CLUBS REQUEST THAT A SURVEY BE MADE

At a special meeting, held Thursday evening, in J. E. Yeon's office in the Yeon building, the Peninsula and Overlook Progressive club was organized. The meeting was composed of committees representing the various commercial and improvement clubs of the northeast side.

Motion was made by G. H. Watson and seconded to adopt the following resolution, which was carried unanimously: "Be it resolved, That we, the undersigned, urgently petition the park board to detail an engineer to run a preliminary survey of Patton avenue from Prescott street south to a connection with a proposed roadway from Greeley street and Killingsworth avenue to Delany street.

"As this matter has been before the engineer department in one form or another for the past two years, we ur-

gently request that immediate action be taken in this matter.

"According to information at hand, the park board is considering a parking proposition which entails a heavy bond issue and so many necessary delays that we favor, in view of the importance of the opening of Patton avenue and the proposed lower roadway, the early completion of some plan to relieve the present conditions."
