WILLIAM SPROULE IS PLEASED WITH OREGON

President of Southern Pacific Here to Inspect Several Projects.

"I am here to work to see where the Southern Pacific money is being spent and if it is being properly administered." OBSCENE POST CARD CAUSES ARREST

Postoffice Inspector H. G. Durand this morning arrested J. H. Field of Albany for sending an obscene postcard through the mail. The offense was committed February 13 and Durand has been searching for the man since that time. He was given a preliminary hearing by United States Commissioner A. M. Cannon and bound over to await action of the grand jury. He is in jail in default of \$250 bond.

BOY ADMITS TAKING EMPLOYER'S MONEY

Clad in a new suit, with a gold fountain pen, a gold watch and a ticket to San Francisco in his pockets, Louis Feldman, 15 years old, was arrested last evening in Oregon City and returned to the city this morning. He is charged with the theft of \$340 from the Fred A. Jacobs company. Yesterday he was sent to the bank with the money and the temptation proved too much. This morning he was before Judge Gatens of the juvenile court and told his story, admitting everything. His father, M. Feldman, of 222 1/2 Broadway, could not be found and the case was continued until next Monday. Meantime the boy has been taken to the Detention home.

LAURELHURST TO GET GAS ON LINE ELECTRIC LIGHTS ARE SUPPLIED

Arrangement Made Today Is to Last 20 Days; No Contract Entered Into.

Laurelhurst is to have lights, beginning tonight, for this morning Will J. Daly, commissioner of public utilities, authorized the rental of 91 cluster gas lamps and lights for the four arches for a period not to exceed 20 days. At the end of that time Commissioner Daly expects to have another plan worked out so that permanent relief can be given.

SHIELDS FOR HEADLIGHTS

Automobiles Must Use Coverings for Lamps While Within Limits. All headlights on automobiles are to be covered with a shield when within the limits of an ordinance which is now being drafted by City Commissioner Daly passes the council. Blindness is also to be required on all motorcycle searchlights and streetcar headlights.

CAPTAINS TO ISSUE PERMITS

Persons Desiring to Kindle Fires in Streets Need Not Go to City Hall. Permits to kindle fires may hereafter be secured from the captains at the fire stations throughout the city instead of at the city hall. Acting Fire Chief Lombardi is sending out notices today to the captains of the department of the new order. No permits are to be given for a period of longer than 30 days.

STOUT APPOINTED INSPECTOR

Successor to Dr. Graham is Named to Take Charge in Lents District. Dr. William Stout was this morning appointed school inspector by Mayor Albee to take the position left vacant by the resigning of Dr. J. P. Graham. He will have charge of the school inspectors in the Lents district. P. J. Payne, John G. Abele and J. L. Manion, the other school inspectors, will take up their work for the ensuing year Monday morning. Dr. Louis Wolf, deputy-health officer, will head the medical division of the health office and have charge of the school work.

WATER FOUND CONTAMINATED

Typhoid Cases May Have Resulted From Drinking the Water. Analysis of the water at the government moorings and at Whitwood Court on the Linnton road discloses the fact that the water is contaminated with coliform bacilli. Men from the health department will today put up notices at both places that the water is unfit for use. It is now believed that the six cases of typhoid fever among employees of the gas plant on the Linnton road contracted the disease by drinking some of the water.

MUST WORK ONLY EIGHT HOURS

Contractor Refused Permission to Keep Men Employed 10 Hours. Contractor Berry, who is lowering the two big Bull Run water pipes across the Willamette river above the Hawthorne Avenue bridge, this morning requested City Commissioner Daly that he be allowed to work his men 10 hours a day so that the work could be completed as rapidly as possible. Commissioner Daly refused the request as there is a state law which allows contractors to work their employes only eight hours a day.

FATALLY STRICKEN AS HE RETURNS TO WORK

Going to his work for the first time in several months, George Camping, a lathing contractor of 228 Jessup street, St. Johns, was stricken with apoplexy at the corner of Twenty-fourth and East Ankeny streets at 10 o'clock this morning, and died shortly afterward at St. Vincent's hospital. Mr. Camping had been in ill health for some time, having had a stroke some months ago. He felt well enough to resume his work this morning, however, and it was while he was so engaged that he was stricken. He was 57 years of age, and had been a resident of Portland for eight years, being well known in St. Johns. Mr. Camping is survived by a widow and one daughter, Miss Stella Camping, ninth grade teacher in the Woodlawn school. The funeral will probably be held Monday.

ABATEMENT SUIT BEGUN BY DISTRICT ATTORNEY

To abate the immoral conditions of the premises at 85 and 87 North Second street, operated by Louise Olcese, District Attorney Evans has begun proceedings to enjoin the use of the property for such purposes. A hearing of the injunction will occur next Thursday morning. Mr. Evans is also preparing injunction orders in certain of the cases brought by him some time ago, which will be asked for at once. The greater number have already closed up their premises, and will probably escape prosecution under the abatement law.

ELEVEN CONCERNS ARE REPRESENTED IN BILLS FOR INSURING COUNTY

Last Year Premiums Were Paid to 26 Firms; How the Claims Are Divided.

If the county commissioners authorize the payment of insurance premiums on the various county institutions as presented to them this morning by County Auditor Martin, more than two thirds of the amount will be paid to W. J. Clemens, whom County Commissioner Holman authorized to check over the county insurance some time ago. Eleven firms are represented in the bills presented, while last year premiums were paid to 26 firms.

INJURED EMPLOYEE GETS VERDICT FOR \$30,000

A verdict for \$30,000, the largest ever given in Multnomah county in a personal injury case, was yesterday returned by a jury in Circuit Judge McGinn's court in favor of Willis D. Hoag and against the Oregon-Washington corporation and S. M. Turner and Art Gilmore, the company's foremen. Hoag was a laborer employed at \$2.50 a day and was working at the company's power plant at Cornelius last fall, when he came in contact with a high power wire and was fearfully burned. He is about 35 years old and has a wife and three children.

DOMESTIC TROUBLES ARE CAUSE OF SUICIDE

Stark Lytle, a former member of the police department, committed suicide last evening at his home, 418 Nehalem street, by cutting an artery in his wrist and then shooting himself with his old police revolver. His wife and 6-year-old daughter left him four weeks ago, going to their relatives at Batavia, Ohio. He was 47 years old.

MAN PAYS BOARD BILL AND GETS OUT OF JAIL

Jesse Fisher, a dapper looking bookkeeper, paid his board bill yesterday afternoon and was released from the city jail. Kate Cudahy, manager of the Cudahy family hotel, 191 Eleventh street, said she was satisfied for the young man to step from behind the bars.

The complaint against the woman sets forth that the animal was killed by means of poison, which the woman put out in such manner that the monkey would find it. The animal belongs to James Holloman, a neighbor of the Beck family. The monkey has been annoying neighbors, and the defendant in particular, she stated when arrested, but she denied any knowledge of the poison.
