

EAST SIDE CLUB IS IN FAVOR OF PURCHASE BY CITY OF LARGE TRACT

Country Club Grounds Suggested Desirable for Park Site and Other Purposes.

That the city should purchase for \$150,000 the Country Club grounds as a park site and as a site ultimately for the state fair, was the sentiment of the East Side Business Men's club at its meeting Thursday night in the Hotel Clifford.

A committee, consisting of Dan Kellaher, chairman, Robert Duncan and A. J. Debus, was appointed to cooperate with the other improvement clubs of the city to invoke the initiative and have this proposition placed on the ballot by the commissioners with the other park bond issues at the election December 9.

Joseph J. Henry, who is straightening out the affairs of the Country Club association, stated that the city could obtain a clear title to the property. Mr. Henry's secretary, E. C. Johnson, suggested the matter to the club at the meeting. He said that if the city does not now secure this park site it will be cut up into building lots.

To at least out in two the present railroad switching charges, which are declared to be more than double what they should be, is the object of another committee appointed last night by Acting Chairman E. M. Lepper. In the absence of President H. A. Caley. This committee, consisting of M. O. Collins, chairman, M. B. McFall, Dan Kellaher, H. A. Caley and C. C. Hall, will take the matter up with shippers with the view of filing a complaint with the interstate commerce commission.

May Open East Morrison.
To take up with the city commissioners the opening up of East Morrison street from East Twelfth to East Twenty-sixth streets on the south side of Lone Fir cemetery, as requested by property owners concerned, a committee was appointed, consisting of G. H. Weller, chairman; C. C. Hall, T. J. Rows, Streets cars run over East Morrison for this distance on a 25 foot right of way of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, but other traffic is forced to make a detour via Belmont street.

A 30 foot strip has for several years been owned by the city but is not in use as a street. In addition to the street car right of way and the unused 30 foot strip, an eight foot strip owned by the city, which interrupts the continuity of E. Morrison street. This tract, as stated in a letter to Vice President F. I. Fuller three years ago, the company is ready to give up whenever the city is prepared to put the street through.

A plan drawn by Newton C. Gaunt, architect of the Indianapolis opera house, for the proposed new city auditorium, which the city hopes to have located in the central east side, was exhibited to the members last night. The plan provides for a seating capacity of 14,000, the main floor to seat 3,100. The building alone would require \$486,000 of the \$600,000 appropriated for an auditorium. The east side men have suggested nine sites between East Twelfth street and the river, and between Hawthorne avenue and Broadway for an auditorium. They point out that the Friedlander plans for the auditorium provide for a seating capacity of only 7,000, and that the Market street block on the west side is an unsuitable location.

A report of the progress made by the municipal ownership of telephones committee was received, and the committee was instructed to meet and cooperate with committees of other improvement clubs to invoke the initiative for this purpose at the next election, that of November, 1914. The bill for this measure has already been drawn up by the committee.

The committee on the municipal ownership of the city's electric light plant also reported its progress at the meeting.

