

### BRITISH SPORTSMEN STILL WRITHE OVER THEIR LOST PRESTIGE

Rich Lords, However, Find Small Response to Appeal for Minister of Sports.

London, Sept. 20.—That England must have a minister of sport at the head of a properly organized government department, if she is to regain her lost prestige in the world of athletics at the Berlin Olympiad in 1916 is now the view of many prominent sportsmen here. Suggested by the fact that the czar of Russia has already appointed such a minister to foster sport among his bomb-throwing subjects, the idea has been strengthened by the movement in its favor in France, but more especially by the failure of the British Olympic committee's appeal for funds. British athletes are still writhing over the fact that England came in a very poor third to Sweden and the United States at Stockholm, but despite indignantly appealing the public has proved singularly indifferent to the demand for money with which to discover and train new talent.

**Democracy Is Seeking.** The reason is that despite the boasted democracy of sport amateur athletics in England are controlled by the aristocratic few and it is always a case of the poor being asked to pay while the rich play. When the Duke of Westminster, Earl Grey and Roberts, and Lords Rothschild, Strathmore and Harris appealed for a \$500,000 Olympic fund, they probably overlooked the fact that the workers might object to subscribing to a fund which would eventually be controlled by aristocratic associations which bar them from participating in amateur sport.

Nobody distrusts the six noblemen in question for they are all recognized as genuine sportsmen, although the public cannot be blamed for remembering that four of them are millionaires who could put up the whole half million themselves without noting it. But experience has shown that Olympic—that is, amateur—sport in England is controlled by the aristocracy and is limited as far as possible to university and high school students.

**Subscribers Are Few.** Yet the noble lords who appealed for "the financial help of all our countrymen of every degree," spoke of the inadequacy of the funds available last year for "finding out the best men or giving them real preparation, or even caring for them properly in Sweden." The Duke of Westminster headed the subscription list with \$5000 and was quickly followed by Lord Northcliffe with \$10,000. Northcliffe is proprietor of the powerful Harmsworth group of newspapers which is boosting the Olympic games, and his personal subscription has increased by \$2500 from the "Times," which is one of the group. But the \$20,000 mark having been reached by this means the fund practically came to a standstill, despite the publication of a letter from King George (without a subscription) expressing sympathy with the movement.

Hence the prevailing opinion of leading English sportsmen that without government control or a radical alteration in the composition and rules of the governing bodies it will be impossible to revive public interest in Olympic games in this country.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Sept. 20.—The newest sorority charter to be granted a university of Oregon local was granted to Lambda Rho by Delta Gamma on August 11. Lambda Rho was organized in 1908, and has since had a prominent place in university activities. The home of the sorority is on Fraternity Row, Alder street, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth. It is of the colonial type of architecture. Because he could not prove his claim that he was born in America, a wealthy Chinese merchant of Zanesville, Ok., has been ordered deported. In a riot in which several hundred persons were engaged seven men said to be striking garment workers were injured, at Philadelphia. Police Lieutenant Morrow, who attempted to quell the rioters, was injured. Following the discovery of two cases of typhoid at Vader, Wash., local health authorities are taking steps to prevent further spread of the disease. Passengers on board the army transport Logan prayed that they might be saved from harm when a terrific cyclone struck the ship in midocean on the voyage from the Orient to San Francisco. The great constellation, Big Dipper will disappear from view in 200,000 years, says Professor Herbert D. Curtis of Lick observatory. He asserts that the constellation did not exist 200,000 years ago. August Anderson, a homesteader of the North Fork country of Idaho, walked into a death trap set for a bear, receiving a bullet wound in his left thigh. The California State Press association has invited editors from all over the world to meet at San Francisco during the Panama-Pacific fair. The crime is said to have been committed 14 years ago. ### FORMER BANKER HAD TOUCH OF FREEDOM

