Three players, James of the Beavers and Johnston and Corhan of the Seals, were named by all writers.

Every club of the league is represented by one or more players. Venice has just one player, Elliott, its mainstay behind the plate.

Nearly every writer on the Coast likes the James, Fanning and Williams combination of triers. It would be hard to find a trio of such classy triers in any league outside of the majors.

First base caused a lot of thinking among the scribes. Four writers named Tommy Tennant of the Sacramento team, while Derrick and McArdle received three votes each.

Only one writer out of the ten who made selections failed to name Bill Rodgers as second baseman. That writer gave Bill Leard the position.

Corhan was named by all writers. Corhan is undoubtedly the best fielder in the league this season, received but one vote.

The votes given each player are: Catchers—Schmidt 9, Boles 4, Elliott 1.

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NORTHWEST RECORD HOLDERS TO CONTEND AT THE PORTOLA MEET

Track and Field Team Strong Bunch of Athletes in Various Lines.

EVENTS IN WHICH MEN WILL BE CONTENDERS

List of Names Includes Many Who Are Well Known for Their Work.

The track and field team, which will represent the Pacific Northwest association in the Portola Athletic meet in San Francisco October 25-28, is composed of a bunch of northwest record holders.

The P. N. A. team is composed of San Beliah, Multnomah club, pole vaulter; George Philbrook, Multnomah club, weight man; Walter McClure, Multnomah club, distance runner; Con Walsh, Seattle Athletic, weight man; A. Thompson, Seattle Athletic club, jumper; Ben Chandler, Vancouver, B. C. distance runner; H. Beasley, James Bay club, Victoria, sprinter, and William Neil, University of Oregon, javelin thrower.

Philbrook holds the P. N. A. discus record. Neil holds the P. N. A. javelin record, 161 feet 9 1/2 inches, and formerly held the northwest intercollegiate record. McClure holds the intercollegiate record for the 800 yard run and formerly held the college two mile record.

Beasley and Thompson, as far as known, do not hold any official northwest records, although Beasley is rated as the best sprinter in western British Columbia.

Four members of the team—Beliah, McClure, Philbrook and Beasley—participated in the Olympic games at Stockholm last year.

NORMAN ROSS LEADS MULTNOMAH'S TANK MEN FOR THE SEASON

Instructor Cody Organizes 2 Water Polo Teams and Wants Games at Once.

Norman Ross, one of the champion swimmers of the Multnomah club and holder of the Pacific Northwest association indoor records for the 220 and 440 yard swims, has been elected captain of the "Wings" water polo team for the 1913-14 season.

During the past week, Instructor Jack Cody organized two water polo teams. The first club team is composed of Herb Thatcher, captain; J. McMurray, N. Ross, W. Goodell and Collister Wheeler.

Manion won the title of Oregon state champion during the 1912 Ross festival.
