GERMAN BARK COMES IN BALLAST TO TAKE

Churbek Takes More Than a The steamer Boanoke arrived early this morning from San Diego, San Pedro and San Francisco with passengers and freight. Schurbek Takes More Than a Rosalla.

Taking over a month for the voyage, the German Bark Schurbek crossed in over the Columbia river bar yesterday from Santa Rosalia, coming in ballast to load a carge of wheat for the United Eingdom. This is rather a long passage from the Mexican port for the Schurbek as she has made it in much better time on several occasions.

The Schurbek made the voyage up from Santa Rosalia this time in 32 days, which is 11 days longer than it took her to come last year, 21 days boing her run at that time. On the occasion of her previous visit to this port in 1910 she made the passage in 24 days.

The smartest passage from the Mexican port to the Columbia river was made by one of the "Bek" line, the German ship Lasbek having made the run up in 20 days three years ago when she came to load a cargo of wheat for the United Kingdom. The Schurbek is a carrier of 2266 tons net and is in command of Captain Christiansen. She will load under charter to M. H.

Among the other grain ships which are about due are the German bark Werner, 2062 tons net, and the British ship Hinemoa. The Werner Vinnen is out 56 days today from Antofagasta in ballast to load grain under charter to Balfour, Guthris & Co., and the Hine-moa, which is bringing general cargo for Meyer, Wilson & Co., is out 124 days today. She is under charter for a grain cargo outward. The British bark Thistlebank, which is under char-ter to the Portland Flouring Mills company, for a wheat cargo, is now out 108 days from Buenos Ayres. The British ship Westgate is now out 52 days from Pisagua to load grain under charter to M. H. Houser and should be due to arrive here soon.

MAY BE HULL OF ELDORADO Water Logged Derelict Seen Off the Oregon Coast,

What may be the waterlogged hull of the missing schooner Eldorado was sighted about 300 miles south of the Columbia river by Captain John Lindberg. of the American steamer Fifield, last Thursday morning, according to a report received by the United States branch hydrographic office here. Captain Lind-berg reported that at 4 o'clock in the morning he sighted a vessel off the starboard side of his steamer about 150 feet long and six feet out of the water. The vessel was on its beam ends and no spars were visible. The derelict was in latitude 41:12 nonth, longitude 124:28 west. The Eldorado was 196 feet long. She sailed from the Columbia April 1 for Antofagasta, and is long overdue. She had a lumber cargo.

STRONG NORTHERLY CURRENT Buoy Drifts Many Miles in a Very Few Days.

Drifting 46 miles in three days, a painted keg used as a mooring buoy outside Grays Harbor, was picked up at Destruction island on October 4, ac to Destruction Island on October 4, according to a letter received this morning by Henry L. Beck, lighthouse inspector for the Seventeenth district, from the keeper at the Cape Destruction station. The drift of the keg shows the strong northerly set of the currents along the Washington coast. The keg was used for mooring purposes by a Grays Harbor tugboat con-cern and was seen in place on Octo-ber 1.

IMPORTATION OF BEEF

(Special to The Journal.)
Washington, Oct. 20.—That the Unit-Washington, Oct. 20.—That the United States has changed with starting suddenness from a small beef exporting country to a very large beef importing country. Is shown by a report issued by the department of commerce today. This report shows that the exports of beef and beef cattle have fallen from \$44,000,000 value in the eight months ended with August, 1904, to practically \$1,000,000 in the corresponding months of 1913 and that the imports of cattle in the meantime increased from 9357 in the eight months of 1904 to 340,105 in the same period of 1913, and their value in the eight months of 1904 to 346,105 in the same period of 1913, and their value from \$181,145 in 1904 to \$5,081,842 in 1913. As to beef, the importations in 1904 were insufficient to justify their statement month by month, and the total value of beef imported for consumption in the full fiscal year, 1904, was but \$14,922, while the single month of July, 1913, showed a total importation of 642,-394 pounds valued at \$56,993; August, a total of 1,151,626 pounds valued at \$89,-204, and September about an equal

Even the value of the comparatively small number of cattle exported is now less per head than in earlier years, de-spite the general advance in prices in the meantime. The average export price of the 18,069 head of cattle in the eight months ended with August, 1913, was \$34, against an average of \$68 for the 418,865 head of cattle exported in the corresponding months of 1904. On the mport side there is a decrease of about 20 per cent in the valuation per head, the 340,105 cattle imported in the eight months ended with August, 1913, being valued at \$15 per head, compared with \$19 per head for the 9357 cattle imported in the corresponding months of 1904. The character of the ported differs, of course, radically from that of those exported, being mostly, on the export side, grain-fed animals ready for slaughtering, and on the import side, grass-fed cattle in many cases, but 1 or 2 years of age. Practically all of the cattle imported, other than those for breeding purposes, are brought from Mexico, that country having supplied
