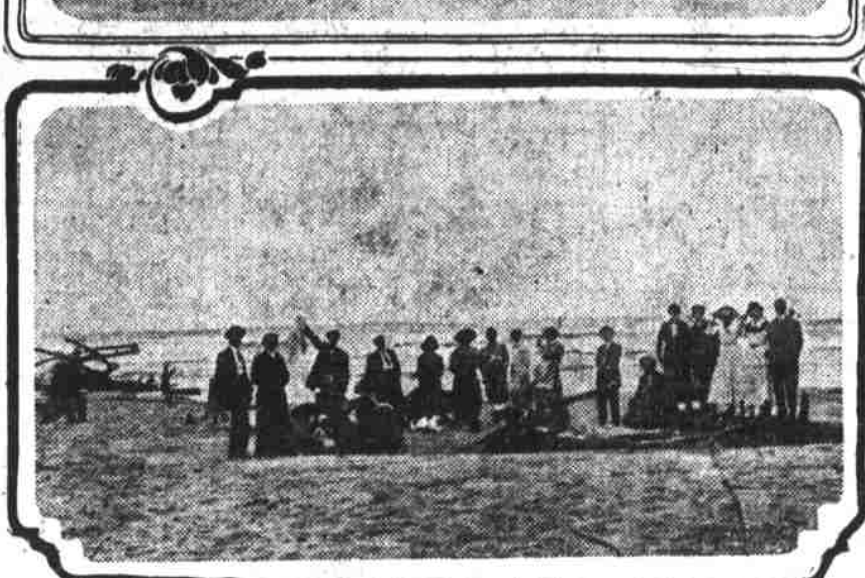
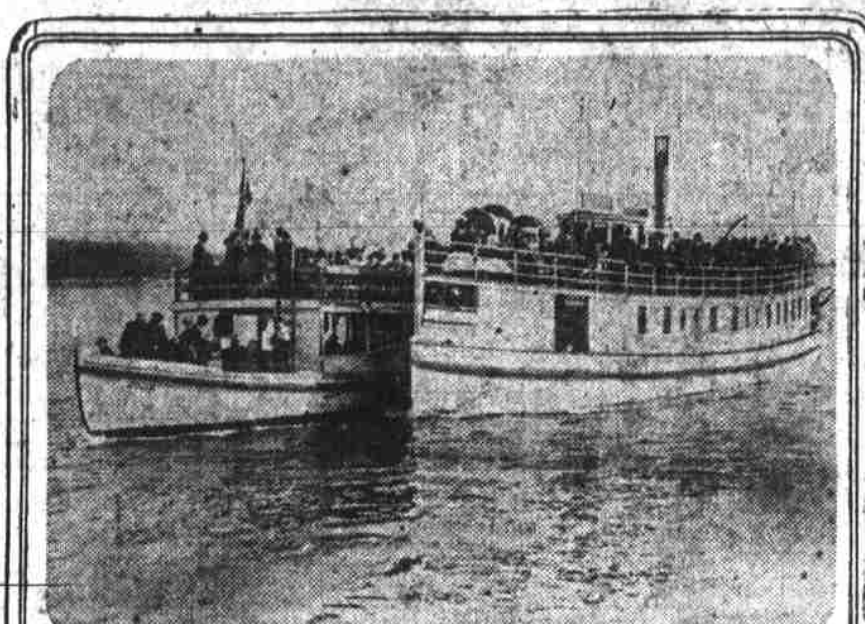

