

CITY AND SUBURBAN ENDOUR RALLY WAS ENJOYABLE OCCASION

Park Place and Sunnyside Receive Trophies in New Membership Contest.

The third annual city and suburban rally of Congregational churches in Oregon was held last evening with the gathering of over 350 people from 14 churches, at the Sunnyside church, representing a membership of over 450 young people.

A spirit of meriment prevailed from the start, and as the program progressed it increased, especially when the eyes of those assembled were attracted by the exceedingly "city" menu cards that were placed at each place.

Clarence H. Sprague, who presided as toastmaster, called for impromptu addresses from Edward Albroch, secretary of the First Congregational Endeavor; Emery French of Park Place society, and S. C. Pien, superintendent of the Sunnyside Sunday school.

Greetings from State League, Alva Patton of Forest Grove spoke briefly concerning "Energetic Endeavor" and Kenneth Robb, president of the Hillsboro Young People's union, brought an inspiring message concerning the friendships formed in Christian Endeavor work.

Mrs. C. A. Mann of the Women's Missionary board was present and delivered an interesting and instructive address concerning the various missionary activities of the Congregational church, illustrating her talk by the use of pictures of missionary activities.

Lloyd R. Carrick of Sunnyside society closed the hour with a talk on missions, urging each society to take up a definite work. The meeting was opened by prayer offered by Dr. J. J. Staubb of the Sunnyside church. Then came the roll call responding to the representatives of each society. As the roll call continued enthusiasm increased and as each report was given a round of applause would break forth.
