She was a cook for the company, her contract had expired and she was on her way out from the camp.

Grand Jury Convened Thursday.—In the checking up of the members of the October grand jury selected yesterday it was found that Gus Schmidt, a butcher at Fremont and residing at 1094 Foster road, had served on a jury within a year and was therefore ineligible. He was excused by Circuit Judge Cleaton and Fred Davis, 1542 East Fifteenth street, an inspector for the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, was drawn in his place. W. S. Jacobson, a lumber inspector for the Portland Lumber company, was selected as foreman. The grand jury will convene for work on Thursday.

Brodie in a scow at the foot of California street last August, was arraigned this morning before Circuit Judge Cleaton. He will plead tomorrow morning. The hearing occurred as the result of a quarrel over the ability of the two men to shoot.

PLEASANT HOME ROAD WILL BE DISCUSSED

E. H. Wemme and Citizens of Sandy to Arrange for Highway's Improvement.

A conference is being arranged between Paul R. Meinig and other citizens of Sandy and E. Henry Wemme of Portland, relative to the improvement of the highway between Sandy and Pleasant Home, a seven mile stretch.

This follows the receipt of a letter by Mr. Meinig from Mr. Wemme in which the latter urges the importance of putting the road into shape and offers to further improve the Mt. Hood road as soon as the stretch in question is made better.

Mr. Wemme also suggests that a 16 foot macadam road be built between Sandy and Pleasant Home and says the cost should not be over \$1000 per mile. He declares that such an improvement would be beneficial from the standpoint of every road user.

It is believed the proposed conference will result in the organization of a good roads association among the residents of the Sandy and Pleasant Home districts.
