

LOCAL OPTION WILL BE VOTED ON NOV. 4

Washington County Court Reverses Its Recent Decision to Deny Petition.

Through the efforts of Attorney E. A. Baker of Portland, state attorney for the Anti-Saloon league, the county court of Washington county, which on Friday practically denied the petition of 215 residents of Hillsboro and Sherwood for a local option election on November 4, reversed itself yesterday.

SIX WIDOWS' PENSIONS AWARDED BY COMMITTEE

Six pensions, totaling \$91.50 a month, were recommended for six widows yesterday by the case committee of the widows pension department of the juvenile court. The committee also received one refusal of a pension, because the woman desired to support her child herself, and accept the \$25 allowed. One woman had her \$10 a month pension revoked because she failed to keep the terms imposed.

SOLDIERS TAKE LAUNCH AND LATER IT SINKS

Fort Stevens, Or., Oct. 4.—Several soldiers at Fort Stevens took one of the launches used for subsurface planting to Astoria on a pleasure trip. They tied the boat to the dock and returned later to find that it had sunk. There is considerable speculation as to the exact cause of the disaster, but no definite facts are known.

UNIVERSITY BOYS HAVE A "PEEJAMA PEERAGE"

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Oct. 4.—"Peejama peerage," the annual procession of Oregon men in their "nighties," started from the men's "dorm" Thursday night at 7:30, and led by Yell Leader Harold Young and assistants, Hal Grady and Morris Bigbee, the 250 students visited all the society houses in Eugene during the Oregon yell. The costumes varied from plain ordinary nighties and pajamas to representations of "September Morn" and "September Night," Indian princes and princesses, Mexican rurales, Arabs, Bedouins and messenger boys.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Oct. 4.—Among the new instructors at the university is Ralph H. Lyman, dean of the school of music. He came from Grinnell, Iowa. Mr. Lyman was educated at Grinnell college, and took a prominent part in the school's musical activities during his undergraduate days. He studied music in Chicago under Arthur Middleton, Grant Hadley, Holmes Cowper and Karlon Hackett, critic for the Chicago Tribune. Franklin academy had him for two years as director of the school of music, and then he taught in Grinnell for one year. Mr. Lyman next went abroad, where he studied in Berlin under Moratti, successor to Lamperti, for three years, and also under Cooper, the tone specialist. At the university, besides being in charge of the school of music, Mr. Lyman will direct the men's glee club, the women's glee club and the choruses.

REFUSAL OF 50c FARE MAY RESULT IN SUIT

R. R. Commission Expresses Belief Streetcar Company Violating Statute.

District Attorney Evans is in receipt of a letter from the State Railroad Commission, in which it is stated that it is the belief of the commission that the Portland Railway Light & Power company is violating a state statute by charging a fare of ten cents for a ride from the station of Watson, which is within the city limits and near Lewis. It is suggested by the commission that the district attorney begin court action to compel the railway company to reduce the fare to five cents.

LAND GRANT OPERATORS MAY BE PROSECUTED

Postoffice Inspector Harry G. Durand has just returned to Portland from San Francisco, where he, with other inspectors, have been working with half a dozen special agents of the government land office on the Oregon and California land grant. Alleged frauds in connection with land location in cases are to be presented to an Oregon grand jury early in November. United States Attorney Clarence L. Reames was recently in San Francisco and on inquiry at the land department of the Southern Pacific, found record of at least 30,000 cases where the locators had attempted to locate settlers on these lands that have just been forfeited to the government.

TAG DAY SALE WILL NET MORE THAN \$2000

With but a small force of sellers, the sale of tags for the Louise Home will run over \$2000, says W. G. MacLaren, general superintendent. Last night \$1900 had been turned in, but all the outside districts were still to be heard from. "The citizens of Portland were very generous," said Mr. MacLaren last night "and came forward nobly, showing that they favor the cause. The missionary bodies are too timid and did not give us enough support, for if we had had 200 people to sell tags for the baby home instead of about 10, we would have had at least \$5000."

SEA-GOING STEEL HEADS PUT UP GAMY FIGHT



Gold Hill, Or., Oct. 4.—Found for pound, inch for inch, the steelhead—the big sea-going trout of the Pacific coast—is being taken at Doyden's Falls, a favorite angling ground on Rogue river, near Gold Hill. The aggregate weight of this catch, taken in a single forenoon, was 43 pounds. The lure which enticed the fishy fighters from their feeding stations among the rocks and swirls of the Rogue was the reliable old grey hackle fly—which finds welcome in every well appointed fly box.

Spokane, Oct. 4.—Declaring that blasting for piers of the new O.W. R. & N. bridge across the Spokane river here is greatly damaging its equipment and building at its big power plant, the block award by the Washington Water Power company today applied to the superior court for an injunction restraining O.W. R. & N. contractors from continuing blasting operations and asking \$2000 damages.
