

THAW MONEY AGAIN BLOCKS CLEVER PLAN OUTLINED BY JEROME

Though Outwitted This Time,
Thaw's Nemesis Is Still
Hot on Fugitive's Trail.

Sherbrooke, Quebec, Aug. 30.—The Thaw money prevailed again today against the New York idea. Instead of Harry K. Thaw being jailed in the little hamlet of Island Pond, Essex county, Vermont, he was reading and writing in the hospital ward in the Sherbrooke lock-up. The New York officials, baffled, were preparing for the renewal of the battle for possession of Stanford White's slayer next Tuesday.

Jerome, leading the fight against Thaw, banked on surprising the expensive battery of Thaw lawyers and getting Thaw into Judge Hutchinson's court before the Thaw forces would realize what it was all about. He laid his plans well, lulling the Thaw side to sleep with a declaration that he guessed the fight was off until October, his rise worked. Most of the big lawyers who are protecting the Pittsburgher's interests started for home. Chief Counsel Greenfields, the one man upon whom Thaw is counting most to get him his freedom went to Montreal.

Then Jerome acted. He had Chief of Police Boudreau of Montreal, who arrested Thaw, apply to Judge Hutchinson for a writ of habeas corpus to bring Thaw into court. The plan was, when he appeared, to have the commitment under which he is held declared invalid, have him discharged and then rushed to Montreal by the immigration authorities.

Every detail had been arranged. There was a high-powered car in waiting to make the run from this city. The board of inquiry had been selected. It was to act at once. Jerome, knowing that judges were not available on Saturday afternoon and that the immigration offices at Ottawa were shut, had hoped to shut off an appeal so that the deportation could take place tonight.

But the high-priced lawyers for Thaw blocked the pretty plan. They went before Judge Hutchinson in his chambers and protested against any summary action. They pointed out that an associate judge, Globensky, with equal power, had already passed on the same sort of a plan. They finally exacted from the court a promise that he would not grant the application without hearing both sides, and that hearing takes place next Tuesday.

Jerome was in no way downcast by the upsetting of his plan for immediate action. He declared that the fact that he would get the case before another judge as early as next Tuesday was a big victory. He declared that he was confident that the court would quash the commitment as soon as the entire facts were before it. And as soon as this takes place, he declared, Thaw will be released and sent across the line into Vermont.

No Favors for Thaw.

West Point, N. Y., Aug. 30.—The first official declaration that Harry K. Thaw, the Mattewan escaped prisoner, will be granted no favors, was made here today. It came from Honorable Charles J. Doherty, minister of justice of Canada and acting head of the interior department. Doherty, here to greet Viscount Haldane, lord high chancellor of England, said:

"Our laws and our immigration regulations are very plain. We will enforce them to the letter. Mr. Thaw must receive the same treatment—neither better nor worse—than is accorded to any other person entering the dominion."

**4500 ACRES TIMBER
SOLD BY CHICAGOAN**
Redding, Cal., Buyer Expects
to Build Fruit Box Factory
in Rogue Valley.

Medford, Or., Aug. 30.—A huge tract of timber land, lying 20 miles north of Medford, comprising 4500 acres, was sold today by the owner, J. Roughan of Chicago, to the Benton Lumber company of Redding, for \$100,000.

The new owners will immediately begin the construction of a \$25,000 fruit box factory that is to supply apple and pear boxes for the entire valley.

The timber land will be reached by seven miles of railway that will be built up Foothills creek, from Rogue river, a town on the Southern Pacific company road. Two hundred and fifty million feet of lumber can be taken from the land.

A box factory has been needed for a long time in Rogue River valley, as the million boxes used per year have been all shipped in from other sections. Several months ago the town of Rogue River had provided a \$10,000 bonus for anyone who would accept its proposal to start a box factory. It is not believed its offer holds good in this sale.

Woman Arrested as Accomplice.
Los Angeles, Aug. 30.—Mrs. Nora Smith, 26, is under arrest today charged with complicity in the alleged attempt of Dave Williams, 36, of San Bernardino, to poison his 65-year-old wife. Williams was arrested Monday after the near-fatal illness of Mrs. Williams, who swore to a charge that her husband put morphine in a pitcher of beer from which she drank.

