

LAST RITES FOR GATES WILL BE AS LAVISH AS LIFE OF MILLIONAIRE

Family Plan to Hold Funeral
in Grand Ballroom of Plaza
Hotel, New York.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Oct. 25.—The same lavish-
ness with which he lived will attend
the late Charles G. Gates' funeral. It
was evident from the plans his family
were making today.

The funeral service, it was said, prob-
ably would be held in the grand ball-
room at the Plaza hotel, where Gates'
father's body lay in state two years
ago. A procession of regal magnifi-
cence will accompany it to Woodlawn
cemetery.

The funeral probably will be held
Monday, but the date could not be set
definitely today, owing to delay in get-
ting the necessary certificates for trans-
portation of the body from Wyoming.
If possible, it will be brought to Chi-
cago Saturday, whence C. L. Hermann,
manager of the Gates properties, will
bring it here by special train.

Gates' wife and mother were pro-
strated today and a physician was at-
tending them. Mr. and Mrs. P. P. Hop-
wood, the widow's parents, were ex-
pected to arrive in the course of the
day.

DIED IN PRIVATE CAR AT CODY, WYOMING, AFTER HUNTING TRIP

Cody, Wyo., Oct. 25.—There was sin-
cere mourning here today for Charles
G. Gates, who succumbed late yesterday
afternoon to apoplexy while waiting in
his private car to start east after a
month's outing in Cody and vicinity.
Gates died, indeed, lamenting his fail-
ure to spend \$70,000, as he had prom-
ised to do, during his final week's stay
in Cody. He came near enough to it,
however, to have constituted the richest
gold mine the simple natives had ever
seen, and there was no insincerity in
the grief shown by those who had
profited by his visit.

One of his tips alone was \$10,000 to
the guide who accompanied him on his
hunting trip near Cody. Nor was this
included in the \$70,000 he tried to spend
in the town itself, as the gift preceded
the last week of the millionaire's stay
here.

He bought clothing for the poor, paid
up all, or portions of, the debts of
every church in Cody, gave \$1000 to his
chauffeur, and purchased \$7000 worth
of furs for overcoats for his friends.
Gates inherited about \$20,000,000
when his father, John W. Gates, died
in Paris three years ago. He announced
at the time he intended giving it all
away and dying poor, but he had
about \$18,000,000 left when he died. It is
estimated. He was building a \$1,000,000
home in Minneapolis, owned palaces in
New York and Port Arthur, Texas, and
had a home under lease in Pasadena,
Cal.

Mrs. Gates was Miss Florence Hop-
wood, a poor girl in Minneapolis, who
broke her engagement with a Brooklyn,
N. Y., man to marry Gates three years
ago. She is 12 New York now. The
first Mrs. Gates secured a divorce in
Chicago several years ago.

YOUNG COUNTERFEITERS ENTER PLEAS OF GUILTY

Pleading guilty to indictments charg-
ing counterfeiting, Ralph Pouts and L.
S. Morris of Hood River were sentenced
to six months each in the county jail
by United States District Judge R. S.
Bean yesterday afternoon. The two
were arrested in July by Secret Service
Agent William Glover, after an inves-
tigation had disclosed their plant on
an island in the Willamette near Cor-
vallis.

Morris is just past 26 years old and
Pouts has just reached his majority.
Because of the facts, Judge Bean ex-
plained that, in these two cases, he was
breaking precedent by giving these men
jail instead of penitentiary sentences.
In the pleas of attorneys for the two
men for leniency, they were seconded
by United States Attorney Reames.

It was shown that \$4.75 in spurious
coins had been made of denominations
of dollars, quarters and halves. They
were so exceedingly crude that only a
couple were passed. The men, who
wood choppers when they met an ex-
perienced counterfeiter, who "showed them
how," they said.

DATE FOR TRIAL OF WINTERS' SLAYER SET

November 10 has been set as the date
on which Lloyd H. Wilkins will be tried
for the murder of Lou L. Winters, a
musician of the trial will be held before
Circuit Judge Morrow on that day, un-
less a continuance asked for by At-
torney Edward D. Williams, represent-
ing Wilkins, is allowed. Two days were
allowed yesterday by Judge Morrow in
which to submit affidavits supporting
the request for a continuance. It is
said that the mother of Wilkins is ill
in her home in Superior, Wis., and that
the delay is desired that she may re-
cover and attend the trial. Wilkins
pleaded not guilty yesterday, though he
has confessed to the killing of Winters.

