

NEW YORK USES MORE PENNIES THAN OTHER BIG CITIES COMBINED

Interesting Statistics Compiled
Concerning Use of Coin in
Money-Mad Metropolis.

New York, Oct. 6.—Money. What is it? According to the late lamented Noah Webster's dictionary, "money is metal, as gold, silver, copper, coined or stamped and issued by the recognized authority, as a medium of exchange." To the man on the street, however, to the butcher, the baker and the candlestick maker, anything that makes a noise like a dollar is money, and the noisier it is in this respect, the better he likes it. He admits that St. Paul was a good man, but does not agree with him when he said that "the love of money is the root of all evil." He thinks he might be answered with that verse from Ecclesiastes, which says "Money answereth all things." Money does answer all things. From the beginning of time, all down through the ages to the present, it has made its influence felt and it will be so until the end of time.

New York is unique in the matter of money. New York possesses more wealth than any other city in the world. New York uses more of the lowest American coin, the copper cent, than any other city in the United States. In the commercial transactions of the metropolis, 40,000,000 copper cents are exchanged daily, according to an official of the local sub-treasury. New York uses more pennies than Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago combined. He said that this surprising fact is accounted for by the odd prices charged by the big department stores and the tremendous sales of the morning and afternoon penny newspapers. Next to the cent in popularity in New York is the five-cent piece. There are almost as many million nickels circulated here every day as pennies. This fact is not at all surprising when one considers the millions of people carried by the subway, elevated, trolley, street cars and ferries, the fare on all of which is five cents. The dime, quarter and half-dollars come next in the order named.

There is a strange thing about money, that is, about the possession of it. Nobody ever has enough of it. Andrew Carnegie, who has often been quoted as saying that he wants to die poor, has given away millions, yet today he finds himself unable to spend more than a fraction of his enormous income. The same thing is true of John D. Rockefeller and various others. Carnegie and Rockefeller protest vehemently, on occasion, that they have no desire to make more money, but they cannot stop. The one known exception to the rule that a man who can make money never makes enough and quits, is a one time member of the New York Stock Exchange, who has bought a seat for \$50,000 and made a mental reservation that when he made \$1,000,000 he would stop trading. He kept his word.

Friends to whom he mentioned his resolve laughed at him, saying that a million won't buy what his ambition. He bet them a dinner that he would quit on one million. The friends forgot it, but one afternoon, a shout was heard that rose above the tumult around the United States Steel post on the floor of the exchange. It was the broker who was going to quit. The market had not closed for the day, but he had figured that his winnings in steel added to his other profits and the value of his seat totaled \$1,000,000. Right then and there he walked off his seat and has not since been back. His friends had their dinner that night. The broker went into another business, a quiet one, that makes him about \$500 a year. Thus he gives to charity, as he says that all he wants out of the business is occupation for his mind. He lives off the income of his million.

SAFE BLOWING GANG IS CAUGHT IN LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—By the arrest of two men and a boy after they had dynamited the safe of the Bowen-Harris Lumber company at Inglewood, a suburb, the police believe they have frustrated a wholesale dynamite campaign against the vaults of suburban banks.

The men were taken after a running gun fight in which Arthur Lippe, 49, who had told the police of the previous operations and had been sent back to his pals, had been shot through the arm. Detectives were sent to Inglewood after Lippe told the story. The safe of the lumber company was blown as a preliminary to an attempt upon the vaults of the Bank of Inglewood. The men arrested gave the names of Aug. Kramer and Robert Graber.

TRAIN WRECK SUSPECTS RELEASED AT REDDING

Redding, Cal., Oct. 6.—The police were having more trouble than they expected today to find the men who tried to wreck the Portland Express Saturday night on the Southern Pacific by piling ties on the track in Hobbs gulch. The only footprints they could find matched the shoes worn by J. F. Johnson, an employee in the pumping station, who himself flagged the train and prevented an accident.

George Howell and Walter Wright, who were arrested on suspicion of planning the wreck as a preliminary to robbing the train, have been released.

HALF MILLION ESTATE GOES TO CALIFORNIA; HEIR NOT YET FOUND

Livermore, Cal., Oct. 6.—The missing heir to the late Alexandre Duvall's \$500,000 estate failed to appear today. The public administrator called for her for the last time, then began the estate's sale at public auction. The state will pocket the proceeds.

Alexandre Duvall was French. Early in life he went to Ecuador, where his services as an engineer were such that he received the Order of Simon Bolivar and concessions which made his fortune. Fifteen years ago he bought the Chateau Bellevue and the big vineyard surrounding it, one of the most beautiful estates in California. With the old engineer lived his wife and their daughter Amelia.

Three years after the purchase of the chateau Amelia met and fell in love with Thaddeus Stevens, the son of a rich eastern widow. Without consulting her father, Stevens asked her to marry him. 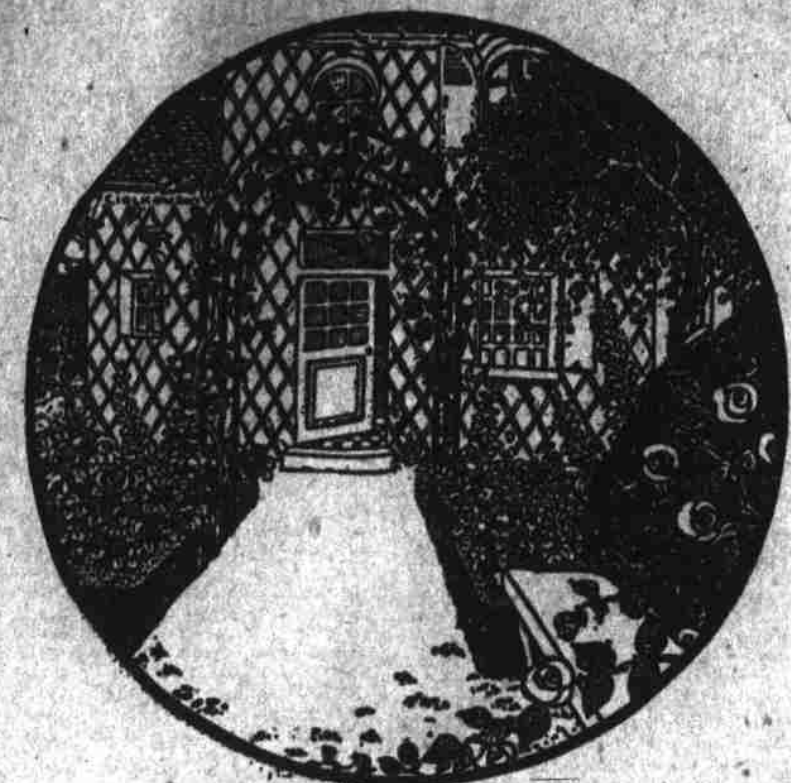
Will Live at Vincent.