Mrs. Smith was arrested at Redondo Beach, where she declared she had gone for a vacation. She vehemently denied the charge against her.

VISCOUNT HALDANE IS ENTERTAINED AT BIG BANQUET AT ALBANY

British Lord Chancellor Makes
No Address, Saving Voice
for Montreal Speech.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 30.—Albany tonight entertained the head of the British legal system, Viscount Haldane, lord chancellor of England, and a majority of the heads of the Canadian government, including Premier Borden, Sir Lomax Gouin (premier of Quebec province), Sir Kenneth Muir McKenzie and the various members of the party that accompanied the viscount from England.

Greeted at the station by a committee headed by Chief Judge Cullen of the court of appeals and Attorney General Carmody, the party was taken to the Hotel Ten Eyck, where they rested until 8 o'clock, when a formal dinner in their honor took place.

No formal speeches were made at the banquet, and the Canadian Minister of Justice, Doherty explained that Viscount Haldane would not speak at all, in order to save his voice for his speech on Monday at Montreal.

The lord chancellor and his party and the Canadian officials left at midnight for Montreal on a special train.

Reviews West Point Cadets.

West Point, N. Y., Aug. 30.—Viscount Haldane was enthusiastic when he left the Point this afternoon for Albany. He reviewed the cadet battalion, and the largest corps in the history of the academy, 614 cadets, avowed by as one man. The alignment was just the regular West Point style, but it impressed the distinguished visitor.

"I can easily see why you are so proud of your soldiers," he said to Colonel Townsley. "This is wonderful, and in so beautiful a place men must be inspired to wonderful deeds."

The viscount, accompanied by his entire party, made the trip to West Point on the Morgan yacht Corsair. They left over the West Shore in their special train for Albany.

PAUL AKERMAN GETS OFF WITH 6 MONTHS' TERM

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 30.—After hearing witnesses testify as to his good character and the testimony of several state witnesses, including M. E. Nicewood, his victim, and Miss Tampa Brock, the cause of the shooting, Judge Kelly sentenced Paul Akerman to six months in the county jail. He pleaded guilty to shooting Nicewood last December near Shedd while the latter was buggy riding with Miss Brock, Akerman's sweetheart. The minimum sentence for such an offense is six months. In passing sentence Judge Kelly said it was a close case. He called attention to the fact that Akerman had voluntarily given himself up and cited the testimony of character witnesses.

NOTABLE CONVENTION OF THE AMERICAN BAR ASS'N DURING WEEK

Viscount Haldane and William
H. Taft Among the Distinguished Speakers.

Montreal, Aug. 30.—Men who make, interpret and expound laws, men who have served their country in the highest executive, judicial, legislative and diplomatic positions; men who bear on noble foreheads and furrowed faces the indelible marks of intellectuality, and whose thoughtful glances and positive speech betoken the trained mind and judicial temperament—these are the component parts of the distinguished company now assembling in this city for the annual meeting of the American Bar association and the conferences of the several affiliated organizations.

This will be the first occasion on which the convention of the American Bar association has been held outside the United States. Great importance is attached to this fact, in calling attention to which the announcement of the executive committee says: "The meeting undoubtedly will tend to cement more firmly the already warm relations between the members of the bar of the United States and Canada, and will be a fitting forerunner of the celebration in February, 1914, of the centenary of peace between the two great English-speaking nations of the world."

Eminent Men Expected.
The association has been fortunate in securing as speakers and guests of the convention three men who are eminent as representatives of the bench and bar of three of the leading nations. These men are the Right Honorable Viscount Haldane, lord high chancellor of Great Britain; William H. Taft, former president of the United States, and Maître Labori, of the bar of Paris, famed for his defense of Major Dreyfus and Emile Zola.

The convention will hold its opening session Monday evening in the assembly hall of the Royal Victoria college. The opening address will be delivered by the president, Frank B. Kellogg of St. Paul. Monday afternoon Lord Haldane will deliver the annual address before the association at the Victoria college, being introduced by Chief Justice White of the supreme court of the United States.

The session of Tuesday morning will be devoted to reports of standing and special committees. Tuesday evening there will be a symposium on "The Struggle for the Simplification of Legal Procedure," discussed under three sub-topics, as follows: "Some Causes," by Judge W. C. Cook of the federal circuit court of appeals, Kansas; "Legal Procedure and Social Unrest," by Judge Charles Burke of the Maryland court of appeals; "The Goal and Its Attainment," by William A. Blount of Pennsylvania, Fla.

