

HUERTA'S THREATS TO UNITED STATES TEND TO ANGER THE POWERS

London Believes They Will Do More Than Anything Else to Bring Sympathy to America.

(Special to The Journal.) London, Oct. 23.—The Mexican situation continues to be the subject for much discussion and the lack of authentic news has been the cause of many wild rumors. The policy of silence adopted by Washington has been seconded by the British foreign office, with the result that the evening papers have appeared with all sorts of wild rumors, only to deny them in later editions. It is felt on all sides that an official statement from Washington and the foreign office would do much to clear the air and at the same time put an end to the unwarranted and unjust public opinion.

AMERICA'S POLICY AWAITS OUTCOME OF THE ELECTION

Policy in cases of great disorder, where the subjects of citizens of a country have great interests that need protection, it would not dispute the right under ordinary conditions to land mines wherever necessary for the production of personal property, but I think it would be inadvisable under the present circumstances for them to land mines in Mexico, because that might lead to unfortunate complications.

Those who oppose the present stand declare it is extremely dangerous at the present time because the whole diplomatic corps in Mexico City, led by Great Britain, seems disposed to accept the result of tomorrow's election. A new president is elected and Huerta clinches his own hold on the office in the guise of dictator.

Advice received from Mexico City today indicated that the situation there is extremely tense and that there are possibilities of serious disturbances tomorrow, despite the fact that police and troops patrol the streets in anticipation of an outbreak.

J. C. Proebstel remembers the time when the traffic between Portland and Vancouver was quite admirably served by a skiff. "Then came a wise-sounding ferry, and it wasn't so important if it failed to be regular in its trips between the two cities, as the skiff was frequently stuck and was not accommodated if the ferry was late.

There wasn't, in fact, says Mr. Proebstel, any demand for a wagon bridge over the Columbia until the day of horse surfaced streets, high-powered vehicles, congested population, increased production and all that give character to modern life and commerce. Then the ferry became a thing of question, because he says it is a thing of yesterday, accidentally kept in use for today, but altogether inconsistent with the things of today.
