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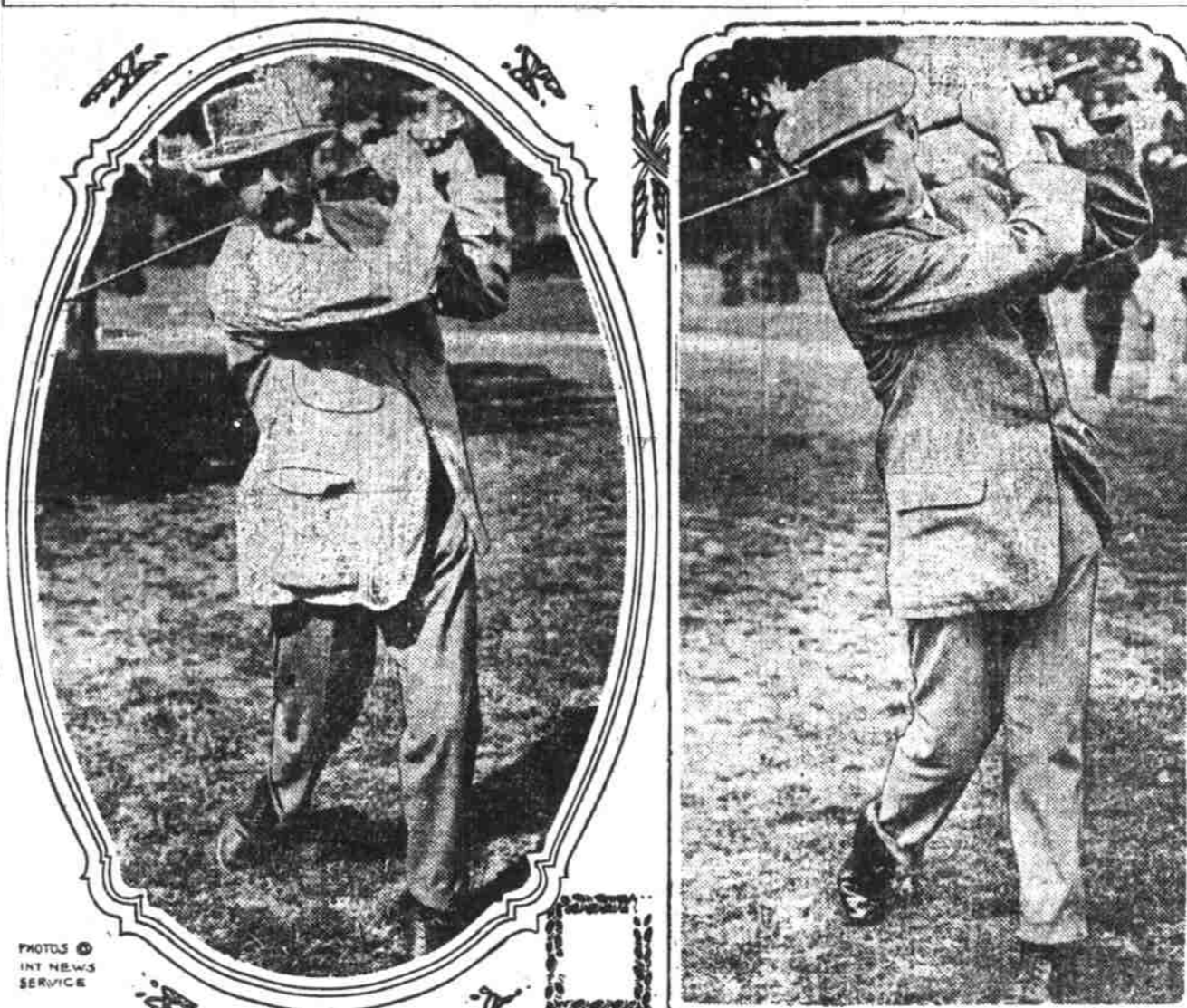
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CRACK ENGLISH GOLFERS ARE BESTED BY EX-CADDIE

But Bezek is hopeful. He believes that he can round a team into shape, and that another week or so will see a radical change in the jinx that is darkening the lemon yellow just now.

Among the men showing promise are Putnam, a star quarterback from North Dakota, who is making a bid for the position of a 225-pound all-star tackle, and will give someone a run for center or guard.