CASUALTY INSURANCE PROFITS DECLARED BIG

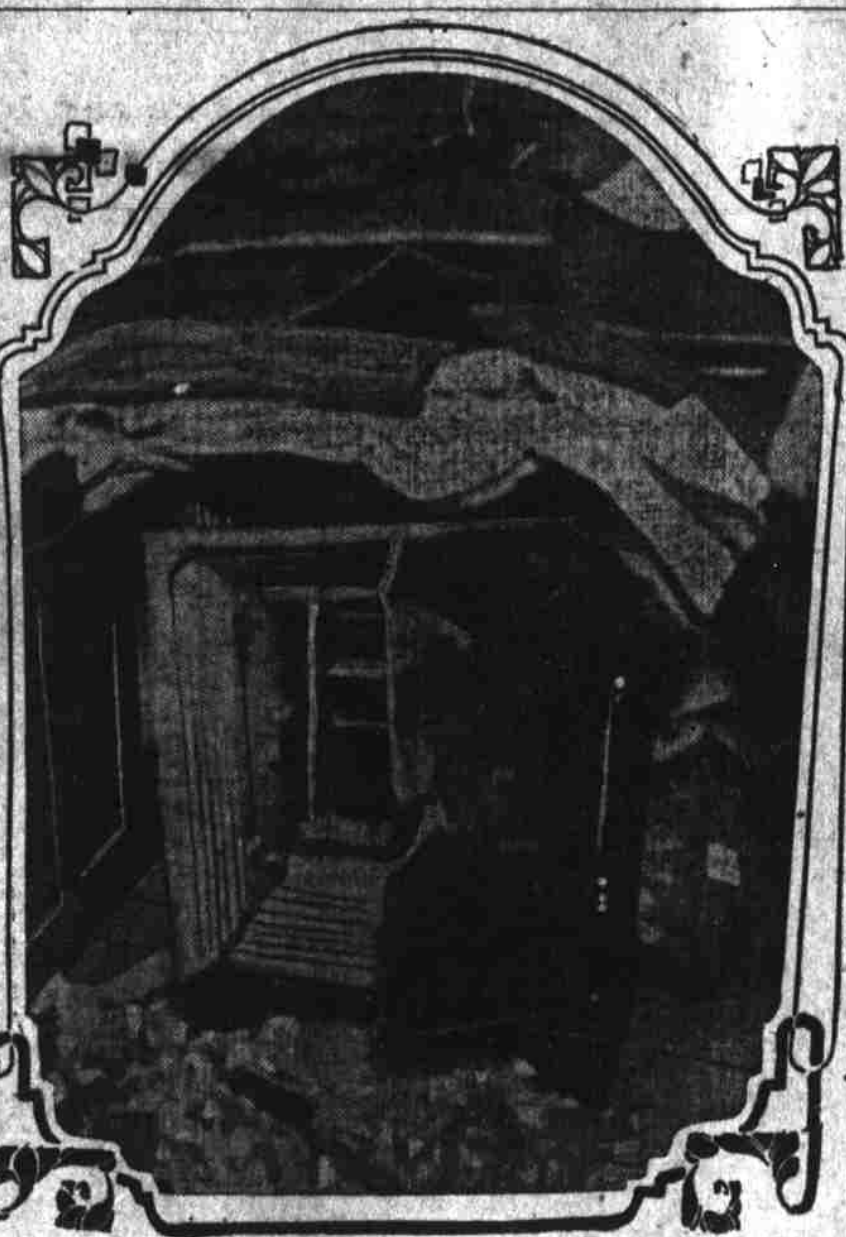
Why the casualty insurance companies are fighting the workmen's compensation act is the title of a circular being distributed by A. W. Lawrence, 1181 Burrage street, containing statistics compiled from the report of the Oregon insurance commissioner for the year ending December 31, 1912. It shows that 33 casualty companies doing business in Oregon received \$885,141.73, and paid out \$414,238.33 to injured workmen. The balance of \$368,914.40, the circular points out, represents profits and administration costs drained out of the state.

The figures show that actual losses incurred totalled \$423,976.35, while the amount of losses paid was nearly \$900,000. The total of net premiums for taxation was \$187,135.75, while the ratio of losses incurred to premiums was 62 per cent.

The circular points out that of the sum paid to injured workmen, more than half goes to the attorneys, who are paid on a percentage basis. The taxpayers are called upon to maintain courts and juries to try an immense number of suits where no recovery is secured, continues the circular. "And which are a dead loss to the state. Give the injured workman, mother and babies all that is coming to them and keep Oregon money in Oregon."

The workmen's compensation act is among the measures to vote upon at the election November 4 and it occupies the position of No. 508 on the ballot.

