ages From Asylum.

Tacoma Wash, Oct. 22.—H. P. Emery, stage manager of a Portland vaudeville theatre, today is awarded a verdict of \$9900 against Andrew J. Littlejohn and wife and Dr. A. P. Calhoun, superintendent of the insane asylum at Fort Steilacoom, by a jury in superior court here. Emery sued for \$13.800 damages for permanent injuries sustained as a result of being shat by O. W. Pence. Mrs. Litof being shot by O. W. Pence, Mrs. Lit-tlejohn's son, who, while on temporary discharge from the asylum, pursued a theatrical company to Portland to press his attentions upon one of the girl mem-bers. The defendants will appeal to the

supreme court.

The main point developed in the case was the lack of a law in this state permitting superintendents of insane hospitals to release patients on temporary discharge or parole to relatives. Phy-sicians in charge of other lunacy institutions testified that the custom of pa-roling patients was a common one, but the court held that as there is no provision in the statutes for such paroles, they cannot be granted except on order of the court.

Emery, who resides at 547 Fourth street, was incapacitated for 10 weeks following the shooting, which occurred at 9:30 o'clock on the night of July 9 1912. He spent four weeks in the hospital. Although he is still weak, he works every day. The bullet fired by Pence struck the center of Emery's bone and has not been taker

It was due to Emery's efforts to pro-tect the young actress from Pence that he was shot.




