ENGLISH ORDERS FOR HOPS ARE COMING AT EXTREME QUOTATIONS BROKEN WITH HEAVY INCREASE IN SUPPLY

Increased Since Weakness Developed in Trade; Large Buyers Are in a Bearish Mood.

There was a very sharp break in the price of chickens along Front street during the last 24 hours. Hen prices dropped a cent to 16c a pound and the price of springs lost from 1 to 2c 3

The extreme demand that was recently shown in all lines of chickens and especially for heavy hens and large springs, disappeared rather suddenly left in its place nothing but ex-

treme weakness.

This seems to always be the signal for a sharp increase in offerings from the country for no sooner had the market begun to weaken before there was of the big buyers stopped their opera-tions and the loss in price was the re-

suit.

One of the special features of the poultry trade at this time is that while there is an active call from some of the smaller institutions which are seemingly willing to stand a higher price than the big buyers are offering, wholesalers refuse to sell them. Where checks are returned for lack of funds the wholesaler is the loser, but the country sup-per is now compelled to bear the bur-den by the lower prices forced.

Market for eggs is firm again along. Front street, and best stock is quoted generally at 35c a dozen. Receipts are small and the temporary luit in the buying has passed away. Eastern stor-age firm at 30c today.

COUNTRY HOGS ARE LOWER