NEWPORT

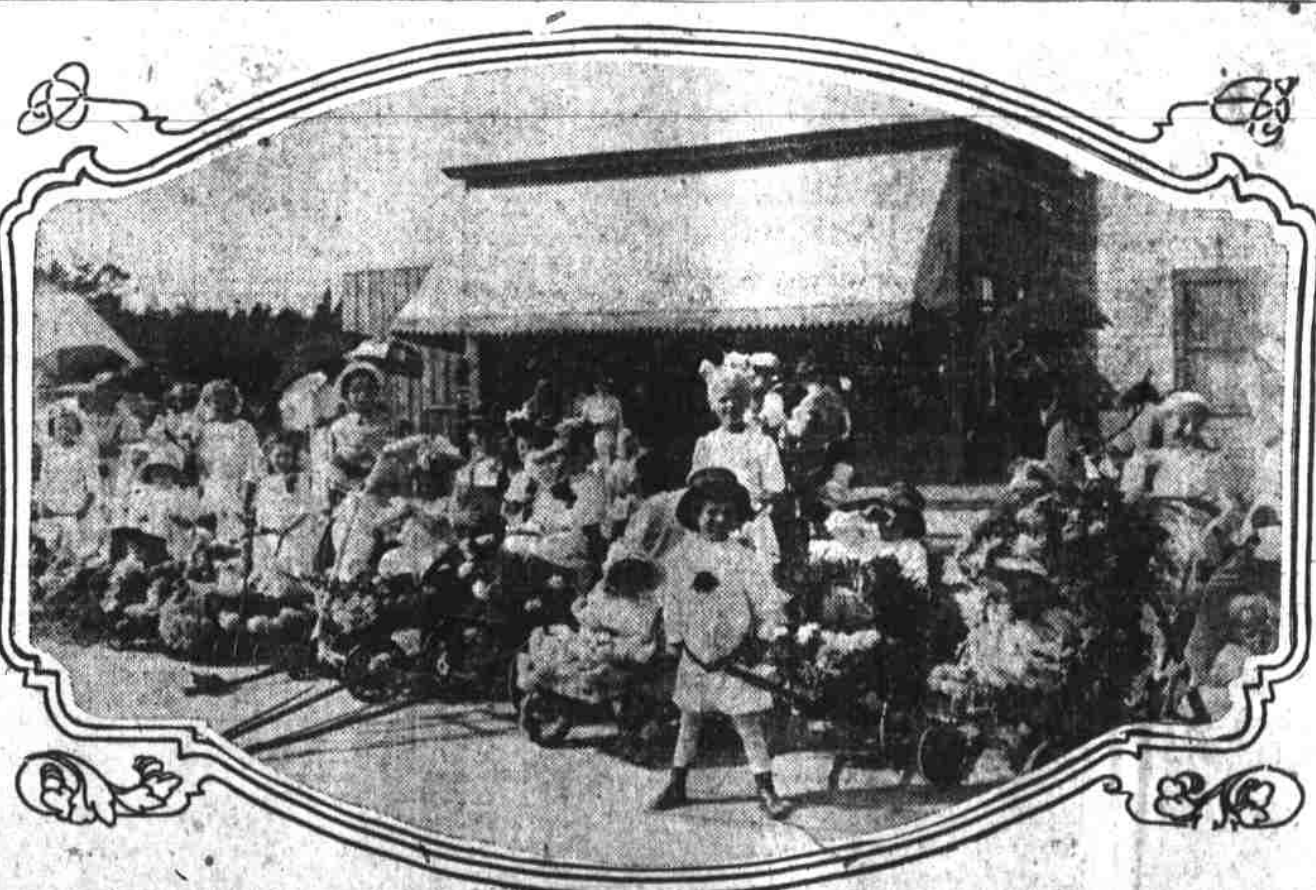

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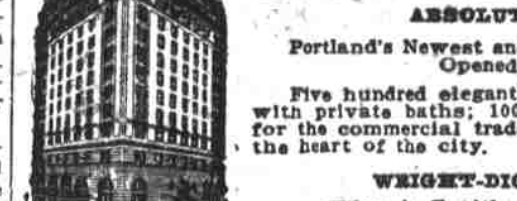

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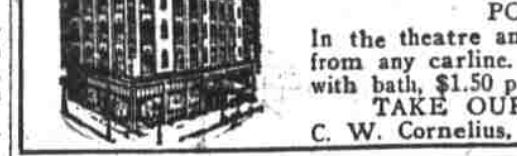
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