Road Will Become Famous.

"The Columbia river highway will
become the most famous scenic road
in the United States," predicted Samuel
Lancaster, engineer in charge of con-
struction, in an address before the
Rotary club yesterday. Its maximum
grade, he said, will not be over 5 per
cent. It will lead the tourist through
the gorge of the Columbia, each turn
revealing new grandeur.

CHANGE WOULD INJURE EVERYBODY ON STREET

Manager of Morgan Building
Would Have Broadway
Remain.

"It would be an outrage to change
Broadway back to Seventh street," said
W. C. North, manager of the new Mor-
gan building and vice president of the
North East Side Improvement associa-
tion, this morning. "Business the whole
length of the street would be affected.
Advertising has been planned and sta-
tioning procured for a year ahead by
most all of the Broadway business
houses. The name Broadway has been
put in the sidewalk of every street
crossing. The street is now known as
Broadway throughout the whole coun-
try."

"Everybody is wondering why Judge
M. G. Munly, being the father of the
first change from Seventh street to
Broadway, now wants it changed back.
Judge Munly as president of the North
East Side Improvement association
brought the matter up originally be-
fore that organization. He was the
father of the idea and a resolution was
passed unanimously endorsing the name
Broadway at the time of the original
change. People are wondering why he
is bringing it up now."

"I would like to ask the postal au-
thorities what difference there is be-
tween calling the street Broadway,
North Broadway and East Broadway, and
Seventh street, North Seventh and East
Seventh. This argument, as far as the
postal authorities is concerned, is non-
sense."

"Broadway is now the street's name.
What will be gained by changing it back
to Seventh street? We shall probably
have a meeting of the North East Side
Improvement association Friday night
to consider the matter. The name
Broadway is a byword now and should
be retained, and residents of the east
side cannot understand why Judge Mun-
ly wants it changed after being so ac-
tive in getting the first change."

ARMSTRONGS ARE GIVEN TEN DAYS TO PLEAD

County School Superintendent A. P.
Armstrong and his brother, Robert Arm-
strong, were arraigned yesterday before
Circuit Judge Morrow on the indictment
charging violation of charter provisions
regarding civil service examinations,
and were given 10 days in which to
enter pleas. They were indicted for
giving out advance questions to Captain
Joe Keller and Detective Sergeant Crad-
dock before an examination which the
two were to take. Superintendent Arm-
strong was a member of the city civil
service board and his brother is alleged
to have been the go-between. Two other
indictments are pending against Su-
perintendent Armstrong.

ENGINEER TO SPEAK ON COST KEEPING SYSTEMS

Opening a course of lectures on cost
keeping as applied to building con-
struction, Charles Burton, a Portland
engineer, will speak in room 420 of the
Young Men's Christian association to-
night at 7:30 o'clock. Contractors and
all others interested in this subject are
invited to attend.
The educational department has ar-
ranged with Mr. Burton to give a series
of Wednesday night lectures on cost
keeping. He is an advocate of the Eng-
lish method, which he believes is much
superior to the various methods fol-
lowed in this country.

DELAY IN JETTY WORK WHOLLY UNNECESSARY

Dr. Kinney Says Storm Rec-
ords Show Operations Can
Go on Through Winter.

Dr. Alfred Kinney, chairman of the
Ports of Columbia committee, declared
while in Portland yesterday that there
is no reason for longer delaying work
on the north jetty.

"It isn't necessary to wait until next
spring to begin," asserted Dr. Kinney.
"I have learned that the engineer in
charge of the work on the jetty is ready
to receive rock right now."

"Dan Kern of the company which has
the contract to furnish the rock has
stated that he has been ready for
some time to furnish 3000 tons of rock
a day."

"The storm records will show that it
is possible to work on the jetty a ma-
jority of the days during the winter
time. Very little time need be lost
from this cause."

Dr. Kinney announced that the Ports
of Columbia committee intends to con-
centrate effort on the advancement of
construction of the north jetty.

"I thoroughly believe that a year
gained in its construction means mil-
lions of dollars in commerce to the
Columbia," said he.

OLCOTT ANNOUNCES FOREST FUND SHARES

Counties of State Will Par-
ticipate in the Distribution
of \$55,950.72.