J. C. Marcell Released From Federal Prison, Is Rearrested Same Day.

Marcell, a former banker of Spokane, who has been serving a sentence in the federal penitentiary at McNeil's Island for violation of the national banking laws and who was ordered released today by Judge Cushman, has been rearrested at the instance of Attorney-General McReynolds, who wired instructions to the local federal district attorney to take the case to the circuit court of appeals. The question involved in Marcell's case is unique. The banker was sentenced to serve five years. He was released on parole before the completion of his term, but was returned to prison because, it was charged, he violated the provisions of the parole. Prison officials deprived Marcell of

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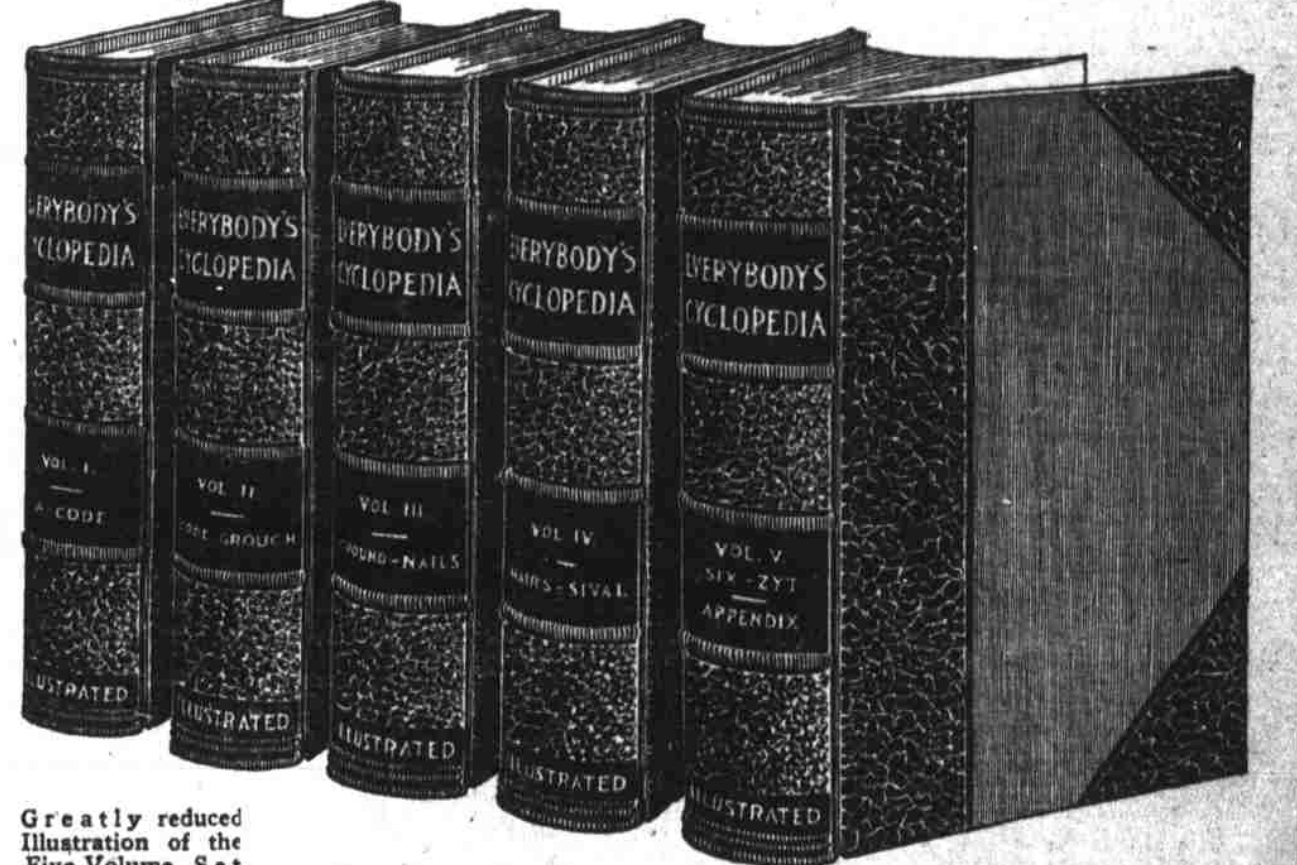
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### BRIEF REVIEW OF THE WORLD'S NEWS
