SPEAS' TWO-BAGGER MAKES IT 7 STRAIGHT FOR BEAVER TOSSEES

Breaks Up Eleven Inning Game With Two Out; Hiram West Twirls First Victory.

When Billy Speas doubled to center field in the eleventh inning yesterday afternoon with Chadbourne on first base and two down, he gave the Beavers their seventh straight victory over the Sacramento club, counting Hi West's easy win over Jack Lively in the first game of the double header. The scores were 6 to 2 and 6 to 5. It marked the third extra inning victory of the Beavers, and put them some 12 1/2 games ahead of the nearest rival for the pennant.

The second game was a hummer. Arellanes lasted till the sixth for the Solons, and Higginbotham an inning later for the Beavers. Munsell and Hagerman relieved the first pair.

A brace of doubles to left field by Lober and Fisher in the second, put the Beavers ahead in the last game. Sacramento tied it up in the third, when Kearworthy tripled to left, but was out between third and home trying to come in on Arellanes' grounder to Hig. However, he made the run last long enough to let Arellanes reach third, and he scored on Young's scratch hit to Lindsay.

Higginbotham was hit on the arm and head by a pitched ball in the third, took second on Chadbourne's out, and scored on Speas' single to center. Sacramento tied it up on Van Buren's double, Shimin's sacrifice and Tennant's out.

Singles by Speas, Rodgers and Lindsay filled the bases on the Mexican in the sixth, and Munsell went in. Bone singled to right, scoring Speas, and Lober forced Rodgers. Fisher fouled to Tennant. Then McCormick singled over second, scoring Lindsay and Doane, but was cut off at the keystone, Moran to Bliss to Young.

Hallinan's single and walks to Munsell and Young, to be followed by Van Buren's cleanup double to center tied the score. Hagerman relieved Hig, and after causing Shimin to go out, McCormick to Speas, held the Senators at his mercy thereafter.

In the eleventh Chadbourne reached first by beating out a grounder to Tennant.

Lively Easy in First.

The Beavers found Lively comparatively easy in the first game, while West held the visitors to seven hits. Young's single and an error by Lindsay on Hallinan's grounder, gave the Solons a run in the first inning, but Portland tied it up on Derrick's single, Rodgers' double and Lindsay's out. Derrick scored again in the fifth after his forgiveness of Chadbourne, on a stolen base and Rodgers' single to left. Doane's double to left and Lober's single, gave the Portland another in the sixth. The fourth run was made in the seventh on doubles by Chadbourne and Doane. Lober's single, Berry's sacrifice, a steal of third and McCormick's infield hit, gave the fifth run in the eighth.

Tennant's double to right and Hallinan's single through short gave the Wolverines their second run in the eighth. The locals made 25 hits in the two games. Bill Rodgers neared the galaxy of Beaver .300 hitters by getting

DAN O'LEARY TO REACH BAY CITY IN SIXTEEN DAY WALK

Champion Pedestrian Plans to Leave Portland Oct. 1 and Average 48 Miles a Day.

Leaving Broadway and Yamhill streets, Portland, on the morning of October 1, Dan O'Leary, the champion walker of the world, will attempt to walk to San Francisco in 16 days. The distance will be 770 miles. This is the first time any one has attempted to make the trip in any given number of days.

O'Leary, who celebrated his 70th birthday recently by walking 73 miles, stepping out to Mount Hood and part of the way back, figures that by doing the distance in 16 days, he will only have to average something like 48 miles a day, which, his friends say, is merely a constitutional for him.

"The roads ought to be in pretty fair shape by October, and it will be just cool enough for me to make good time," said O'Leary this morning. I am setting 16 days as the maximum time I shall need. If nothing happens I may be able to walk it in less than that time. I don't know that anybody has ever established any sort of a record between Portland and San Francisco, and this will be one that all the pedestrians may aim at.

"I shall not set out to walk a certain number of miles each day. I may walk 60 or 70 miles in one day and 20 or 30 the next. It all depends on how I feel."

At Gresham Saturday night, O'Leary defeated Eastman and Wilson, skaters, by 10 yards. Wilson was giving O'Leary a close race, when his skate strap broke and put him out of the race. He wants to race the champion walker again, believing that he will be able to win.

CROSS AND BARRIEAU WILL BOX 12 ROUNDS IN VANCOUVER TODAY

Neither Is Well Trained But New Yorker Expects to Polish Off Northern Scrapper.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 1.—Considering the fact that neither had time in which to train properly, Leach Cross, the New York fighter, and Frank Barrieau, the northwest lightweight, were in fairly good condition for their scheduled 12 round bout at Brighthouse this afternoon. The advance sale was a trifle disappointing on account of the match being arranged at such a late date, but the indications were that a goodly crowd would be on hand when the boys entered the ring. All cars headed for the arena were jammed.

Cross looks to be ten pounds lighter than his opponent, who is of a stocky build, although both boys are natural lightweights. Both took a complete rest Sunday and neither left his hotel until a late hour this morning.

"I do not anticipate having any difficulty in disposing of Barrieau within the twelve rounds, although I understand he is a clever and strong boxer," said Cross today. "The training I did at Los Angeles for the bout with Johnny Dundee which was called off on account of Dundee's death, has stood me in good stead, and I am in fine fettle."

Barrieau would not discuss his chances of winning over Cross but declared that meeting a real lightweight contender had not affected his nerve and that he would put up the best fight he is capable of.

Freddie Welsh and Willis Ritchie, who will box here Sept. 20, for the lightweight championship of the world, will be at the ringside.

During his stay here, Cross will endeavor to arrange conferences with Welsh and Ritchie with a view to securing a match with the winner of the Sept. 20th bout.

MANY GOLFERS START FOR NATIONAL TITLE WHEN IS HIGH GOLF AT KENTON TRAP SHOOTING

W. J. Travers Is the Favorite Among 145 Entrants at Garden City. Five Trapsmen Are Tied for Percentage Honors in the Stevens Medal Event.

New York, Sept. 1.—The national amateur championship tournament, one of the biggest events of the year in the golfing world, is to be staged this week on the links at Garden City, L. I. The program was opened today with a medal play qualifying round at 36 holes. W. J. Travers is favorite and there are 145 golfers in the qualifying round. Tomorrow the first round of match play at 36 holes will be run off, with subsequent rounds for a similar distance being carded for each day following until the decisive test on Saturday. The east, the middle west and the Pacific coast sections have sent their best amateur players to compete for the honors. Chief interest, of course, centers largely in the performances of those rated among the leaders on the list, with the climax at the top, where for the first time Jerome D. Travers, stands alone the national title holder, three times.
