

### MARGARET ANGLIN PLAYS PART OF VIOLA IN SPLENDID TASTE

#### Lovelorn Heroine of "Twelfth Night" Depicted in Artistic Fashion.

Thoughts of other occupations were laid aside and forgotten, and the spirit of revelry took their place at the Hellig theatre last night. It was the occasion of Miss Margaret Anglin's presentation of Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," one of the brightest and sunniest of the dramas of the Bard of Avon. It was a night of laughter, a season of holiday joys wherein the flowing bowl and the pipe played each its important part in the unraveling of a love plot as fascinating as it was strange and unusual. Miss Anglin, as Viola, depicted the role of the lovelorn heroine who, to win the man she loved, assumed male attire and acted as page to her lord. The strategy and the simulation manifested by Miss Anglin was a true conception of that adorable character delineated by Shakespeare. To accomplish her purpose, Viola was compelled to resort to trick and sham, which led her through a tortuous succession of delicate and sometimes embarrassing situations.

The difficult role of assuming to bleed the cause of her master before the cold, radiantly beautiful Olivia, while Viola's own heart burned and ached for the same love that Orsino, the duke of Illyria, would give Olivia, was the trying undertaking of Miss Anglin. The manner in which the actress assumed the spirit of self-abnegation, was duly appreciated by the large and critical audience of lovers of Shakespeare.

Part Played Successfully.  
Miss Anglin played the part so successfully that the duke was kept in ignorance of the humor of the situation and was not aware that the lovable page was really a maiden, until the closing scene when the plot was exposed. The duke's marriage to the whimsical lassie followed as a natural climax. The part of Viola did not call for emotional acting of the gripping sort, but rather a mellifluous flow of soft words, and the cadences and musical voice of Miss Anglin were admirably suited to the part.

Miss Anglin appears as her own manager. She selected the scenery and plotted her company with the fine discrimination of a real master. The color effect of the scenic parts blended in a highly realistic manner. No particular individual part is permitted to stand out boldly in the galaxy of stars which compose the Anglin company.

### POLICEMEN ARRESTED; UNDER SUSPENSION

#### Charge of Burglary in Second Degree Is Placed Against Officers.

Vancouver, Wash., Oct. 31.—On motion of Councilman J. W. Westworth and seconded by Councilman P. M. Elwell, the city council, by unanimous vote last night, suspended Police Officer Jack Smith and Police Officer McLeod for an indefinite period. The two officers were arrested yesterday on the charge of burglary in the second degree and were released on bonds in the sum of \$1000 each to appear before the superior court. They will be arraigned as soon as Judge H. H. Back returns to the city, which will be the last of the week, it is expected.

The officers are accused of entering the drygoods store of U. L. Fraser early Sunday morning for illegal purposes. The investigating committee of the city council, which held a hearing yesterday, reported that its findings were not yet completed, as they only had the officers' story, Mr. Fraser failing to attend the inquiry.

### STERILIZATION LAW IS SAID TO CONFER TOO DANGEROUS A POWER

#### Contention Made That Two Men Would Have Authority to Mutilate Insane at Will.

Protesting against the sterilization measure to be voted upon at the forthcoming referendum election, November 4, on the ground that it places too much power in the hands of two men, a number of prominent citizens of Portland, in the following communication, recommend that the voters of the state vote "No" on this measure:

"We believe the sterilization law should be rejected because it does not sufficiently guard the safety of the insane and feeble-minded and all prisoners in the state institutions to be sterilized, without a trial or hearing, without a notice to the insane person or prisoner, or to any friend, relative or guardian, to cause any insane person in the state institutions to be sterilized, castrated or otherwise mutilated by any 'surgical operation' the state board of health may be pleased to order. Nothing is required by law but approval of the state board of the reports of the superintendent.

"There is nothing in the law to prevent all of this being done before any of the work is made public. We do not think any two men or any combination of men should have this power over the bodies of insane persons or prisoners. It is true that the law says the insane person or prisoner may appeal from the order of the state board, but it does not require that he or she shall have any notice whatever, and this makes appeal impossible, except by the kindness of

the superintendent of the asylum or penitentiary.  
"We recommend that this law be rejected by voting 100 X No.  
"We do not say the present officers would abuse the authority granted them by this law, but we believe the history of mankind proves that such secret power is too great to be given any body of men over other men, woman and most of all over the helpless insane persons and prisoners.

