

**PRESS REQUEST FOR NAVAL MILITIA ESCORT "BATTLESHIP OREGON"**

Congressional Delegation to Be Appealed to in Canal Pageant Matter.

To have the Oregon state naval militia act as part of the crew of the historic battleship Oregon as she heads the fleet of warships through the Panama canal on the day of its formal opening is being urged on every hand. Influence will be brought to bear upon congress and the navy department to attain this honor for state's reserve sailors.

Lieutenant J. A. Beckwith of the Oregon naval militia, who left last night for Hampton Roads, will call on the Oregon delegation in congress upon his arrival in Washington and ask co-operation.

Lieutenant Beckwith, with Ensign C. H. Bristol, has been chosen to represent the Oregon state naval militia on a practice cruise of nine vessels of the Atlantic fleet to Mediterranean waters. This is conceded to be a great honor not only to Lieutenant Beckwith and Ensign Bristol, but also to Oregon, as invitations were extended to but nine naval militia bodies in the country. There will be two militiamen from each of nine states assigned to the vessel. The Oregon men will be aboard the Vermont. They sail from Hampton Roads October 25 and are expected back in December. The trip will be for instructional purposes.

Resolutions have already been sent to the secretary of the navy by the Portland Ad club and the Rotary club asking that the Oregon boys be allowed to sail on the Oregon as part of that ship's crew and staff.

The request is not an unusual one, as the naval militia of New York, Massachusetts and Rhode Island filled in on skeleton crews of reserve vessels on the recent review of the North Atlantic fleet. The men enlisted for the period of time covered by the review and were discharged upon its completion.

The matter of having the naval militia aboard the Oregon on her journey through the canal was broached to Secretary of the Navy Daniels on his recent visit to Portland and at that time was favorably received by him.

Other organizations of the city are expected to memorialize congress and it is thought that by concerted action the necessary permit can be secured.

**WINNING WAR UPON OPIUM IN PHILIPPINES**

Customs Collector Says Punitive Law Enforcement Brings Good Results.

Washington, Oct. 13.—The Philippine government having been the pioneer in the recent world wide movement for the suppression of opium, and having taken the successive steps of licensing, medical treatment and prohibition with the rigid enforcement of punitive laws, may now look forward to the early completion of the task taken up of effectually eradicating the opium evil among the Chinese residents as it has already among the Filipinos, says the annual report of Collector of Internal Revenue W. T. Nolting of the Philippine Islands to the bureau of insular affairs. The amount of penalties collected under the opium law is less than \$4,000, or a decrease of more than 25 per cent.

For the year ending June 30 last, total collections of \$11,322,322.82 were made, an increase of \$800,292.82, or 7 1/2 per cent over the preceding year. Of the increase nearly \$700,000 was due to a larger output by manufacturers of taxable articles and to a stricter enforcement of the laws imposing taxes.

The amounts named include the land tax \$652,715.40, in the city of Manila, which has a population of approximately 300,000. Of internal revenue proper the tax collected on alcoholic and tobacco products was \$4,040,618.31, on dealers \$233,165, and on imported articles of this nature \$332,998.

The apportionable taxes amounting to 17,424,273 pesos, or half that many dollars, including the regular cedula or poll tax \$1,071,581, which was divided equally between the municipalities and provinces, the extra cedula tax voted by the various provincial boards, amounting to nearly as much, having gone to the provinces for road and bridge purposes. The municipalities received license taxes to the extent of something over \$300,000, while the other collections of \$1,582,041 were divided equally between the municipalities and provinces.

The central or insular government received \$4,741,697 from the apportionable taxes and about \$700,000 from certain special sources. The bureau of internal revenue began the year with 430 regular and temporary employees, of whom 85 were Americans; while on June 30 this number had been reduced to 48.