Taft to Speak Wednesday.
The feature of the Wednesday morning session will be a paper by former President William H. Taft. The Tuesday and Wednesday sessions will be held at the Victoria college.

The convention will be brought to a close Wednesday evening with a grand banquet at the Windsor hotel. Senator Elihu Root of New York will preside and former President Taft and Maître Labori will respond to toasts.

In addition to the sessions of the convention proper there will be meetings of the Comparative Law bureau, the section of legal education and patent law, the Association of American Law Schools, and the American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology.

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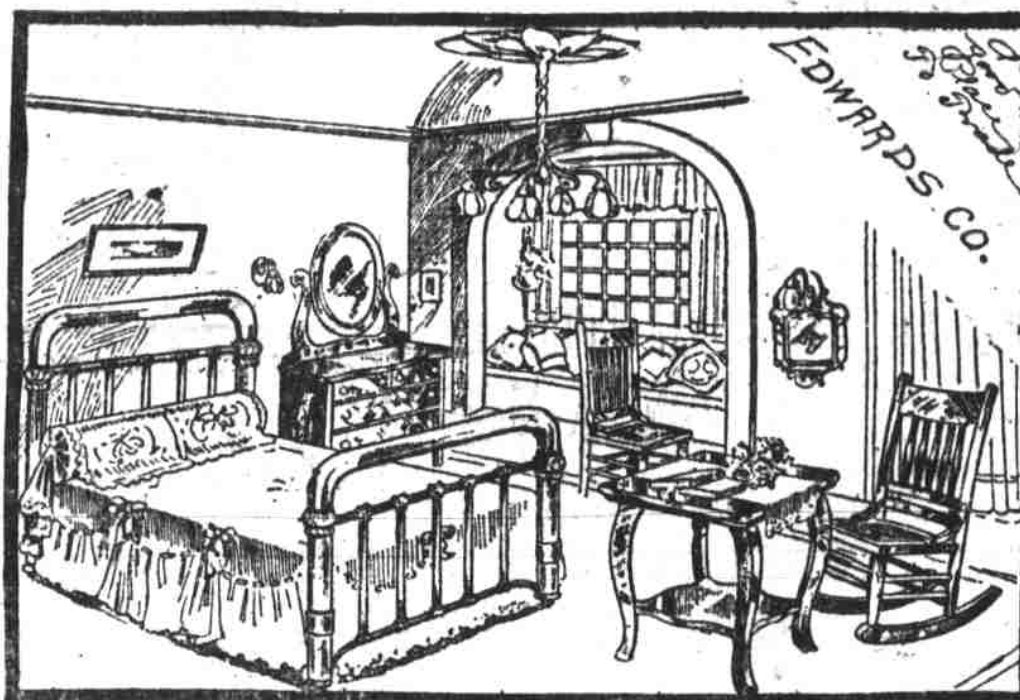
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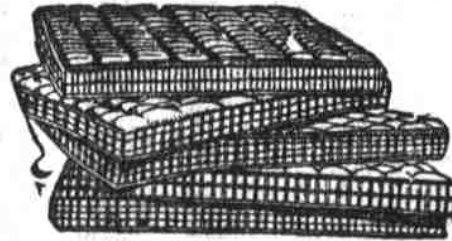

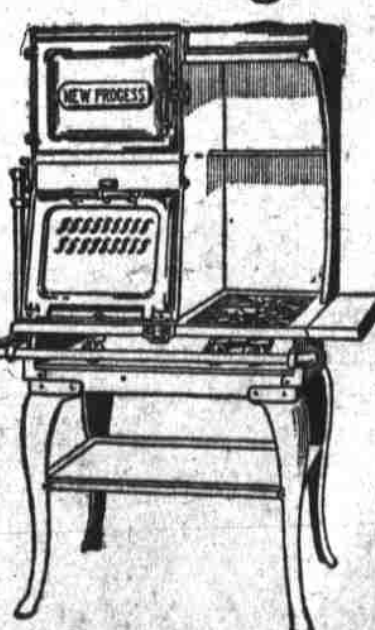