SWATHED IN BLANKETS TO DEADEN EXPLOSION

Using blankets and carpets to muffle the sound, professional safe blowers used nitroglycerine on the safe of D. Sondheim, a clothing merchant of 148 Second street last night, and got away with a sum of money between \$300 and \$400. All in all, it was a very neat piece of work and probably done by experts in the safe cracking line. The door of the safe was partly blown off its hinges, leaving the money and papers exposed.

Captain Batt, chief of detectives, made an investigation of the case early this morning and has issued a warning to all merchants to be more careful in closing their stores at night. Investigations show that the Sondheim store was entered through a rear window which was left open last night at the close of business, although the front door and windows were strongly barred.

PRESBYTERIANS READY TO JOIN 'DRY' CAMPAIGN

A statewide prohibition campaign will be taken up by the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon whenever the other temperance propaganda organizations of the state become harmonized and agree upon a time. At the meeting of the synod in the Westminster church yesterday resolutions were passed on the motion of Rev. William Parsons favoring a prohibition plan and appointing a committee of seven members of the synod to confer with similar committees from other denominations and temperance bodies.

The Presbyterian Synod is willing to take up a campaign in either 1914 or 1915, but insists that all other interested workers in the prohibition cause be agreed as to the time.

The committee appointed consists of Rev. John Boyd, Rev. W. S. Gilbert and Rev. Henry Marcotte representing the Portland presbytery; Rev. Ward W. MacHenry, Grand Rondo; Rev. S. L. MacHenry, Pendleton; Rev. W. D. Vater, southern presbytery, and Rev. William Parsons, Willamette.

At yesterday's meeting Mrs. Mary Mallet spoke on behalf of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of the state and urged a campaign for 1914, placing emphasis on the female vote. Speaking for the Anti-Saloon league, H. L. Shelton argued for a campaign against the home rule law in 1914 and a statewide prohibition campaign in 1915.

The routine business of the day included reports on spiritual life in Oregon by Rev. J. Snyder; religious education by Rev. G. T. Hurd; Rev. J. V. Milligan and A. M. Williams, and home missionaries.

Rev. W. S. Holt, who leaves the Portland presbytery to become assistant secretary of ministerial relief in Philadelphia, made a farewell address. It was decided to hold the next synod at Albany.

INLAND EMPIRE SEES BENEFITS TO COME BY COLUMBIA PROJECTS

Spokane Lawyer Adds Encouragement; Others Sound Words of Commendation.

Half a dozen new enlistments in the Ports of Columbia committee were reported today by Dr. Alfred Kinney, chairman of the committee.

"This inland country will receive equal benefits with the down river country," writes H. S. Stoolfor, lawyer of Spokane, relative to the campaign to deepen the Columbia river channel to 40 feet.

"The great bend of the Columbia borders this inland empire on three sides, and while we have believed for many years that this river should properly afford us great commercial advantages, yet for some strange reason the key-note of its use and development was never struck until your committee began its great work."

"Much has already been done for the river traffic, locks have been built and many obstructions removed to stimulate and facilitate its development, but one thing has always been lacking, to-wit: a first class entrance at the mouth of the river. Our export commerce in timber, grains and fruits tributary to several hundred miles of coast on the Columbia is worth millions of dollars annually, but this commerce never has made and could not make use of this natural and economical highway now about to be thrown open. It assured the Spokane people realize and endorse the great work you have undertaken and the inestimable benefit it will be to this inland country, and they will rally to your support in whatever way they can best assist in the greatest reclamation project ever begun in this country."

Oregon City Men Favor Plan.
C. Schubel of Oregon City, law partner of W. E. Trigg, writes: "I believe that deepening the channel of the Columbia river is one of the most important things for the future growth of the state of Oregon, and that every assistance possible should be given to have a channel sufficiently deep to carry the largest vessels afloat on the river. To take care of the commerce that should naturally go over the Columbia river bar."

A letter from E. E. Tripp of Independence contains this expression: "Knowing as I do the great influx of people to this coast on the opening of the Panama canal, and the increased business that will certainly come at that time, I realize that Portland will take her place as one of the world's largest ports, and when she does it will mean the rapid development of all country lying tributary to the Columbia and Willamette basins. I also realize that this improvement cannot take place until the channel of the Columbia river is deep enough to admit the ships of the greatest draft."

