

GREAT DEVELOPMENT WOULD RESULT FROM INTERSTATE BRIDGE

Engineer Modjeski Shows by Comparison With New York What Would Occur Here.

The construction of the proposed interstate bridge would be followed by a great development of both Vancouver and Portland, according to the engineer, Modjeski, designer and builder of bridges, who has returned to his home in Portland after a visit to his Chicago office. Mr. Modjeski will leave Portland for the east within a couple of weeks for the purpose of attending the meeting of the Quebec bridge commission at New York.

Regarding the interstate bridge he said: "There is no development possible without circulation. This western country could not have developed to the point where we find it now without railroads and highways. As an example, those who have been in New York may have noticed the phenomenal development of that city in two principal directions, namely, toward the north into Eastern and toward the east into Brooklyn. The first development is due principally to the great facilities for transportation offered by the subway and the second is due principally to the bridges and tunnels.

"From my observation of similar cases throughout the states and other countries, I am free to say that the interstate bridge is a necessity and will be built. When built it will mark an epoch not only in the development of Portland and Vancouver, but also of the two counties and will have a further bearing on the development of the two states.

"I must be understood as not saying this with any view of ultimate interest as an engineer, but as a citizen of Oregon, and I am using my engineering experience merely to base my opinion upon.

"We are constructing a Pacific Highway from British Columbia to Mexico. It can hardly be imagined that Portland would be the only place where the traffic would have to resort to the primitive use of a ferry boat.

"I will go so far as to assert that very soon after the interstate bridge, now in contemplation, is constructed, the necessity will arise for more bridges across the same stream. This has been the usual history of similar situations."

W. G. McLAREN MADE CHAPLAIN AT PRISON

Salem, Or., Oct. 25.—On petition of 133 convicts, the state board yesterday appointed W. G. McLaren as chaplain of the Portland penitentiary, as a chaplain for the state penitentiary and the state industrial school for boys. The board also formally appointed Father Moore and Rev. Philip Bauer, whose appointments were overlooked when the other officials were appointed after the new board of control law went into effect. Rev. Mr. Bauer has resigned and Mr. McLaren's appointment was made to fill the vacancy.

KEEP HONOR SYSTEM AT FOLSOM PRISON

Escape of Three Convicts Will Not Change Humanitarian Policy at Penitentiary.

(Special Press Release) Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 25.—There will be no change in the honor system inaugurated by Warden James Johnston and now in effect at Folsom penitentiary, because of the recent escape of Norman C. Hair, Thomas Samuels and William Roder, convicts, who knocked down Guard Morse and escaped last Friday.

Warden Johnston made this announcement today, adding: "My policy is to take the men in hand when they are put in my care and therefore endeavor to fit them out again, to the end that prison life may benefit rather than injure them."

"Men should leave prison better than when they enter it, and the betterment should be of a moral, mental, moral and physical nature."

The three men were placed in solitary confinement today, and according to Johnston, will be punished but not prosecuted.

Guard A. C. Moran, who was overpowered by the men, has been dismissed.

PRESIDENT MOHLER OF UNION PACIFIC IS HERE ON OFFICIAL BUSINESS

Former Portlander Sees Big Changes; Duck Hunting Fever Gets Him.

While President A. L. Mohler of the Union Pacific railroad really did not cross the continent especially to take a pot shot at Oregon's wild ducks, he declared on his arrival in Portland this morning that he was fairly "hot" to get into action with the wild ducks.

"I have been seven long years since I left Portland to go with the Union Pacific," said Mr. Mohler this morning. "This town certainly looks better to me every time I see it. It's just on a business trip that I'm here, and I'd like to stay longer than the few days I shall have."

The head of the Union Pacific said he is here merely to take up matters that cannot be attended to so well by correspondence. He spent the morning in calls upon President J. D. Farrell, General Manager, F. P. O'Brien, Assistant Traffic Manager, M. Robinson, General Counsel, W. W. Cotton and other officials of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company, and then went to the Kuluonah hotel, where he is making his headquarters.

"I don't know anything about the financial situation," said Mr. Mohler. "I know we have just about reached the apex, but when the descent into easier times is to begin, it will take a wiser southerner than I am to tell you. In spite of the difficult money market, we are getting along in fine shape back of Omaha, his headquarters, and I'd like to stay longer than the few days I shall have."

When Mr. Mohler finishes up his work here, he expects to go directly to Omaha, his headquarters, since his departure from the O. W. R. & N. seven years ago, when it was known as the O. R. & N. Co.

"I know what the plans are for the O. W. R. & N.," he continued. "I know, I have nothing to do with that line at all, merely visiting the officials now and then for social reasons as much as for any other. When they want to know things of the same nature that I am looking after now, they come to call on me."

"But about those ducks—I try to do a little shooting whenever I get out here if I can. This ought to be fine duck weather, too." He looked rather sadly in the Columbia river direction as he said. "But I don't know whether I'll have time."
