

'ENCHANTRESS' MEETS WITH FINE RECEPTION FROM LARGE AUDIENCE

Kitty Gordon Dominates Comic Opera From Curtain to Curtain; Costumes Superb.

Downs of dazzling brilliance, emotional acting, side-splitting humor, riot of color and music of a dreamy soft fit for the gods—these were the magnets that combined to electrify the audience at the Hellig Theatre last night. Kitty Gordon, in a piece de resistance. Her resplendent dresses, what there were of them, were in themselves worth the price of admission. The modern art is seen in its greatest perfection in the magnificent creations.

The enchantress entered the plot to captivate, then renounces the ardent man of noble birth. But she finally falls in love with him. It is discovered in the end that the enchantress is really of noble blood herself. This opens the way to her marriage to the prince, and the latter, who has been dishonored because of his infatuation with one beneath his social caste, is restored to his own by the wit and strategy of the woman who manages to steal the papers which were to seal the prince's fate.

"The Enchantress" will be repeated tonight, tomorrow night, with a special matinee tomorrow.

POLICE SCANDAL MAY END IN PROSECUTION OF HIGH-UP OFFICIALS

On this list are the names of 41 men, of which 22 have been given positions in the department. If the investigation substantiates the charges already made that list will be also annulled and those who have positions will have to take another examination.

Those who received positions as a result of that examination are: John S. Thompson, Chris Johnson, A. F. G. W. J. Dillon, J. L. Cordes, W. H. Maas, Collier Graham, D. J. Kelleher, Harry H. At the opening of the meeting yesterday Commissioner Caldwell said there was no doubt that questions had been given in advance to at least two of those who took the examination. "It was a case of very bold juggling," he said, "from beginning to end, and there is no reason why the eligible list should not be annulled and steps taken to punish those who took part in the juggling."

Commissioner Clark stated that the charter sets forth clearly certain rules for the handling of civil service and those rules were there for a purpose. "I believe that no man," he said, "who connives to cheat or, by dishonest practice, wins out in an examination is fit to remain in the service. To take any other view of it would mean merely to lay to the men who want city positions, you may commit a crime to get the position. If you are not caught you reap the benefits from your dishonesty; if you are caught there is no punishment."

"Integrity is the essence of civil service. While this body has no jurisdiction in the filing of charges, either criminal or administrative, against any official, I believe that we should place the evidence in the case in the hands of those having power and let them proceed according to the procedure of handling criminal charges."

Commissioner Clark asked that copies of the transcript or testimony be given to the chief of police, the city attorney and District Attorney Evans with the request that immediate steps be taken to bring those guilty to justice.

Those so far involved in the alleged juggling, as brought out by the evidence heard, are Detective Sergeant Robert Craddock, Robert Armstrong, a brother of A. F. Armstrong, formerly civil service commissioner, now county superintendent of schools, who is now under indictment, Joe Keller, ex-captain of police and others. E. A. Siover, formerly chief of police, now a captain in the department, was also involved in assertions made at the last hearing of the board.

Developments are expected shortly in the police department, for it is believed that Chief of Police Clark will follow out the wishes of the civil service board and dismiss some of his men.