"I am thoroughly confident that with the progressive spirit of new Oregon this work will eventually be accomplished, and the ports of the Columbia will be doing the largest import and export business on the Pacific coast."

Success of the campaign to provide a wide, deep entrance at the mouth of the Columbia means more farms, more mills, more factories and a great stream of commerce that will flow in both directions throughout the Columbia basin. It means more and greater markets for our products, more opportunities for our children," says O. L. Wigglesworth of Warrenton, Or., in a letter to Dr. Kinney.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR MRS. RYNERSON HELD

Funeral services for Mrs. Martha A. Rynerison, wife of C. M. Rynerison, who died Thursday night at the family home, 1013 East Thirty-second street north, were held at Finley's undertaking rooms at 3 o'clock this afternoon, with burial in Mount Scott cemetery. Rev. S. Earl Dubois, who conducted the services, read Bryant's "Thanatopsis," and drew lessons from that poem in discussing the life of unselfishness led by Mrs. Rynerison.

For more than two years Mrs. Rynerison had been a sufferer from tuberculosis, and for eight months had been kept to her bed. She had always preferred home life to society, though she had a large circle of friends who often visited her during her illness.

Mr. and Mrs. Rynerison had lived in Oregon since 1905, when they came here from Iowa. There are no children. Mrs. Rynerison's parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Ewing, who have been living with their daughter, were at the bedside at the last.

CLAIM PROPERTY WAS A JUST RECOMPENSE

Answering the suit of Mrs. Lillie M. Trigg for the cancellation of deeds which she claims were procured through fraud, and for an accounting, Attorneys George A. Hall, H. J. Parkinson and Harry Tankwich, the defendants, allege that they performed services for Mrs. Trigg for which the property secured was a just recompense. They also charge Attorney M. B. Mescham, who now represents Mrs. Trigg, with acts unbecoming an attorney and ask that he be reprimanded by the court.

The answers contain detailed statements of the services rendered to Mrs. Trigg in procuring the will of Elizabeth Mohrman and in the contest of the will which was brought by the sons of Mrs. Mohrman. Mrs. Mohrman's property at Arleta, valued at about \$1400. In addition to these services the attorneys present bills for many other acts performed.

BOY HURT BY AUTO GETS \$2000 DAMAGES

Damages for \$2000 were given J. Rudolph Brown, 3 years old, by a jury in Circuit Judge Gates' court this morning on account of a fractured leg caused by an automobile accident. Edwin R. Angell, the owner of the automobile, was the defendant.

The accident occurred on East Twenty-first street near Going, while the boy and his companions were playing "shinny." W. T. Brown, the boy's father and guardian sued for \$2000.

ACCUSED OF ALLEGED BUNCO TRANSACTION

Two Men Arrested on Complaint of Portland Woman.

Accused of trying to work a bunco deal on Jennie Riemann of 508 1/2 Third street, John A. Connelly, manager of a film exchange in the Rothchild building, was arrested last night. He was released on bail, the hearing to be next Saturday in the municipal court.

The information signed by Mrs. Riemann is to the effect that Henry A. Connors, a friend of Connelly, telegraphed her from Brooklyn, N. Y., that a friend of Mrs. Riemann was arrested in New York city for a false timber deal. Connors asked for \$150 with which he could secure the freedom of the friend. The woman sent the money.

Connors then communicated with Connelly, in which the latter was asked to lend his assistance to the game of getting money from the woman. Connors sent a second telegram, asking for more money, as he had been unable to get the friend out of jail. Connelly is accused of being connected with both deals. In

the meantime, the woman received a letter from the friend, who was in California. She immediately took the matter up with the district attorney, Detective Gotsch and today last evening arrested Connelly at the film exchange. Connors has been taken into custody in New York.
