

GREAT TURKEYS MADE IN THE APPLE MARKET AT EXTREME PRICE

INCREASE NOTED IN PRACTICALLY ALL SECTIONS OF THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST; PRICE QUOTATIONS SHOW VERY LITTLE CHANGE FROM YEAR TO YEAR.

With the possible exception of sockeyes, the canned salmon situation is showing a rather steady tone both on the coast and on the Atlantic seaboard.

There is a very firm tone in the demand for turkeys. Many inquiries are being received from various interests as to the probability for this city having a supply to send to outside markets.

Other Grades and Varieties Are Rather Steady With Chinooks the Firmest in Years; Sound Packers May Hold Fish Over.

The chinook situation is perhaps the firmest ever known. The smaller pack that has been sold recently is such a contrast to that which has been sold in the past.

Commissioner Bigelow's ordinance to prohibit the keeping of more than three horses, cows or livestock in any residential section of the city without the consent of at least three-fifths of the residents of the district affected, did not meet the kindest reception from several of the other members of the council when the measure came up for its first and second readings.

Commissioner Brewster and Dickson contended that the ordinance should be handled better by compelling horse owners to build cement stables. Mr. Brewster said that a cement building for stable purposes was much more desirable than a garage.