Salem, Or., Oct. 25.—The various
counties of the state will receive their
share of \$55,950.72 this year from the
forest reserves. This is 25 per cent of
the revenue derived from the reserves
in this state by the government for the
fiscal year ending June 30. There are
16,022,220 acres in the reserves in Ore-
gon. Lane county will receive the large-
st amount and Walla Walla next. An-
nouncement of the apportionment of the
fund was made by Secretary of State
Olcott yesterday, as follows:

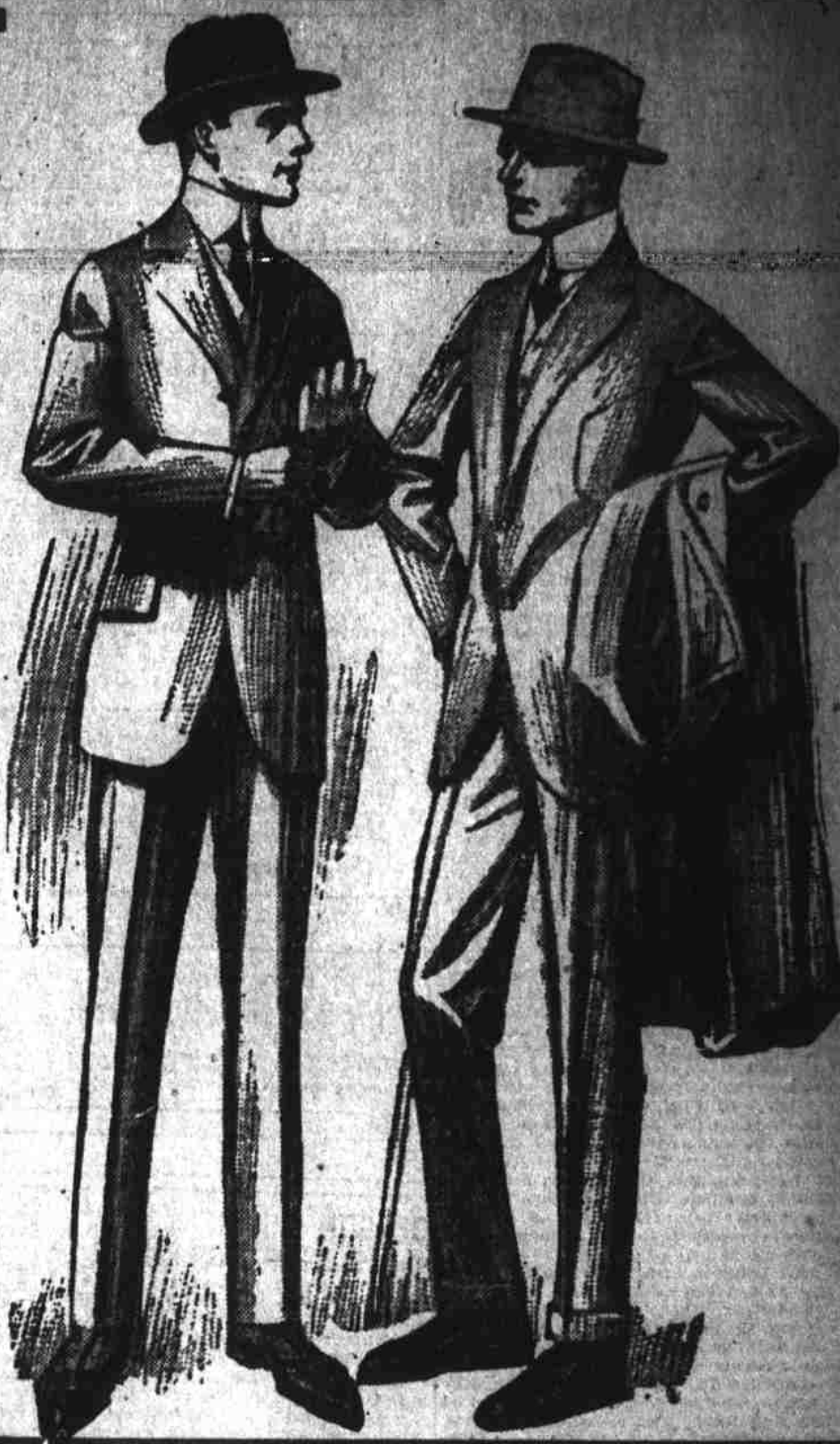