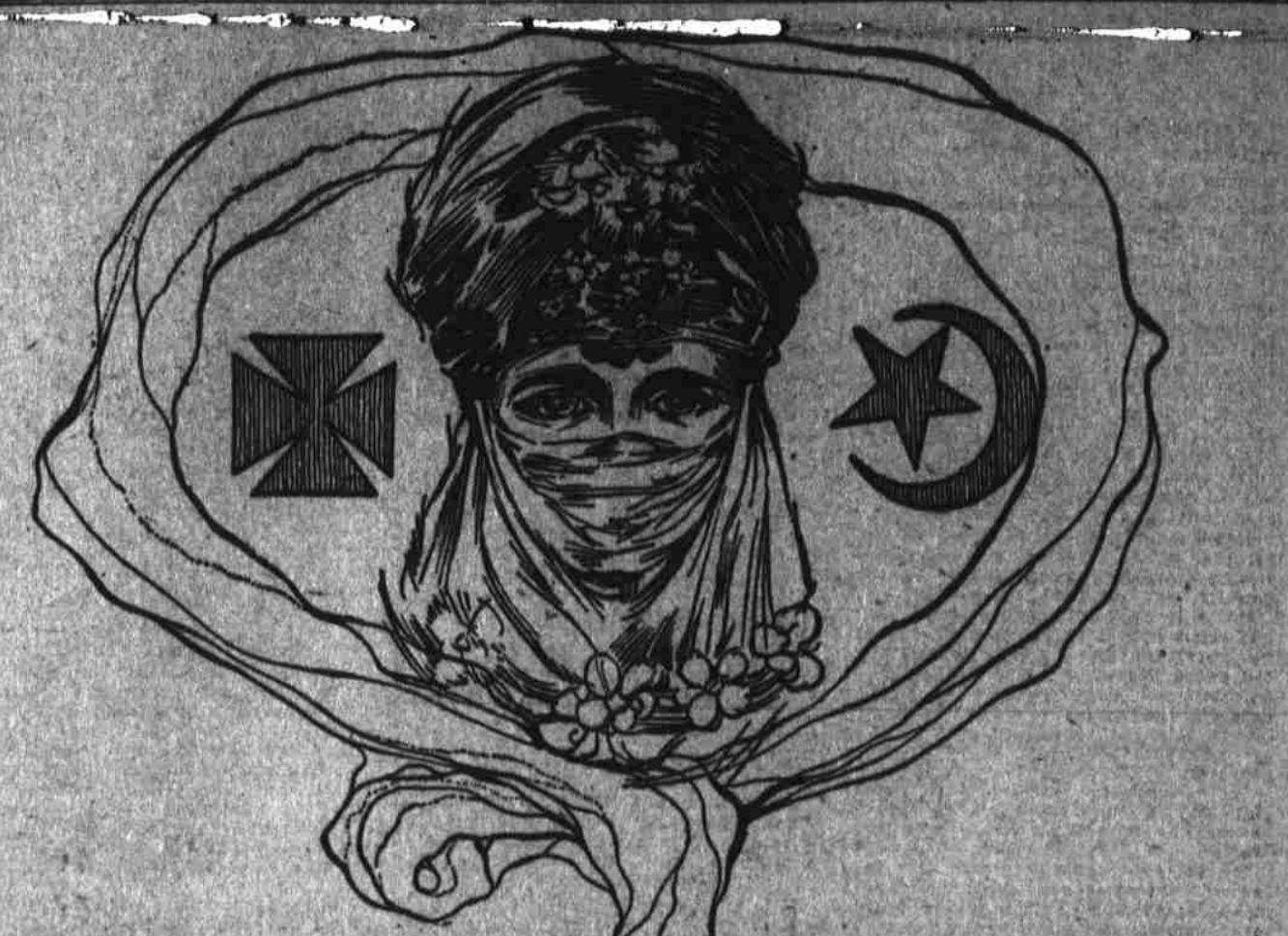
